Government Controls TV in Russia

Reports on television outside the U.S.A. seldom appear in our daily metropolitan newspapers, as interesting as they may be. For this reason, we've postponed discussion of domestic video networks, problems, and progress and are devoting this page to news of TV in Russia and South America.

The story of television in Russia is a story of state-controlled video. Like all other mass communications, Russian political officials direct all operations and show only sympathy to the Communist regime now in power. A special commission which has the status of a ministry heads television, even though there are relatively few telereceivers in the Union.

To date, Russia has two stations operating: Moscow and Leningrad. Our European correspondent reports others under construction at Kiev and Sverdlov.

Nowhere in Russia is there a group like our Federal Communications Commission (FCC) designed to protect the public through regulations which have the interest of American citizens at heart, to preserve TV and freedom of speech.

Instead stations are on the air four times a week, whenever the supreme USSR office grants such time. However, Communists are quick to recognize the potentialities of video for spreading propaganda and are busy at work planning for expansion with the Soviet boundaries. No news on video in Russian-controlled satellites is available at present, but we have told our European correspondent an eager American audience awaits his reports.

What are the programs on Russian-controlled TV stations? For the most part Russians see ballet, plays and opera. This is occasionally supplemented by films.

Where are the telereceivers? They're found in clubs, offices and factories, or as they are called in the USSR, "homes of culture," gathering places approved by the government.

Are the Russians developing any new

models? Yes, Vladimir Kornienko, a young Moscow engineer, has recently completed a new video set and with the aid of the Russian Radio club is instructing amateurs to build their own receivers.

IN BRAZIL interest in television has reached the point where plans for two commercial video stations have been completed and when equipment arrives citizens of Rio de Janeiro will witness full programming.

Recently a TV demonstration was staged by PRL-8, Radio Nacional, a local outlet owned by a union of newspapers and magazines. Known as "A Noite," the outlet chose a Rio department store to exhibit electronic advancements.

Businessmen who are readers of this magazine will be interested to know that the U.S.A. and Great Britain will benefit by this new industry, for they will be expected to supply a major part of the tele-equipment.

Wrestling is Old Story to Griffin

Wayne Griffin of WENR-TV has this to say about wrestling: "It's a great sport, and I like it—but whenever I see a pretzel I expect to hear it groan."

Griffin, who is 32, might have been an electrical engineer if radio hadn't interested him so, and now he's engrossed in television, after 12 years of announcing and station management.

Now heard on the channel 7 wrestling matches from Rainbow Arena, Griffin as far back as 1936 announced at grunt and groan affairs. Then it was not uncommon to see women wrestlers, or mud wrestling. Griffin described hundreds of matches for a Minneapolis station, yet suffered only one mishap—he was hit in the face with a misplaced blob of mud from the hands of an over enthusiastic wrestler.

In 1942, Griffin joined ABC (then the Blue network) and was announcer on the Victory Parade of Spotlight Bands, travelling more than 800,000 miles in the vanguard of the show, arranging broadcasts from various army posts throughout the nation.

Bears vs. Cardinals

Television fans in the Chicago area will get their first opportunity to see the Chicago Bears professional football team in action on Sunday, December 12, when they will meet the Chicago Cardinals in Wrigley field, *Television Forecast* learned today.

West Coast TV on Upgrade

"What kind of television programming can I expect in the west," writes one Chicago reader who finds himself suddenly leaving this city for business reasons.

TV fans going west may be assured of a strong, growing television network, especially in the Los Angeles, Calif., region. Reports from west coast station owners indicate that TV stations will be erected in San Francisco, and Seattle, Wash., early next year.

KPIX will be the first station in San Francisco, followed by KGO-TV, an ABC affiliate, and then KRON-TV, all to take place within two or three months, a record in the electronic industry. It is believed that because of the expected new stations dealers will be unable to supply a sufficient quantity of receivers to purchasers.

Because of the current nation-wide FCC freeze, Seattle will gain only one station, KRSC-TV who had been granted a building permit before the issuance was halted. At present, there are about 1,000 sets in Seattle.

Here he started his career by going into the act at the age of seven. When he grew too big for the high trapeze rigging he went into publicity for the circus. Later he played in the legitimate theatre in New York. He then switched to opera, spending a season with the St. Louis Municipal Opera Company, and one season with the San Francisco Grand Opera company.

Davis then got the radio bug. He and two others barnstormed the country building and installing radio station transmitters, after which he went into radio acting and announcing on the west coast for NBC. Later Russ moved back to the middle-west and started his own radio show sales business. In 1940 he joined the WBBM-CBS staff in Chicago as a member of the news staff.

In 1946 he turned to TV and WBKB. Since then he has been seen and heard regularly on boxing, wrestling, and a great number of TV features that WBKB has presented.

Russ is married to a charming Swedish girl Sylvia, who is also interested in television to the extent of organizing an agency to produce and sell television shows and spot announcements.
