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EDITOR'S REPORT:

Chicagoans Decide Types of Programs

Only a few years ago television programming was in its experimental stage. With so few receivers in Chicago and suburban towns of Illinois and Indiana, producers had fewer headaches, and research experts like C. E. Hooper worried only about radio.

The situation is changed today, and many readers of *Television Forecast* have experienced the novelty of being interviewed by telephone and questioned about their favorite programs. The editors of this exclusive news-magazine usually ask:

1. Did you have your television set tuned on last night?
2. What programs were you watching?
3. Do you remember the sponsor of these programs?
4. Would you like to see more dramatic shows?

Continued research, telephone calls by the thousands, day in, day out, mean just this: better programs for everyone. Facts gained from you, the televiewer, are used immediately. They are studied by station executives who want to keep their finger on the pulse of Chicagoland's TV audience. They are passed on to writer, producer, engineer. You'll see more dramas as a result of these surveys.

The progress being made in presenting the kind of entertainment midwesterners want is evident that Chicago is fast becoming the TV center of the world.

Hundreds of readers have been asking for the channel numbers assigned Chicago's newest stations, WENR-TV and WNBQ, both scheduled to make an appearance in September. Channel 5 will serve WNBQ, while WENR-TV will be found on channel 7. You'll be seeing their test patterns this month. Announcement of the proposed stations has resulted in a flood of congratulatory letters directed to this magazine, from people living as far away as Hebron, Ill., 70 miles northwest of Chicago.

Folks like the Warren R. Davees in West Point, Nebraska, cannot receive Chicago stations but do read *Television Forecast*. They're awaiting WOW-TV's bow in Omaha, and in the meanwhile are boning up on teletalk gleaned from pages of our journal.

TV TOPICS: *Larry Bates* of Chicago thinks thumbing through daily papers for TV programs is a bother and therefore recommends the *Forecast*. . . A correspondent from Peoria who signs himself "73 W9ARN" informs us he is awaiting the day WMBD and WEEK are erected and placed in operation, so hookups with Chicago may be made. Don't forget Sept. 18-26. You have a date at the Coliseum to attend the first international TV show. . . *Jack Wheeler* of South Bend, Ind., reports his hometown is buzzing with rumors that WSBT will soon pick up programs from WBKB via boosters.

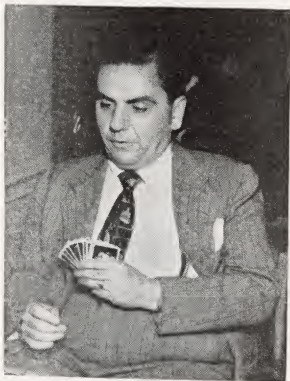

"Cross Question" Thought Real by Tele Audience

Actually a studio-produced trial, "Cross Questions" is such a convincing show that hundreds of viewers have asked WGN-TV switchboard operators: "Where are the trials held?" Most of them are surprised to know a special cast of legal experts, professional actors and members of the audience comprise the show.

Aired at 8:45 p. m. Sunday evenings, "Cross Questions" presents a trial based on a real case. Names, addresses and minor details are changed, but legal procedure and technicalities are followed in presenting the case. It is an excellent program for university law students, inasmuch as two Chicago attorneys are selected to handle the prosecution and defense.

Judge in the telecast is usually a real judge or lawyer. On the judge and lawyers rests the burden of determining the length of each sequence, for the whole show is ad libbed, including the testimony of the plaintiff, defendant and witnesses.

By avoiding camera shots for special effects, the producer achieves the courtroom reality. It even makes for a better show when the witness gets tangled up in his testimony, for records show that is what often happens in actual court rooms.

Two days before the telecast, actors who will portray the leading roles are given an outline of the case by the WGN-TV producer. This gives them time to create convincing characters when they get before the cameras. An hour before the show, the cast is again assembled, camera cues are explained, and jurors picked from the audience.

Closeups of the jurors televised during the show indicate the participants take the program seriously. Both men and women are selected to serve on the panel; they get just one minute to reach a verdict.

He did his first Balaban & Katz television show in 1946, shortly after his return from service with the Signal Corps in the Pacific. The television bug bit him then, and viewers have since seen him do commercials during football and basketball games. Television, he feels, is much more difficult than radio, but it's worth the extra effort. He likes the feeling of displaying his sponsors' wares in the consumer's living room.

His own living room in the Shorecrest hotel is presided over by a former motion picture actress, Billie Mulvihill, who came home to her native Pittsburgh for a vacation, met Bob, and decided within two weeks that the best career of all was that of being Mrs. Bob McKee. Their daughter, Terry, is now 8 years old, and their son, Gregg, was born four months ago.

Engineer Describes Five Types of TV Interference for Owners

As the number of television receivers in use increases, more cases of interference to reception crop up. It may be of help to some of the readers to have an understanding of the typical types of interference so that they may know what steps to take toward remedying them. There are five general categories of interference that account for most of the trouble. The following list gives them in the approximate order of prevalence:

1. Automobile ignition
2. Diathermy
3. Electric signs and other power disturbances
4. FM broadcasting
5. Amateur radio operations

Automobile ignition is probably by far the most common source of trouble. It can be reduced greatly in individual cars by use of the interference suppressors that are commonly used by people who have a radio in their cars. However, since the application of the device is limited to a small percentage of the cars in use, we still have the interference and probably will have for years to come.

About the only way to alleviate this trouble is to locate the antenna as far from streets and highways as possible. The trouble, of course, is much more prevalent in areas where the television signal strength is low, and consequently a trend toward increasing power of broadcast stations will help. Automobile ignition interference can usually be recognized as random horizontal white bars across the picture field. These are accompanied by a buzzing or sputtering from the loudspeaker.

DIATHERMY INTERFERENCE

Diathermy interference is that caused by medical apparatus used for fever or heat treatments, and similar effects are also caused by certain industrial heat-

"Advice to Owners"

ing installations. This trouble is ordinarily distinguished by one or two bands of a herringbone shape pattern across the screen. Sometimes it is so intense as to cause the pattern to merge into solid bands of intense white with black bands between. It is usually accompanied by a harsh buzzing sound from the loudspeaker.

Efforts are being made by the Federal Communications Commission to have equipment of this sort located on frequencies which will not interfere with television. This is the only sure remedy of a general nature. However, some individual installations can be improved by the users taking steps to cut down the amount of energy radiated. There is little or nothing that can be done on the receiver to eliminate this trouble.

ELECTRIC DISTURBANCES

Electric power disturbances may include such sources of trouble as leaking insulators and bad connections on power lines and certain types of electric signs. These three sources are likely to produce similar effects. They will usually appear as one or two bands of sparkling dots or stars on the screen. Sometimes the effect is so intense as to cause the whole picture field to be thrown out of synchronization which results in slanting black and white bars across the field. This trouble is usually accompanied by harsh buzzing sounds from the loudspeaker.

Some of these effects can be remedied at the source, but little or nothing can be done at the receiver unless it is possible to move the antenna more distant from the source. Ordinarily, in cases of this kind, the radio service man should be appealed to aid in locating the source of trouble. When it is located, if it is an electric sign, often the owner can be induced to install suitable devices to cut down trouble. If an electric line is proved to be at fault, the power company will usually make corrections.

FM broadcast interference is experienced almost exclusively on the higher group of channels, channels 7 to 13. It will ordinarily appear as random white bars dancing up and down on the pic-

ture field or sometimes a shifting, slanting corduroy pattern. If the fine tuning on the receiver is changed it will ordinarily be possible to hear the program and determine the call letters of the station. This type of interference is not the fault of the FM broadcast station nor any fault of the performance of the television receiver. There is very little that can be done about it except the increase of power in the television broadcast stations. This situation makes the picture stronger than the interfering signal and reduces the annoyance.

AMATEUR INTERFERENCE

There are two types of amateur interference—that originating from radio telephone communication, and that originating from code. Both types are apt to be found more frequently on television channels 2 and 4. The radio phone type of interference is likely to appear as random white horizontal bars across the screen, whereas the code type of interference is likely to appear as dark and light flashing of the whole screen illumination. In many cases, the conscientious amateur operator can reduce either of these troubles by suitable filters or traps in his transmitting circuits, particularly in the case of channel 4.

If he is at all close to the receiver location, it might be next to impossible for him to eliminate the trouble on channel 2. This type of interference, like that of automobile ignition, will probably be helped considerably by increased television power in the future.

One or another of these various types of interference may appear on a receiver occasionally. However, it is very fortunate that the occurrences of these interferences in the majority of cases are negligible and a great many people are able to enjoy television programs without fighting the annoyances.

FCC Issues TV Permits

Authorization for 100 TV construction permits has been announced by the Federal Communications Commission. To date 265 are pending, of which 163 have been set for hearings.
