Mr. Mowery only last week wrote us a letter indicating his interest in the progress of television. Like a lot of fans, he is champing at the bit to see what TV has in store for the fall months, with the addition of WNBQ and WENR-TV scheduled for September.

Mr. and Mrs. V. Raymond Kruse of Woodstock are able to receive not only WGN-TV and WBKB but WTMJ-TV televised from Milwaukee. Because a great number of people residing on the north shore of Chicago in the extreme sections of Cook and Lake counties, also watch this station, we are adding WTMJ-TV to the schedule of programs.

The Kruse family, in a letter we received recently, told us about their two year old son who constantly carried about an earlier issue of *Television Forecast* picturing Kukla and Ollie on the cover. The youngster was so devoted to Ollie he wore off the print, and now he is plenty disappointed because he has

no picture of his favorite TV entertainer. So, we are rushing a back copy of this issue to the Kruse family who promise us "this time we intend to frame it."

The late FDR's talk, carried by all four networks and most independent stations, rated 79.



Part II: Lorraine Larson Recalls Early Days of Television

Few WBKB fans remember Joe Wilson as an actor, but Loraine Larson does. "He played the lover boy in "Marriage Proposal," she recalls. "He was dressed in a stiff, formidable tuxedo. Every time he leaned forward to say in a tender, romantic voice, 'Dearest, I love you!' the front of his tux popped open, revealing Joe in all his hirsute splendor.

"After three attempts, Joe sat far back in his chair and said the line rather pathetically, while he clutched the front of his tux with both hands."

Realism Played Part

The most memorable occasion of all, however, was the time Karl Kronke, a Chicago radio actor, came perilously near to making the supreme sacrifice for his art. They believed in realism back in those days, Loraine recalls. Kronke was to die a horrible death after drinking poison in a tragic play. The prop list called for formaldehyde so Felice Carrigan, ably assisted by Esther Rajewski, went up to the film lab and got the real stuff. To this day they both insist they had no idea Karl was going to drink it. But he did, and he fell to the floor, gasping and groaning. Beulah Zachary, director of the show, called to her girls through the cue system, "Great! Great performance!"

"I'm not kidding," gasped Kronke, who by now was rolling on the floor in agony. "I'm not kidding!"

The line wasn't in the script, but Beulah Zachary thought it added something. "Keep that line in," she ordered. "It makes it more realistic."

By that time Kronke was unconscious and the crew knew what had happened. The police were called, the actor's stomach was pumped in time and he recovered.

"Kronke never came back," said Miss Larson wistfully. "Somehow I don't think he trusted us after that."

Heat Wave Effects Shown

Sweltering in mid-summer heat and humidity, Baltimore got a look at itself in the television news screened on WMAR-TV. For contrast, the ten minute summer review began with two minutes of snow and ice with which the city was besieged last winter. While thermometers in the city registered over 90, televiewers watched automobiles skid and stall in the ice and snow which tied up the city last winter. On the WMAR screen, freighters and oil boats stood locked in ice in the Chesapeake Bay.

WGN-TV Changes Camera Positions for Cubs Games

Arrangements were recently completed between WGN-TV and the Chicago Cubs baseball team to revise the camera arrangement for telecasts of ball games originating in Wrigley field.

Three cameras are still used to cover the north side park, but all three are now placed on the first base side of the field. One camera is located in the first row of the stands near the first base dugout, and the other two are placed on a specially built ramp hanging under the upper deck. The ramp cameras, which are about press box level, are also on the first base side of the field, slightly on the outfield side of the dugout.

Don Cook, director in charge of the WGN-TV baseball pickups, says that the new arrangement gives televiewers the effect of watching the game from the same angle at all times. In effect, the viewer will have a seat just above the first base dugout. The new placement of the cameras will permit complete coverage of all infield and outfield plays, with the Zoomar lens on one of the ramp cameras still being utilized for overall-to-closeup shots without losing an instant of action.

Camera placement at Wrigley Field previously was arranged with the Zoomar lens in the left field bleachers, another camera at the third base dugout, and a third between home and third on a ramp below the upper deck.

Cubs on the Road

Sunday, July 25, is the last time Chicago fans will see the Cubs this month. They play New York at Wrigley field, the game to be televised by WBKB and WGN-TV. On August 16 the Cubs return to play St. Louis.

Test Pattern and Music

Test pattern and music will be broadcast for fifteen minutes preceding each WBKB program, also test signals from 9 a.m. to 12 noon, and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. except Sundays and during program hours.

The NBC Television Features Service, with Russ Johnston as director, will act as liaison between NBC and Jerry Fairbanks, Inc., in the production and procurement of film for use on NBC Chicago and for sale and distribution to NBC video affiliates. The service will also further the expansion of video recordings and will work closely with the sales and station relations departments.

She presently handles "Woman's World," "At Our House," "Mercury Record Time" and various other shows. A graduate of Calumet High school and DePauw university where she majored in speech, she originally intended to get into radio. Toward that end she attended the NBC Radio Institute during the summer of 1943. But one day she stopped by W9X BK to watch a friend, Jeanne Pachaly, sing a few songs.

"I knew from that night on that television was for me. Radio seemed dull after the first time I saw television." Loraine pestered Kit Carson until she was finally hired, and found herself in the company of WBKB's original iron-woman crew composed of: Marge Durnell, Fran Harris, Rae Stewart, Esther Rajewski, Pauline Bobrov, Eugenia Minetz, and Merilee Schricker.

Sturges Is Favorite

Lorraine Larson likes the light touch. Her favorite director is Preston Sturges. She doesn't know whether she would care to take a crack at film directing, but if she did she would try to make light, whimsical pictures such as those Leo McCarey makes. "Best Years of Our Lives" and "Annie Get Your Gun" stack up as her favorite bits of entertainment in recent years.

Occasionally, she appears in front of the cameras herself, her last appearance being a shot on "Junior Jamboree." After the show she received a wire: "You were great, dimples! From the boys at the Madison bar." Miss Larson was touched, but thinks it will be a long time before she appears before the cameras again. She is one of WBKB's best and busiest directors.
