Editor's Report: A Challenge to New York

Eastern television people would like the country to believe that New York is the television center of the nation. It isn't, and we are hereby issuing a challenge for anyone to disprove the following statement—

Chicago, strategic hub of a vast mid-west network formed through the modern miracles of electronics, with four stations now operating, offers the biggest slice of video entertainment to date. And there are promises of more coming before Christmas!

New York will have to step fast to match the spirit of TV here, unless our observations are wrong. Plus this spirit is the swelling list of new telereceivers being produced by major firms here, displayed here, and sold here.

Linking Chicago with Detroit, Indiana, Cleveland, Toledo, Milwaukee, St. Louis and Buffalo also put the metropolis far ahead of the Boston to Richmond network. Reviews of their programs offer ample proof.

In the midst of all this scrambling for top honors, we predict spectacular things happening in Chicago before Santa Claus makes his visit, things that may happen with little advance notice, all of which will keep New York studios, advertising departments and trade people jumping to keep from falling too far behind.

Recently the Federal Communications Commission temporarily froze action on all applications for new TV stations as a breather during which time the industry as well as the FCC can look over the TV picture.

To clear up questions in the minds of some readers, the FCC move does not curtail construction of any new television stations now under construction, and manufacturers of equipment are continuing to supply millions of prospective set owners with all types of receivers. Video programs will continually be added.

The FCC assured representatives of this magazine that the prospective set owner could go ahead with a purchase of a TV set with confidence. They are now in the process of improving the

present service, and perhaps obtaining a larger service area for stations.

TV SNOOPINGS: A visit to the 42nd floor of the Opera Building where WNBQ has installed their equipment reveals a giant 5,000 watt RCA transmitter, engineering office, workshop and store rooms . . . WNBQ, operating on channel 5, radiates power of 2.8 kws. Its RCA super-turnstile, four-bay antenna mat weighs nearly 3,800 pounds. . . Studio A of the new NBC station is located in the network's Merchandise Mart headquarters. . . Reports from Hollywood show Bing Crosby and brother, Everett, have taken steps to launch a regional TV network in the Pacific Northwest. . . Make a date to stay up late November 2: TV will flash you a fireside picture of the next President of the United States!

Hockey Games Begin Oct. 28

Chicago's pioneer station, WBKB kicks off its third season of hockey when it brings the home games of the Chicago Blackhawks starting Thursday, October 28. Thirty home games this year await hockey addicts and the Blackhawks, considerably improved, will be out to avenge the defeats they sustained last year when they finished far down in the league standings.

In addition to thirty home games, WBKB will cover the All-Star game November 3 against the league champion Toronto Maple Leafs. The All-Star team is expected to include several members of the Blackhawks.

Joe Wilson, who has telecast the two previous seasons for WBKB, will again give the play-by-play description of the games. Dick Liesendahl and Joe Byrne will cut the shows, Harry Birch will supervise cameras and the engineering crew will again be headed by Dick Shapiro.

World-Wide TV Market Viewed

Formation of International Division, Admiral Corporation, to handle the marketing activities of Admiral products outside the continental United States and Canada was recently announced by Ross D. Siragusa, president of Admiral.

"The dollar shortage in most foreign countries today has sharply curtailed exports of major appliances," Mr. Siragusa stated, "and for the first four months of this year total American exports of radios, radio tubes, electric ranges and electric household refrigerators were only \$33,000,000. But with the advent of a buyer's market the sales function must be restored to its pre-war importance—the very reason for setting up a direct international division."

Introduce Small TV Set

Less current than is used by two 100-watt bulbs will be all the electricity necessary to operate a television receiver now being introduced by a Chicago TV firm. Engineers say it will be a table model, designed with an eye towards economy and the budget.

WNBQ Adds New Tele-Personnel

Reinald Werrenrath, Jr., recognized in the television field as a director of special events, recently joined the staff of WNBQ as director of field operations, it was announced by Jules Herbuveaux, manager of NBC's Central Division television operations.

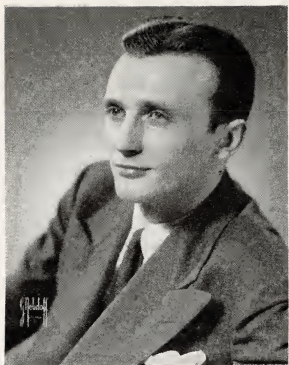
Werrenrath's career in television dates from the time when he joined NBC at New York in 1936. After an architectural course at Cornell, he followed the familiar NBC training route via the guide staff, later transferring to the company's television department where he became a lighting and special effects technician.

In 1940, he joined WBKB television in Chicago as assistant to the director of television. He entered the Navy in 1942 as combat information and radar officer aboard a carrier in the Pacific, returning to his former post at WBKB in 1945. Since that time he has been closely identified with the station's special events programming.

Werrenrath's name heads a list of appointments announced by Herbuveaux and H. C. Luttgens, NBC Central Division chief engineer. Included were Isabelle Cooney, as program procurement director, and five engineering department aides who will be rated as television students. These include Eugene M. Cartwright, Gene L. Lukowski, Robert G. Rahnert and Fred W. Rodey, all of whom were transferred from NBC's AM operations, and Herbert W. Dover, Jr., a new employee. Clark P. Lonie was transferred from AM engineering to television engineering at the WNBQ transmitter.

The program has gained wide recognition for producing such famous names as Mel Torme, Gloria Hart, Jerry Scott, Artie Wayne and many others.

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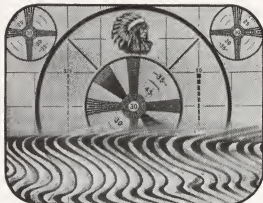

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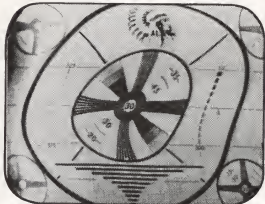

The Chicago Bears Quarterback Show which weekly will present filmed highlights of the regular league games to be played this season by the Chicago Bears of the National Football League will be telecast over Station WENR-TV, Tuesdays at 8:30 to 9 p.m., it was announced today by Harold Stokes, program manager. The first program in the series will be shown Tuesday, Oct. 5.

The programs will resemble, in detail, the secret post-game sessions held regularly by the team. Films will be presented with live commentaries by one of the Bears' Coaches, George Halas, Hunk Anderson, Luke Johnsos, or Paddy Driscoll. Outstanding players featured in the films also will be presented in interview sessions. Highlights of the games—both the faults and the successes—will be discussed and analyzed each week.

It is anticipated that the program will hold instructional as well as entertainment value and will show the television audiences how to watch the game with expert eyes. For purposes of clarity in demonstration, the films will be shown in slow motion as well as at normal speeds.

The Chicago Bears, one of the nation's leading football teams, have seven times thundered to world championships.

"Missing Persons" New WGN-TV Show

"Key to Missing Persons," a new video series now running on WGN-TV, stars Archdale J. Jones, expert in the work of re-uniting people long separated. Originating in New York, the show is found on channel 9 from 6:00 to 6:30 p.m. Sundays.

"Every year about 200,000 people in the U.S. disappear," Jones told a reporter of this magazine. "Through video we expect to locate many of these people and reunite them with their families."

According to Jones, "People often don't have the funds necessary to hire private investigators to search for the missing persons, and although they have the facts to conduct a search, they don't understand the techniques and they don't know how to go about finding the lost ones."

Jones has been outstandingly successful in his searches: 68 percent of those he set out to find he has eventually found.

FCC Answers TV Set Owners

PART II

If you live within the normal (20 to 40 mile maximum) service range of a television station, it should be possible for you to receive satisfactory interference-free television pictures. However, even within this range, good service can be expected only with a properly functioning television receiver, an adequate receiving antenna, and a satisfactory transmission line connecting your antenna and receiver.

The reason for this is that television requires a relatively stronger signal for good reception than does AM or FM radio, and your receiver, transmission line and receiving antenna are important factors in making sure that a strong signal is picked up out of the air, and that "unwanted" signals are rejected by the receiver.

Interference Problems—Television receivers may be subject to interference (1) from television stations other than the "desired" stations; (2) from other radio stations; (3) from electrical disturbances caused by medical diathermy machines, industrial heating appliances, etc.; (4) from other television receivers in the vicinity; and (5) ignition systems of motor vehicles. The last is a particularly common source of interference.

Properly qualified technicians ordinarily can reduce or eliminate objectionable interference. If the interference is caused by a station or device operating on a different frequency from that of the "desired" television station, the "undesired" signal frequency may be "tuned out" by a device attached to the television receiver. This may be done by applying a "trap-circuit" to the receiver antenna terminals.

Trap-circuits are tuned transmission lines cut for the frequency of the "undesired" signal. In case of interference from international short-wave broadcast stations and point-to-point telegraph stations, it is more practical to construct a coil-condenser "trap-circuit" to reject the "undesired" signal.

If the interference is caused by a station or device operating on the same frequency as your receiver, the interference cannot be easily avoided. However, the use of a directional receiving antenna may be of some benefit.

Interference from other television receivers in the vicinity of your receiver also may distort the picture or sound you receive. This usually occurs in apartment houses where two or more receivers are in close proximity. It may occur when your neighbor's receiver is tuned to one of the lower numbered television channels (such as channel 2 or 3) and your receiver is tuned to one of the higher channels (such as channel 5 or 6). This type of interference is due to deficiencies in receiver design.

Certain kinds of interference cannot be eliminated. In particular, if you live outside the maximum service range of two television stations operating on the same frequency at a point where signals of equal strength are received from both stations, your receiver will receive either a distorted picture or garbled sound or both. This type of interference cannot be eliminated, since it is due to the fact that you are outside the service area of the stations involved. However, the Commission in assigning television stations makes every effort possible to avoid interference of this kind.

Any good television servicing agency should be in a position to determine sources of television reception trouble, provide devices or adjustments to improve reception and to explain their operation.

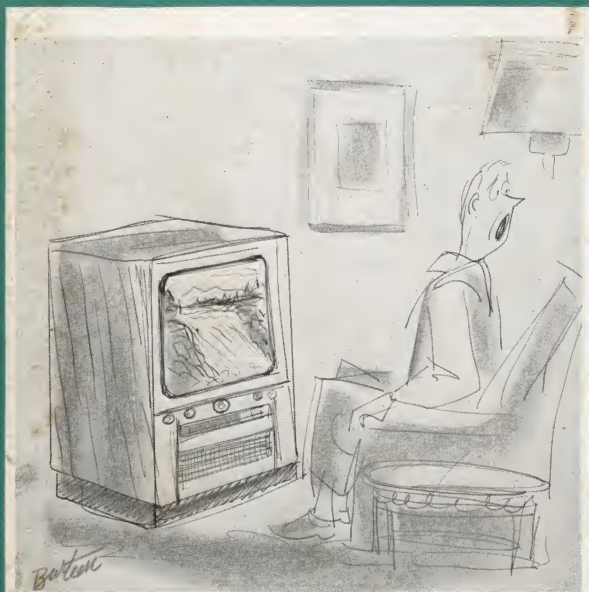
