EDITOR'S REPORT: WNBQ TeleDebut Unique

Channel 5—unpredictable as Chicago weather—has surprised thousands of television fans with its recent unique, unscheduled World Series debut, and from all reports will capture the spotlight Tuesday, November 2, when it joins NBC's eastern network to present Presidential election returns!

In an election night TV coverage from Buffalo to Chicago to St. Louis, WNBQ will present commentators Alex Dreier of Chicago, Robert McCormick of Washington and Ed Wallace of Cleveland in a running account of what looks like the most exciting night in 1948 history.

To keep Chicago abreast of election developments, special lines are being installed by WNBQ, together with visual aids, films and charts.

Hundreds of complimentary letters praising past unofficial WNBQ telecasts and their clear test pattern have been received both by station and this news-magazine, and we are happy to salute the entry of Station No. 4 in the nation's No. 1 Television City.

A visit to Studio "A," largest in the Merchandise Mart, thrilled reporters of *Television Forecast* assigned to cover the conversion of an NBC broadcasting studio into WNBQ's modern television center. In addition to this space, WNBQ has leased an additional 20,000 square feet to be used for station work shops and engineering offices.

Chicago's skyline has taken on a new look—the Electronic Look as a fourth TV antenna breaks the blackness of night. High over the Civic Opera building, scene of WNBQ's transmission facilities, the Channel 5 mast points out the achievement of an industry anxious to serve the nation.

So, keep your eye on Channel 5. Watch for its many surprises in new network shows, all to be reported for you by the editors of *Television Forecast*.

TV Topics: The use of TV by the Navy in actual combat and intelligence work was forecast by WNBQ and NBC officials who coordinated a television high speed air and sea maneuvers off

the New York coast only recently. . . . Said Rear Adm. James Fife, Jr., USN, commander of submarines, Atlantic fleet: "The implications are tremendous. Visual communications between submarines in enemy harbors and bombers attacking those harbors; target data supplied from the periscope of one submarine of an attacking wolf pack to the others of the same pack which need not surface for their attacks—these and limitless other uses for TV in naval warfare were shown by this demonstration." . . . Much progress has been made from the Navy's first TV experiment from a submerged submarine a year ago . . . It is giving the American public a unique opportunity to see their Navy in action . . .

What is the "Television Fund," just organized in Chicago? Details will be published next week in a special article.

The Junior League Follies is a musical and variety review featuring amateur talent and will be presented Nov. 9, 11 and 12 at the Eighth Street theater, with proceeds for the benefit of the League Consultation Clinic for Epilepsy.

Several of the show's highlights will be introduced by Dorsey on her Wednesday night program. Prominent in the cast will be Mrs. C. Nicholas Johnson, known to theater-goers as Marcy Wescott before she retired to married life. Mrs. Johnson had important leads in the Chicago companies of "My Sister Eileen" and "Too Many Girls."

Plan Elaborate Election Remotes

WBKB, channel 4 station, announces elaborate election eve TV coverage for Chicago viewers Nov. 2, coordinating their activities with the Chicago Sun-Times newspaper. Remote telecasts in the city room of the Sun-Times will reveal newspaper men feverishly working to beat deadlines in giving the nation up-to-the-minute news on the Dewey-Truman, Green-Stevenson races.

WBKB cameramen will race over to the local headquarters of candidates running for office and shoot candid scenes as early return are flashed on the channel 9 screen.

A major portion of the time that evening will be devoted to election news, WBKB officials pointed out. Man on the street TV shows will be conducted, and staff members will conduct analyses of the voting done in the midwest.

Ed Roberts Tells of Family, Past TV Experiences

Certain veterans of television have one common characteristic: at the drop of a maraschino cherry they will set down their manhattans and talk for hours about their careers.

Ed Roberts, WBKB star, isn't one of that tribe. But he will gladly beat your eardrums for hours at a time on a subject that is much dearer to him: his wife and two children.



Known as the "famieliest man in radio," Ed and his missus are so engrossed in their two kiddies that, this year, they refused to take a full-fledged vacation because they did not want to be away from their two children, Jimmy, 4½ and Kathy, 1½, for more than a few days at a time. Instead, they packed their bags, moved into a Loop hotel and spent a week catching up on shows and films they had wanted to see. While gone, Ed's brother, Howard Roberts, doubled in brass for the tall, genial announcer.

Ed Roberts is a veteran of sixteen years on the kilocycles. He began in the Atwater Kent era, 1921, with an act known as the Spax Brothers. Others in that little group have since done quite well for themselves. One is Jim

Wolters on TV

Since the name of this magazine is *Television Forecast* possibly a little crystal gazing is in order. (If our prognostication is not borne out, well, what of the weather man? He misses sometimes, too.)

Wayne Coy, the chairman of the federal communications commission, asserted recently

that television will be the greatest communication medium of them all and that it will transform American life. Every television family will agree with that. Coy also stated that ultimately all

American homes—some 38 million of them—will have television sets. Well, I don't know that every American home will have a teleset, since every home doesn't yet have a radio. But most of them certainly will. And I believe that television will have a profound effect—a revolutionary effect on our way of life.

We've had a television set for two years. It's changed the pattern of our life considerably. For one thing television takes complete precedence over radio. As a critic I follow radio rather carefully, but I'm often dispatched to the den or the bedroom so I don't interfere with video viewing. But only the favorite radio shows have enough pull to lure the rest of the family away from television. Even dinner takes second place to a good television show. Many a video family will tell you that lots of meals are eaten off plates in front of the teleset.

TV Not Novelty

Now, some people suggest this television attraction will wear off. "It's just the novelty," they say. A novelty after two years? I don't think so. I would say that the magnetism of television, now that three stations are on the air in Chicago, is just about three times as great as it was two years ago.

Actually, I believe the pulling power of television will increase as better studio shows are developed and as movies specially produced for television arrive in quantity. And that day is not far off.

If local television attractions can build the kind of loyal following they have in Chicago, I believe the pull will be still greater when live network features from the east coast and such history-in-the-making events as the President addressing joint session of Congress, are available. And that will happen next year, I am confident. In fact, I think you may look forward to seeing the next Presidential inaugural in January.

Television will become a great new educational aid. Movies have bolstered educational techniques but television will be even more effective. Movies eliminate the distance factor, television wipes out both distance and time, since it lets you see the news as it happens.

Interrupts Study

Incidentally, many parents report that television poses problems, too, for

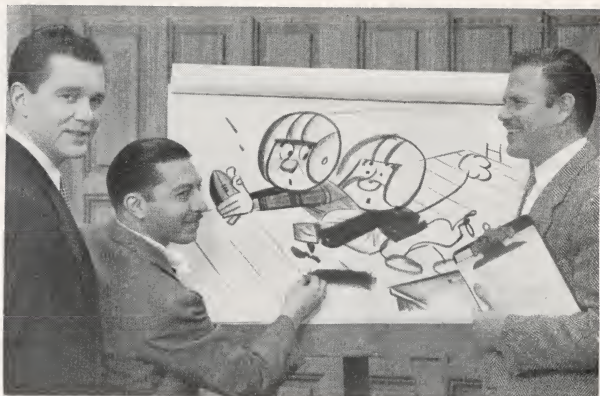

Cameras to Invade City News Room

Up-to-the-minute election returns, starting at 7 p.m., will be flashed to WGN-TV televiewers direct from the local room of the Chicago Tribune Tuesday, November 2. Cameras placed around the Tribune news editor's desks will present a picture which will closely parallel the typical conception of organized chaos in a newspaper office—this year's election promising to approach an all-time high in national and state interest.

The nationally famous political writers of the Tribune staff, including Arthur Sears Henning, chief of the Tribune's Washington bureau, George Tagge and Arthur Evans, will present last-minute bulletins to televiewers on the presidential, senatorial and gubernatorial races from correspondents and news sources all over the nation. The programs will be directed by WGN-TV's news chief, Spencer Allen, who also will be seen and heard throughout the evening giving election returns and news. WGN-TV's newsreel camera crews will

also be used to provide coverage of the election day events.

The returns will continue until conclusive results are reached in the major races. The regular schedule of Tuesday programs will be interrupted as the election news warrants.

Predict Video Use by Medical School

Use of video as an important educational aid in surgery for colleges, universities and hospitals was predicted this week by eastern medical experts attending an RCA demonstration.

A typical demonstration consisted of a camera suspended directly above an operating table. The image was carried via coaxial cable to receivers located in university halls and microwaved to a convention hall where it was picked up on a large screen and two receivers.

Minimum equipment necessary, TV officials pointed out, for satisfactory televising would cost about \$20,000 and would consist of a camera, control panel and receiver.

Life-Size Pictures Perfected by RCA

Life-size television pictures for hotels, clubs, amusement places, hospitals, churches, schools, and industry became available recently with announcement of the first commercial equipment designed for presentation of television programs to large audiences.

Possessed of the added brilliance and clarity obtained with reflective optical systems, as compared with those employing refractive optics, the pictures produced by the new projector may be tailored to suit screen sizes ranging from 3 by 4 feet to approximately 7 by 9 feet.

Developed by RCA the projector (Model TLS-86) is now in quantity production, and initial distribution has begun in areas served by the television networks.

ABC Plans Studio at LA

From WENR-TV comes word of ABC activities in Hollywood where purchase of the 20-acre Vitagraph motion picture lot was made from Warner Brothers. The property will be used for ABC's new TV center in California.

To be known as KECA-TV, Los Angeles, the new station will be in operation before the end of this year.

the kids, especially high schoolers who are expected to study week nights. Video stations already have fallen into the habit of scheduling their most potent teen-age bait, including mystery thrillers, during the after dinner study hours. If you've got a high schooler in the family, television is likely to make his grades suffer. But perhaps what they learn by looking out on the world through the video window in some measure compensates for the geometry theorems they fail to master.

Television, it seems to me, sharpens the appetite for sports. While I don't think that a television set owner will rush out to see a football game in a blizzard, I have observed that video families tend to go to baseball parks and other sports arenas more often than they did before TV.

I don't think it follows that people by the tens of thousands will shell out \$50 to see a championship boxing match if they can see it free (and better) at home.

The future may bring us big sporting events piped by video into theaters where the box office can be expanded rather than diminished.

As everybody knows most video families tend to go to the movies less than they did before they had sets. How can the movies fight this tendency? Better movies would help. Possibly the theater men will have to embrace television and give their audiences big attractions, special events as they happen, as video does.

Won't Replace Radio

Does television mean the end of radio? I don't believe so. For one thing, television requires constant attention. The average television family, or some member of it, finds time to watch the screen between two and three hours a day. The radio listening period is about twice that since fans can listen while they work. (School children insist they can study while listening to radio, but they can't while watching video.)

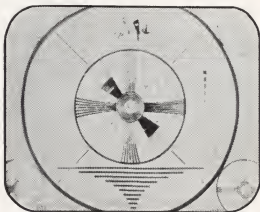

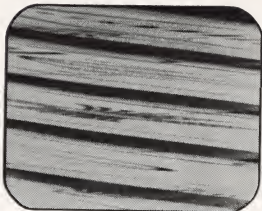

In all likelihood the trend toward presenting radio shows simultaneously on television (or on film later) will mushroom. But the shows will have to be produced with viewers in mind. Audience participation shows, quizzes and public discussions can make the transition to video easily. Speakers will have to learn their talks by heart, hide the script, or speak extemporaneously.

When the big variety shows move over to television—and I think most of them will as soon as networks are available—scripts will largely disappear. And probably, in order to insure no mental lapses by performers before the cameras, many shows will be filmed and then telecast.

This ends today's venture into prophecy, except this: Television will bring many changes. One that is all on the plus side: It will bring the family together practically every evening in the living room. The teleset may yet replace the fireplace and the hearthstone.
