EDITOR'S REPORT: Stratovision for Millions

The imagination of a 30 year old engineer, Charles Edward Noble, may ultimately result in television programs for more than 78 percent of the country's population! The shows would be transmitted from airplanes six miles up—in the lower stratosphere.

"Stratovision" is the term Noble applies to his system. And Stratovision is not just a vision, but a reality, tested and found so satisfactory that TV experts are busy at work ironing out technical problems.

This is how Stratovision works: the system puts the antenna and transmitter in an airplane flying in lazy circles at about 30,000 feet above the earth—out of range of the human eye. Like a giant inverted ice-cream cone, the short waves sent from this airborne antenna blanket the earth's surface, covering four or five states.

It is not too fantastic to believe that ultimately Stratovision may do away with the need of costly relay and transmission towers, as well as coast-to-coast coaxial cables. To do this would require 14 giant planes covering 51 percent of the country's area.

Chicago electronic workers and students have noted that before nationwide Stratovision can be made available commercially, special lightweight video and FM equipment must be designed. Limitations, they point out, include the speed of the airplane. A plane must fly at a minimum of 225 miles per hour, making it difficult for the pilot to keep the ship in a tight circle, hovering over a given area. Below 225

miles an hour, at high altitudes, the plane's engines overheat.

Fuel consumption of the airship also limits the time the plane can remain on station programs. Nobel, in his experiments, used a converted B29 bomber which carried enough fuel, plus reserves, for six hours of flight. Half of the time, however, is used to ascend and descend.

But Stratovision is out of the slide-rule stage and Chicago telereceivers may some day soon be entertained by programs from the sky.

According to the latest figures available by the editors of this magazine, 11,300 pounds of equipment is needed to receive and transmit both FM and TV signals from an airplane. That's quite an assignment for a plane which must also carry a crew.

The moppets do their little bit, then are paraded around the studio and presented with individual gifts. Complete informality is the keynote of the show. Balloons, pop, children chatter and frequently wander out of camera range. On a recent show, director Ed Roden stayed with a camera that followed a child who crawled under a chair, out the other side, under another, and finally came back through Clara Clown's legs. Don Ward, popular radio personality and a father himself, is master of ceremonies.

"Kiddies Parade" has its educational side, also. Each week Miss Johanna Kraut, staff member of the Chicago Psychological institute, gives a short talk on common problems in child-raising.
