Editor's Report:

Farsighted Educators View TV

Last weekend we spent the holiday with a small group of educators, television experts and newspaper executives. Object of the trip was to relax and forget the cares of the world for three days. However, before the first day was over, this was the prediction,

"A television receiver in every classroom and television programs seen and heard as a definite part of the school curriculum."

We just couldn't steer our talk away from television, so dynamic is this field! We asked each other "Does the world realize the untapped potential of television as an educational medium?"

The most heartwarming news was the report that two Chicago stations, WBKB and WGN-TV will be represented at Northwestern University this fall when specialized courses in television will be offered. The knowledge of Chicago experts in the field will be passed on to the youth of America gathering on the Northwestern campus. From there it is hoped it will join other forces in spreading out to every school, college and university in the nation.

Many farsighted educators and television stations are already alert to the instructional values of classroom television, we have discovered.

Before 1950, it is hoped by the editors of this magazine that Chicago and suburban schools will have a television schedule divided into two parts. First, the public service programs, which could well include presidential conventions, the opening of Congress, current events, and dramatization of the great

classics. There is no end to the number of programs and wide variety.

A second group could consist of sponsored educational telecasts. The greatest daytime audience will be the millions and millions of Chicago, New York, Los Angeles children attending schools who could be shown programs dealing with home budgeting, domestic science and health.

An educational program of this type could employ the closed-circuit system, by which television programs can be directed to a specific audience, or the same programs could be received in the homes by parents.

So, as 1949 approaches, the television center of the nation and world—Chicago—enters another phase of history-making: Education by Television.

TV TOPICS: Jack Dempsey made his first appearance on television recently on a New York station; the present generation of sports fans will be able to meet the old giants of yesterday thru the miracle of TV. . . . Bob Barrett of Chicago writes he has a new hobby; collecting covers of *Television Forecast*. Each picture goes in a special album. . . . To protect its cameras at Swayne Field, Toledo, Ohio, WSPD-TV has erected a tuf-flex plate glass screen through which the baseball action is pictured. . . . Screen is four by nine feet, is one-half inch thick. . . . A Chicago reader suggests: "Why not have a series of TV programs originate from Lincoln Park and Brookfield Zoos? . . . Another would like to see Mayor Kennelly televised as he greets the many notables stopping off in Chicago on special visits here.

This year he helps other youngsters realize that same hope through WBKB's "Meet the Players" program which precedes the telecast of Chicago Cub home games.

On this show Janda introduces some lucky boy or girl to a National League star and lets the youngster learn about the game of baseball from an expert.

Not willing to follow the pattern of most baseball interview programs, Janda tries to show that ball players are not just machines that bat .300 or win twenty or more games a season. So that the public will better know their favorite players, the WBKB announcer bases the major portion of his interviews on human interest.

Sherman Hotel Plans TV in 100 Rooms

The Hotel Sherman will become the first hotel in Chicago to be equipped with television in guest rooms and a complete radio system with provisions for emergency alarm service, Jay A. Jones, vice-president and general manager, announced recently.

Television sets will be installed in 100 rooms. In addition, six-channel radio speakers, each with a special attachment for emergency calls, will be installed in all guest rooms. The entire installation is expected to be completed around September 15.

The room speakers will be "fed" from a central receiving unit which will provide guests with their choice of local and network AM and FM programs. A "break in" emergency alarm circuit, which operates independently of the radio system, will enable the switchboard operator to alert all guests at the hotel simultaneously.

One of the six channels will be tuned to the College Inn so that guests can "listen in" on the musical programs originating from there without leaving their rooms.

The television sets will be used in the hotel's de luxe suites, alcoves, and large double bedrooms. They will be installed by Hotelevision, Inc., of New York City.

The room radio system, called "Guest Tone," will be installed by Radio Systems, Inc., of Cleveland, O.

WGN-TV Newschief New TV Instructor

Spencer Allen, Director of the WGN-TV Newsreel Department, will serve as instructor for a new course to be offered in the fall quarter at Northwestern University's Journalism School. The first of its kind, the course will be devoted exclusively to study of the Television Newsreel with a weekly one-hour lecture period and a four-hour laboratory in which students will have access to technical equipment similar to that used by the WGN-TV Newsreel Department.



Outlining the material which the course will cover in its twelve-week duration, Mr. Allen said he will be primarily concerned with "editing and writing news programs for television, with special emphasis on the technique of the newsreel type of presentation." Although students will be acquainted with the technical aspects, the editorial and creative phases of television news will be principal topics.

Mr. Allen, who writes and narrates the commentary for the daily WGN-TV Newsreel, 8-8:10 p.m., will supervise work in the laboratory as members of the class view specially prepared news-

George likes to bring in the players' families. "It makes my job easier," he says. And so it does. Mrs. Bob McCall, wife of the Cub pitcher, divulged that she met her husband at a dance she went to with one of McCall's friends. McCall then proceeded to win the comely blonde away from his buddy. And it was Roy Smalley's mother who helped Janda to one of his better interviews.

Mrs. Smalley, who was visiting her son in Chicago for two weeks (the Smalley home is in California), explained that her son was a bachelor. The Cub shortstop lives with another bachelor—pitcher Rob Rush. Mrs. Shalley told that Roy did all the cooking and baking and that Rush did the housecleaning. Roy's piece de resistance is chocolate cake, and he has already made several for his Cub teammates, who swear by his culinary skill.

Possesses Sense of Humor

George Janda possesses a sense of humor, and anything goes on his show. Take the time he interviewed Cub Coach Roy Johnson. . . . Johnson brought a fungo bat with him and explained its uses. A fungo bat differs from a regular bat in that it is bottle shaped and weighs much less. It is used to hit fly balls in practice. After Johnson's discussion, Janda asked the Cub coach to hit one for the WBKB audience. John-

son did, whereupon George peeled off his coat—thrust the microphone into the hands of the flabbergasted coach—picked up the bat and said, "Now it's my turn. Let's you and I change places."

Janda, whose baseball ability is a wee bit rusty, dribbled a grounder to the cheers of the Cub dugout, which by that time was aware of what was going on. Then feigning injury to his back on the swing, the WBKB announcer clutched his back and limped back to the microphone, where he asked Johnson about the possibilities of getting a rubdown on Trainer Andy Lotshaw's dressing room table. The next day, Johnson jokingly offered George a contract to play with the Cubs.

When George is not interviewing baseball players, he does special events and writes interesting things for Joe Wilson and Russ Davis to say on other WBKB telecasts.

Attended Armour Institute

Five years ago, Janda was attending Armour Institute on an engineering scholarship and studying to be an engineer. After his father's death, financial conditions made it imperative that he find work. During Christmas vacation of 1943, he went to see Bert Wilson, WIND sports announcer. Bert liked George and asked him to come back in a couple of weeks. By spring of 1944, Janda found himself in radio as a writer and sports statistician (at least all that college math didn't go to waste). He worked with such men as Jack Brickhouse, John Harrington, and Bob Elson.

He was graduated from WIND into a script writer for the Arthur Meyerhoff Advertising agency, and as he gained experience was soon asked to do so many outside writing assignments that he turned free-lance. At one time about a year ago, he made the proverbial one-armed paper hanger look like a loafer. Janda's daily schedule then consisted of writing three daily local radio shows, one daily network half-hour program, and scripts for two transcription series.
