The grid classic, directed by Chicago Tribune sports editor Arch Ward, will provide a spectacle unprecedented as thousands of Chicagoans will be able to view the game, some for the first time.

The flash of the collegiate All Stars, depicted in the scene on the cover of this issue, will be provided by such stars as Lou Agase, Pete Ashbaugh, Bob Chapuis, Paul Cleary, George Connor and Ziggy Czarowski. You'll see Vince DeFrancesca, Chalmers "Bump" Elliott, Bill Gompers, Stan Gorski and Bobby Layne, Johnny Lujack, Perry Moss and Floyd Simmons. Notre Dame's Frank Leahy will coach the all stars, Jimmy Conzelman the Cardinals.

Gomavitz Directs Junior Jamboree

Most television fans know that Burr Tillstrom is the man behind the puppets on Junior Jamboree. But who is the man behind Burr Tillstrom?

His name is Lewis D. Gomavitz, director of the show and veteran wheel-horse among WBKB directors.

Gomavitz is not the least among the reasons why Junior Jamboree is winning a reputation for being the best hour of entertainment in television throughout the country. A serious-minded perfectionist, Lew Gomavitz suffers like a condemned man through each show. He spends several hours discussing the day's show, and after it is over he worries and broods about it not having been as good as it could have been.

Program Is Rehearsed

Contrary to the general idea, Jamboree is not unrehearsed. The blithe spontaneity is achieved only after strenuous rehearsal and "chit-chat" between Tillstrom, Gomavitz and Fran Allison. A script is not used and the gems of wisdom and whimsy uttered by Tillstrom's marvelous mites are actually

Receiver, which gets good reception even under "L" tracks, is a Motorola VT71 standard table model, adapted to mobile use by George Fyler, Motorola engineer who designed the set.

Fyler placed the set on its back in the seat next to the driver, reversed the image on the tube, placed a front-view mirror on top and screened it with a hood. As presently adapted, it requires only 70 watts power, has clarity even in daytime.

With the aid of an indoor antenna unit, the receiver in the cabin cruiser picked up WGN-TV's signal ten miles out on Lake Michigan. The party saw one of the regular Alexander Korda pictures which are televised by WGN-TV, and they reported very good picture and sound.

Call To Shut-In Adds Drama To "Sports Quiz"

A shut-in whose television set provides his only window on the world won the accumulated prizes of WBKB's Sports Quiz.

Hearing McKee's voice, he had just strength enough to gasp, "I know—my heart—wait till I get a stimulant."

At last he came back on the line. "Kush climbed over the fence and crashed batting practice. Joe Wilson gives the answer during every Cubs' game.

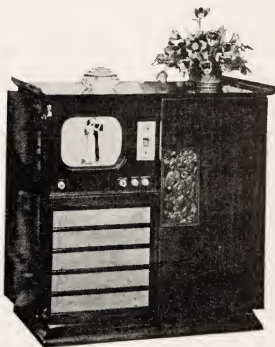
Erickson's reward includes a cigarette lighter, two pen and pencil sets, three pair cuff links, musical powder box, two pair earrings, two broaches, man's cigarette case, tie pin set, gold locket, gold anklet, cuff link, tie pin and key chain set, lady's wallet and address book, man's alligator wallet, electric wall clock, cigarette case and lighter, single strand pearl necklace, five strand pearl necklace, two compacts, key chain, baby fork and spoon, silver necklace, lady's wrist watch, gold bracelet, gold crucifix, gold necklace, silver and diamond bracelet, silver and diamond necklace and a comb and brush set. He will not be able to use his tickets to the Chicago theater and to Wrigley Field.

For his young granddaughter, Carol Rae Storck, Erickson's lucky call will bring additional presents to celebrate her graduation from grammar school. Even before she appeared with Mrs. Erickson to accept the prizes for him on a later show, Carol Rae had made her selection of the jewelry.

Brilliance of Chicagoland Music Festival To Thrill Viewers

The annual Chicagoland Music Festival will be televised for the first time Saturday, August 14, as WGN-TV cameras pick up the event starting at 8:10 p.m. The exclusive telecast will bring WGN-TV viewers the music and spectacle of the 19th edition of the Festival just as the 95,000 spectators in Soldiers Field will see it. The event is sponsored by the Chicago Tribune Charities, Inc., and is directed by Philip Maxwell of the Chicago Tribune, with Henry Weber, WGN musical director, as general musical director of the evening's program.

The huge cast of 5,000 participants has been recruited from preliminary festivals held throughout the country. Finalists will include vocal presentations, massed bands, choral groups, accordion bands, a marimba orchestra, baton experts, barber shop quartets, and other vocal and instrumental features.

At approximately 9:30, Robert Merrill, handsome young baritone of the Metropolitan Opera company and star of a coast-to-coast radio show, will make a guest appearance. Merrill will be accompanied in his vocal selections by Henry Weber and the Festival symphony orchestra. Through his appearance, recordings and singing versatility, Merrill has the rare ability of appealing to the teen-age set as well as to seasoned opera goers.

Other highlights of the Festival, and of special interest to WGN-TV viewers, include the traditional match-lighting ceremony, the Festival of the

Dolls, the "Wheels A-Rolling" presentation (a number especially composed by Phil Maxwell for the Chicago Railroad Fair), and a fireworks demonstration.

Don Cook will direct the WGN-TV cameras.

we got our tickets and wandered around town looking into the little antique shops. fran has been trying to find some old brass candlesticks for my mother. suddenly, i realized that we had

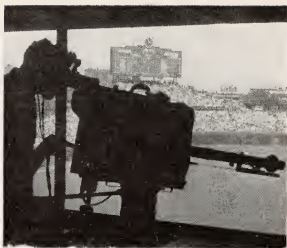

WBKB Programs Prompt Tele Viewers To Write

The phenomenal mail pull of programs at WBKB recently has the trade talking. And Mort Tuller, Public Service Director of WBKB, thinks that there must be a lot of stationary sales going on in the city.

"Actually," said Tuller this week, "we ascribe most of the immense mail pull to new set owners. Something about the novelty of television sends a new set owner rushing to his desk to write a letter which usually begins: 'I do not usually write letters . . . but . . .'"

Sample mail pull of several shows recently showed that Kiddie Parade is averaging between six and seven hundred letters a week.

Bob Sterling, American Ranger, pulls approximately 2700; Telecharades averages a thousand and the Knickerbocker Amateur Show, according to Russ Davis, pulls between 7500 and 11,000!

Does fan mail get the brush-off? Not at WBKB, according to Tuller. "Sample letters are routed to all executives in the station each week, and letters petitioning program to be taken off or kept on, are compiled and the figures also shown to all executives."

Test Pattern and Music

Test pattern and music will be broadcast for fifteen minutes preceding each WBKB program; also test signals from 9 a.m. to 12 noon, and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. except Sundays and during program hours.

Cubs Return August 16

WBKB and WGN-TV will again present the Chicago Cubs when the north-side team returns Monday, August 16 to Wrigley field for a two-day encounter with St. Louis.

ad libbed. Yet a general story line is discussed beforehand and the director knows exactly what is going to happen.

Like most Jamboree fans, Gomavitz considers the puppets blood and flesh characters and is proud of his place in the off-stage cast referred to by Kukla and Ollie. He is called "Gombie," but has no idea of why Kukla inserted the extra "b."

The war and the U. S. Navy brought the serious minded young director to Chicago, and hard times put him in show business originally. He had earned his degrees in economics and psychology at the University of Montana and was working for his Master's Degree at the New York School of Social Research when his funds ran out. He went job hunting and found himself working as assistant stage manager for Nils Granlund at the George Raft-owned Club Hurricane in Manhattan. From there he went to work for a man that Gomavitz swears is "a genius" and "the greatest showman living today"—Billie Rose. For nineteen months "Gombie" worked as stage manager for Rose's Diamond Horseshoe. Then the war came.

Meets Captain Eddy

Enlisting in the Navy, he was sent to Chicago for radar training. He threw a plate of chow at "some jerk" and Captain Bill Eddy came to his rescue. Eddy got Gomavitz out of the brig and made him his personnel yeoman. His organizational work had won him an Ensign's bar by the time he left Chi-

cago to take a special assignment at the Navy Department in Washington. At the war's end, Gomavitz was working in the Office of Public Information, Radio Department, under Admiral Miller.

In May of 1946 he returned to Captain Eddy and became stage manager for WBKB. After a year he was made a director and was at once given a heavy share of the station's commercial shows.

He has handled nearly every type of show the station has presented, and probably still would be carrying that load if it had not been for a near fatal mishap eight months ago. During a vacation flight to Florida with his pal, camera man Art Kambs, the duet's plane crash landed in St. Petersburg, Florida. Gomavitz returned to Chicago in another plane and was back at work 6 days before he discovered that his back was broken! For the next six months he carried on "Junior Jamboree" in a heavy plaster cast. Captain Eddy has since voiced the suspicion that Gomavitz broke his back purposely—just to get out of doing so much work. Gomavitz refuses to confirm or deny the suspicion.

Football Hardest Telecast

His hardest show?

"The Lucky Strike football telecasts from South Bend last Fall. There were about fifteen people talking at the same time on one cue line!"

Five or ten people on a cue line, Gomavitz can handle. It's daily routine on television. But over ten it gets a little confusing, even for him.

His favorite show—up until he helped Burr Tillstrom launch Jamboree, was a dramatic show he produced a year ago with the Northwestern University dramatic group. But now, "Gombie" can't even think of doing another show. His ambition, along with Burr Tillstrom, is to make Junior Jamboree the finest daily hour of entertainment on the nation's video channels. Judging from the growing, popularity of the moppets, he won't have long to go before he will have realized this ambition.
