NEW PROGRAM!

As a Service to Our Readers

We agree, sudden changes in television programs can be disappointing to the vast video audience of Chicago and suburbs.

To provide our readers with more accurate listings the publishers of *Television Forecast* have inaugurated a new program. Each Monday and Friday, at 4:40 p.m. on radio station WCFL, 1000 on your dial, up-to-date changes will be announced so that proper entries may be made in your copy of Chicago's exclusive television news magazine.

Perhaps you are wondering why television people have chosen the medium of radio to announce these changes. The answer is this: for the time being, TV stations are not agreeable to telecasting program changes for all stations because competitive stations will be mentioned on their facilities. We have sought to purchase such time, but have been refused.

It is a bit of a handicap, but understandable, and until a better working arrangement can be made *Television Forecast* will conduct its special radio show to prove our earnest desire to provide telereceivers with the most accurate listing of any city in the nation!

We have every bit of confidence in the belief that in a short time Chicago video stations will have more permanent programs. They are striving to meet the wishes of set owners who want to know titles of film features and special events, so that TV parties can be arranged in advance.

Nothing is more fun than a television party in your home, and nothing more provoking or sometimes embarrassing than a sudden program change. We have experienced it, and we know you have, too.

Thank you so much for your understanding letters on this subject. They have all been read and appreciated. Rather than write each reader individually, we are herewith publishing this open letter to you and further inviting you to continue writing the Editor with

suggestions and criticisms of video entertainment now being offered.

WHAT ABOUT TOMORROW? What new stations can telereceivers in Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin and Michigan expect? As you know, the F. C. C. originally allocated 13 channels over the nation, distributing seven channels to Chicago. Later it became necessary to reduce the total number of channels from 13 to 12, together with the proposal that Chicago's share of seven be reduced to six. A decision on this proposal has not yet been reached; in the meantime, the F.C.C. is studying that national television situation. And while that study is being made, action on pending applications for stations is being deferred.

There are five applications for the remaining channel in Chicagoland: the Columbia Broadcasting system, Warner Brothers, the Sun-Times company, Zenith Radio, and Johnson-Kennedy Radio corporation.

NATIONWIDE there are 45 stations in operation to date. Seventy-seven other applicants have permits to construct stations.

Ford Theater Becomes WGN-TV Show via CBS

It may be a little confusing, but Ford Theater drama productions, seen of late on WBKB, will soon become property of WGN-TV, channel 9. The switchover is due to the recent merger of CBS facilities on WGN-TV.

Last October, Ford Theater introduced a one hour drama series on the CBS radio network with Fletcher Markle as director and Vincent McConnor as script editor. The television productions, however, will be the work of an entirely separate unit.

Plays will have leading Broadway and Hollywood artists in the major roles. They are scheduled at monthly intervals, and will be accelerated in 1949 to meet the needs of video's growing national audience.

WBKB Introduces News by AP Tape

For the past week during the "Funny Business" half hour on WBKB, from 5:30 to 6:00 p.m., the news has been telecast by a special Associated Press tape printer. This printer is the first one of its kind to be seen on Chicago television, another WBKB "first."

The five minute newscast is video only. The tape, which is edited immediately before air time, is drawn across the screen by a mechanical device and shows the tape as it comes from the AP with the exception of certain code letters.

In the event of important news a program will not be interrupted but a bell will ring and the news flash will be shown on the tape.

Philadelphia Sets Increase

The number of TV receivers in the Philadelphia area is nearing the 100,000 mark, according to reports received this week. Philadelphians are served by WFIL-TV and WCAU-TV.

WGN-TV Film Used To Train Firemen

A four-minute film account of the recent Branch factory explosion and fire made by a member of the WGN-TV newsreel staff is being used as part of the training program for firemen candidates, according to Chief Fire Marshall Anthony J. Mullaney of the Chicago fire department.

This event was a newsreel scoop for WGN-TV cameraman Charles Geckler, who was aroused from sleep the night of the fire by the sound of fire sirens and rushed to the scene of the disaster. His picture of the scene included a shot of firemen removing the injured and fighting the blaze, as well as pictures of the victims as they were carried to St. Anne's hospital.

According to Chief Mullaney, the pictures serve as an illustration of the work done by the fire department in such emergencies. They are being used by drillmaster James Furlong, of the Chicago Fire Department college, in training candidates.

Manny Opper Sparks New Show

Born and raised in Chicago, Opper (rhymes with doper) began in show business many years ago as a radio script writer, and claims that material he wrote during those early days is still being used on radio today.

Currently in his 83rd week in a loop show lounge, Opper recently signed a new long-term contract guaranteeing his stay here until next summer, thereby giving him one of the longest runs of any comedian.

Opper is married and has an eight-year-old son.

Television and Theatre Are Alike, Yet Different Says Monte Fassnacht

Television and theatre? Basically, alike, they have radical differences, says Monte Fassnacht, who should know. Currently production manager for WENR-TV, he has been as intimately tied to show business for the past decade as opening nights and curtain calls. According to Monte, he took his first exercise swinging on traveler lines of theatrical curtains and has been present backstage when the dimmer handles were pulled for many of Chicago's greatest theatrical and operatic enterprises.

A native Chicagoan, he first became associated with the stage in high school. Hanging around the stage entrance of the Olympic theatre (now the Apollo), on Randolph street, Monte says he "became such a nuisance that the manager, in a fit of despair, hired him as assistant property manager."

In the years that followed he rubbed stage directions with such notable personalities as Ernest Truex, the Barrymores (Ethel, John and Lionel), the Dolly Sisters, and countless others. His memory regarding the plays with which he was involved during those early years is a near-blank. For no reason at all, the one major production he recalls from that era is "So Long, Letty" with Charlotte Greenwood.

N. U. Graduate

He was employed at the Garrick theatre (now a motion picture house) and the Colonial theatre (now the Oriental). His stage hand employment backed his education at Northwestern university and from that institution he received a degree in engineering although he didn't pursue the profession. In addition to his sheepskin he had acquired a wife and the theatre seemed to provide more lucre than stadium rods and T-squares.

On graduation he was employed at Chicago's famed Auditorium on Michigan boulevard where he worked in turn as carpenter, electrician, and property man for the Chicago Civic Opera company, which later moved to 20 N. Wacker drive. He became technical director of the company in 1938.

He has performed hundreds of major lighting jobs—Rodzinski's fabulous production of "Tristam" in Chicago last year; the "Wheels A-Rolling" pageant at the recent Railroad Fair and countless theatrical productions. He was also lighting director for several of Burton Holmes' motion picture productions.

As production manager for WENR-TV, Monte has multiple duties. He is in charge of lighting, property, sets, scenery, make-up, costumes, etc., for all television productions for the station and all Chicago-originated programs for the entire mid-West TV network of ABC.

Costuming and scenery production for the theatre and for television are practically identical, according to Fassnacht. The greatest difference between the two lies in lighting and color. In TV, illumination must be from three to five times as great as in the theatre. Because a television tube reproduces only two dimensions, lighting can be employed to give an illusion of depth which is not otherwise discernible.

In the theatre most lights are stationary and in video the lights are in an almost constant state of change and adjustment. In a similar light, to speak punwise, one set of TV tubes will require two hundred and fifty foot candlepower for a "picture" which is acceptable to the engineers for telecasting. Other tubes at times require five to six hundred candlepower. In television, "model lighting" is more difficult since it takes a high candlepower to penetrate the overall lighting.
