Maybe This is Your Problem, Too

The *Raymond Falronas* of Chicago have a problem. Their sons, Gerald, 8, and Ronald, 9, can't be coaxed from the family TV set—even to eat supper. And you really can't blame them.

This is just one of the hundred episodes unfolded in candid letters received by the editors of this magazine. Scores of requests ranging from "How old is Fran Allison of WBKB?" to "Would Jerry Kaufherr of WGN-TV attend our sorority hen party?" are received each week in the mail bag. We hope to answer the question on Miss Allison, submitted by *Mrs. C. Currier* of Lansing, Ill., with a special feature in this issue.

Each letter deserves a special answer, but with all the work our staff has been doing on the National TV Show now at the Coliseum, we have been unable to keep up with the flow of suggestions, requests and criticisms.

If the mail can be used as a measuring stick of the average viewer, then here are the things most owners of TV sets expect of Chicago video stations:

- More dramas; the use of stock companies.
- More varied Saturday night programs.
- Shorter, snappier commercials.
- A Sunday church program.
- Criticism of TV shows by a staff writer.

Naturally television stations are interested in the types of programs set owners express a desire to see. They are therefore grateful for the letters forwarded to this magazine.

However, some of our readers disagree on shows. *Lewis Ayres* of Chicago says the same wrestlers appear each week on the sports show, and that he'd enjoy seeing some new performers. *Mrs. Lee Roy Burrell* of Midlothian thinks "wrestling is tops." *Frank Jensen* of Maywood says TV is "overcrowded with grunt and groan matches."

Many viewers are anxious to obtain publications devoted exclusively to wrestlers. These can be secured by writing the station offering such publications for sale.

C. Franklin Smith of Chicago wonders if 1948 is the year to buy a television receiver. Acquaintances, he writes, feel that such sets will shortly be outmoded by newer models. To this question, uppermost in the minds of thousands now attending the National TV Show at the Coliseum, here is our answer: Receivers now on the market will give outstanding service for at least 10 years, comparable to the period most persons use a radio set.

Mr. Smith also asks—"How are the expenses of a television station met?" Chicago stations WGN-TV, WBKB and WENR-TV, in order to present daily programs, accept advertising from business firms. It is this advertising revenue which supports operations and which also influences the number and pattern of programs offered.

Raymond M. Vleck, *Mrs. Gerald Getty* and *Elmer F. Taylor* and others are interested in movies, and desire to know

WGN-TV, Dumont Sign Contract; Add Programs

More television history was made in Chicago when WGN-TV signed an agreement with the Dumont Television network to be the exclusive Chicago outlet for network originated programs.

This will give Chicago viewers the first regular coast-to-coast network programming in this area. The contract affiliating WGN-TV with the Dumont Network was signed by Frank P. Schreiber, manager and treasurer of WGN, Inc., and Humboldt J. Greig, sales manager for Dumont.

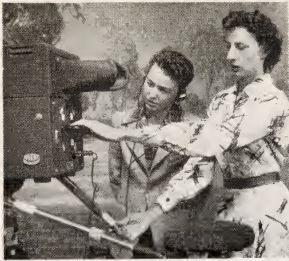
In a joint announcement issued by Schreiber and Greig, it was stated that WGN-TV would begin network operations in September and the first commercial program scheduled for WGN-TV by the Dumont Network is the "Original Amateur Hour" beginning Oct. 3. This is a full hour program, Sunday nights from 7 to 8, and is New York's top-rated television program. Outstanding programs originated by the Dumont Network will be available to WGN-TV immediately.

Schreiber stated that the Dumont contract had been made in keeping with the long-established policies of WGN, Inc., to make the best radio and television features available to the great Middle West.

This represents the first practical move to bring high calibre coast-to-coast television programming to the Chicago area. Until station connections from East to West become operative Dumonts programs will mainly be available to WGN-TV by tele-transcriptions, an exclusive double system process of reproducing shows off the cathode ray tube developed by the Allen B. Dumont laboratories.

Red Quinlan Named to Post

Red Quinlan has been appointed promotion and publicity manager of WBKB, it was announced by John Mitchell, business manager. Quinlan served more than a year with the B&K station in various capacities and has a wide experience in writing and public relations.

WNBQ to be Hub of NBC Network

When WNBQ begins operations this fall it will become the hub of NBC's midwest television network, according to I. E. Showerman, NBC vice president.

Already in operation is an NBC network of six stations: WTMJ-TV (Milwaukee), KSD-TV (St. Louis), WWJ-TV (Detroit), WSPD-TV (Toledo) and WBEN-TV (Buffalo, N.Y.).

St. Louis and Detroit now serve as key program origination points with a minimum of 12 hours of programming a week. Coaxial cable is being used for program transmission between all points. However, when Chicago, Milwaukee, Detroit and Toledo join, service will be by microwave relay.

New Sets Go into Homes

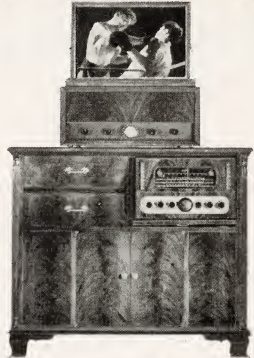
The pendulum has swung back in the other direction.

A year ago more sets were sold to public places than to private home owners. Now, according to WBKB statistics, more than 550 are installed each week in private homes, while only 15 are installed in public places. The implication is clear: programs will be slanted for the home audience more than ever in the past.

"Great Books" Show Features Dr. Hutchins

Dr. Robert M. Hutchins, chancellor of the University of Chicago and chairman of the Great Books Foundation will act as reader and interpreter when "Great Books" is televised over Station WENR-TV, Fridays at 8:30 to 9 p.m., CDT, it was announced by Harold Stokes, program manager. Lynn A. Williams, Jr., president of the foundation will act as moderator.

Discussion sessions, such as they actually occur in Great Books groups throughout the nation, will be brought into the homes of the WENR-TV audience. The books to be discussed on the program will be those which deal "most incisively, most eloquently, most universally and most timelessly with man and his world."

On each telecast a panel of six persons will participate in the discussions. These panels will consist of men and women engaged in a variety of occupations, from bankers to bakers and from editors to housewives.

Great Book seminars were introduced into the undergraduate curriculum of the University of Chicago by Dr. Hutchins and Mortimer Adler in 1930. The first class to be set up outside the University was organized in October, 1943. Since that date the Foundation has achieved nationwide prominence as a foremost adult education medium.

Sun-Times Capers Scheduled for WBKB

New among shows to hit WBKB's tele-lanes will be the Sun-Times Capers, a weekly 15 minute spot featuring Handy Andy, Jr., Bob McElroy and an unnamed member of the animal world.

A spectacular array of Chicago musical and variety talent is being presented Sunday through Friday at 7:30 to 8:00 p.m., CDT, over ABC's newest television outlet, WENR-TV. 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Fran Allison is Chicago TV Queen, Fans and Writer Agree

Glamorous is the word for Fran Allison, Chicago's unofficial television queen!

Sparkling member of the Junior Jamboree cast, Fran, offstage, is the same vivacious personality with lively eyes, a ready smile, and quick wit. She is tall and slim, and the morning we met she wore a colorful costume of brilliant reds and greens, complemented by gold kid sandals and gold jewelry.

"We're deep in plans for the return of Junior Jamboree," were her first words following our introduction. "We hope to be able to show the television audience, through the use of films, some of our experiences at Dragon Retreat this summer," she continued.

Fran had just completed her role of "Aunt Fanny" on the Breakfast Club, Chicago radio show, but her thoughts

were with Kukla, Ollie, Madame Oglepuss and the many other members of the Junior Jamboree show, telecast each weekday evening on WBKB.

"Working with Burr Tillstrom has proved a happy meeting of the minds," she went on. "The shows are planned at daily meetings between Burr, Lew Gomavitz, the director, and myself. At that time we work out a beginning and climax for the evening's show, which is arrived at through an hour or so of talk. The program is then ad libbed."

Fran, who joined the show last October, came on a temporary agreement, until she proved to herself that she had something to offer to the program.

NOT SHY OF CAMERAS

"I have never been conscious of working in front of cameras," she replied in answer to our question on the comparison of television and radio work. "Perhaps, it is because I have worked for a number of years with a live audience on the ABC Breakfast club."

However, Fran has learned that the television star finds her audience more often with her in off hours than is true of radio actresses. Dining out in the Chicago area, she is often approached by waiters carrying requests for confirmation of identity and autographs!

A native of Port City, Iowa, located near Waterloo, Fran broke into radio as a vocalist and appeared over WMT in Iowa for four years before coming to Chicago. Upon her arrival in Chicago, she joined Club Matinee and the Breakfast Club, leaving later to join the staff of CBS.

"AUNT FANNY" ON RADIO

She rejoined the Breakfast Club four years ago, during which time she has delighted listeners with the gossipy doings of "Aunt Fanny" and her neighbors. She created this character while in Iowa, and writes her own script for the role.

Since she joined the Junior Jamboree show, Fran, like Kukla and Ollie, has

Beacon Warns Aircraft

The highest stationary point in Chicago is the aircraft beacon perched atop WENR-TV's television antenna located above the roof of the Civic Opera building. Specifically, the light is located more than 154 feet above the building's roof.

The beacon, which rests three feet above the topmost bay of batwings on the antenna, is registered with Civic Aeronautics authority and in the future will be included on navigational charts as a reference point. The beacon contains two 500 watt electric light bulbs.

WGN-TV Announces Coverage Of Collegiate Football Games

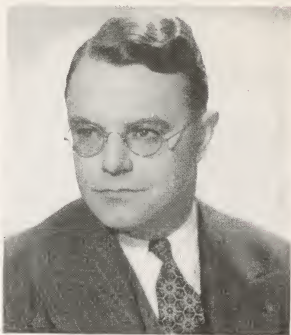
An eight-game schedule of collegiate football for WGN-TV viewers was announced by Jack Brickhouse, sports service manager of the station. The schedule, first of its kind to be announced in Chicago, will include impressive television coverage of four Illinois games from Champaign-Urbana plus four exclusive Northwestern grid telecasts from Dyche Stadium in Evanston. Veteran sportscaster Hal Totten will describe the games, with Bill O'Connor handling color.

The Illini contests include the season's opener against Kansas State on September 25; the Purdue game October 23; Iowa, November 6; and Ohio State, November 13. WGN-TV mobile equipment will be utilized in the Champaign-Urbana pickups, with microwave delay to Danville, and coaxial cable from Danville to the WGN-TV transmitter at the Daily News building. WGN-TV field director Don Cook will direct the cameras from the mobile unit.

The Northwestern games from Dyche Stadium in Evanston, which will also utilize the micro-wave relay equipment of the WGN-TV mobile unit, include the following opponents: Purdue, October 2; Minnesota, Oct. 9; Ohio State, October 30; and Illinois, November 20.

Hal Totten, sportscaster for the WGN-TV football telecasts, has a sports, newspaper and radio background paralleled by few. Hal was associated with the Chicago Daily News, and has appeared on virtually every major station and network in the midwest since his radio debut in 1924. He has the high regard of fellow sports broadcasters for his knowledge and delivery of sports events. In addition to his new television duties, Hal is farm director for WGN.

Bill O'Connor, WGN staff announcer who will do the color commentary, has done frequent sports events and sports reviews on WGN and other stations with which he was formerly associated.

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Meet Dinny Butts, Successful Young Career Girl in Video

Shopping—with Dinny—is a delightful and challenging career.

This talented miss, whose full name is Virginia Butts, conducts the mythical shopping tours through Chicago stores each weekday morning on WBKB's "Woman's World," as well as presenting three evening shows a week directed to career women and men shoppers.

Prettier and smaller in stature than she appears before the television cameras, Dinny was the epitome of the successful young career girl the morning we met her. She had just completed her show and an hour under the ceiling of lights in the WBKB studio, yet she presented a cool, poised picture.

Asked about her entry into television, Dinny replied "I came to seek a job be-

hind the scenes and ended up in front of the cameras."

This came about last April, when Dinny, a former public relations girl with a Chicago advertising firm, applied for a job in that field with WBKB. However, an interview with Director Lorraine Larson and a camera test landed her before the television cameras one day after "Woman's World" had debuted over the station.

"Merchandising is a completely new field to me," Dinny explained as we talked in an office of the studio, "but one which I find enjoyable. Determining the theme for each program, selecting the merchandise and then working out the final presentation for the video audience offers a challenge."

Telephotography Is Chicagoan's Hobby

A new hobby has come into the American scene: telephotography.

And William A. J. Dean of 5942 South Maplewood, Chicago, is probably the first hobbyist to devote so much time to this interesting pastime.

Since 1940 Dean has been taking snaps from the screen of his television set. The results have been so pleasing, he has become well known in the city for his photo collection of singers, baseball players, actors, even politicians.

"It is very simple," Dean says. "Anyone having a camera with an f6.3 lens or better, a portrait attachment lens and a tripod can get satisfactory pictures, using any make of fast film."

How It's Done

This is how it is done: The telereceiver is adjusted so that the contrast is at a minimum, and the brightness control as high as possible, without losing the picture. The pictures are taken at one-tenth of a second. As an added measure, Dean suggests, instruct the photo developing company to overdevelop the negative just a little.

Dean is not only an expert at photographing video programs, but an experienced designer of more than 300 different antenna combinations. "Ghostless reception," is the result. The Dean antenna is periodically checked by Dean himself who has installed a roof-to-living room communication system to aid him in tests.

Interested As Student

Eight years ago, Dean was one of 25 in Chicago owning a television receiver. His earlier sets have been passed on to friends he interested in the new medium.

While a student at Armour Tech, Dean became interested in television. That was in the early '20s. Before that, his favorite pastime was listening to home made crystal sets and receiving out-of-town stations on battery radios.

the titles of all films in advance so they can plan parties for guests. In a short time, it is hoped we can meet this request. At the present, films are often received by the stations only a few hours before show time, making it impossible for *Television Forecast* or the daily papers to list titles.

Revival pictures often times disappoint the hungry-for-new-film fans who probably don't realize the movie and tele industry are racing at breakneck speed to put out enough films to be shown daily.

Conflicting but interesting reports come from our readers regarding WTMJ-TV, the Milwaukee station on channel 3. The *Howard Hiss* family of Gary, Ind., receive the station as clearly as WGN-TV. And so do the T. W. Harrigans of 9609 South Hamilton, Chicago. However, reader W. L. Morrison of Winnetka cannot pick up a clear picture on channel 3, and says our "listing of WTMJ-TV programs is only confusing."

H. B. Sappington of Broadview, an avid televiewer, feels our magazine can be of a great service by criticizing poorly directed or poorly televised shows. This fall, *Television Forecast* will begin a weekly Critic's Column, pulling no punches where punches are due.

E. R. Feldott of Chicago and Emma Janda of Berwyn have expressed their views on the advertising our magazine contains. More articles on TV and less advertising is their request. Amplifying her remarks, Dinny explained that time on the program is sold by the Sales department at WBKB, who in turn arrange for her to meet with the advertiser. Through regular conferences with the advertiser, she learns what merchandise they are interested in displaying on the show and then selects the most suitable items for video presentation.

"My own particular favorites are the fashion shows," she added. And fans who have seen Dinny model sports clothes, tailored fashions, and luxurious fur coats would be quick to agree that they too find them "favorites".

NATIVE OF CHICAGO

Dinny, who is a native Chicagoan, lives on the south side of the city with her family. A graduate of the Chicago public high schools, she received her bachelor's degree in English literature in 1944 from the University of Chicago.

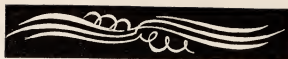
While at the University, Dinny was a member of the Sigma club and was active in the little theater group. It is also from her college days, that she retains her favoritism for the poetry of Robert Browning.

A code that in effect will govern the entire TV industry is being drafted, it was announced recently by TAP, news bulletin of Television Advertising Productions, Chicago. The code, due in December, will set ethical standards in programming, production and principles.

Blackhawks to Appear Again on WBKB

All home games of the Chicago Blackhawks hockey team will be televised by the Balaban and Katz pioneer station, it was announced jointly by William Tobin, president of the Blackhawks and John Mitchell, business manager of WBKB.

This will be the third consecutive year that WBKB has covered Blackhawk games. Joe Wilson, popular sports announcer who is regarded by reporters and coaches as one of the best announcers in the business will report the games again as he did last year. Wilson, who is doing baseball currently for WBKB and will do football this fall, has covered every major sport during his 11-year career in radio and television. He is considered particularly well qualified to do hockey, one of the hardest sports to report, since he played the game in his home town of Eveleth, Minnesota and has broadcast hockey for five years.

Through television, WBKB has introduced hockey to thousands of new fans in the midwest. Rough, fast and thrilling, the game requires expert camera work and supervision. The same veteran mobile unit crew will again be under the supervision of WBKB's Special Events Director, Reinald Werrenrath. Harry Birch, one of the country's outstanding newsreel and television camera men, will again supervise cameras. Remote engineering crew will be headed by Dick Shapiro and remote directors, Dick Liesendahl and Joe Byrnes will cut the show.

Estimate Year's Output

Looking ahead to the rapidly increasing demand for television receivers, Philco estimates that the total industry's output for this year will be about 700,000.

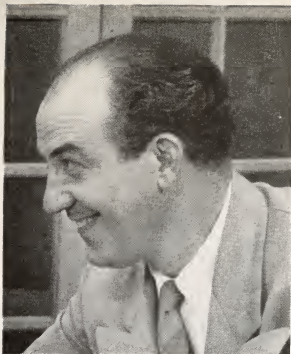
