

Health Education for Chicagoans TV Public Service: Informative

Visual education has long been recognized as an effective instrument in teaching. Television takes a step forward on this long range program of vis-

ual education, because it couples the seeing and hearing medium.

Recognizing the great potentialities, the educational committee of the Illinois State Medical Society, through the cooperation of WGN-TV, chan-



nel 9, last December launched a weekly series of telecasts on health. An attempt is made to keep these information telecasts as informal and casual as possible.

Done in interview style, the programs include a physician-moderator, an important adjunct, because his medical experience permits an exchange of conversation not possible or suitable by a layman. One or more specialists in a given field appear weekly. Patients, and equipment such as anatomical models, charts, instruments and some gadgets, are used to express visually the specific point of information.

An attempt is made to do the story in playlet form. Anything didactic is avoided. Whenever a medical term is used, it is immediately qualified in lay terminology.

The educational committee lines up the programs a month in advance and its secretary, Miss Ann Fox, prepares the script with the assistance of the physician-moderator and the individual specialist. All scripts are in the studio a week before each program.

Letters, cards and telephone calls received following each telecast offer the yardstick that the programs, presented in popular and simple style, and authentically, are giving the type of health education that answers many of the questions brought up by the layman. In addition, much of the success of the medical program has resulted from the early and continued guidance and instruction of the staff of WGN-TV, particularly the director, Cosmo Genovese. The educational committee, being an amateur in television, albeit its 27 years of doing health education via various mediums, worked closely with the studio staff, learning as much as possible to obviate repetition of technical errors. With the studio's assistance, it checked every point that, while sound medically, might provoke critical comment from televiewers.

Both the educational committee and WGN-TV have endeavored to keep every program in good taste on the informative level that would provide adequate source information for the adult as well as for the adolescent.

Plan Polio Quarantine

In the event a polio quarantine is called in Milwaukee, Wis., officials of WTMJ-TV are prepared to telecast additional shows, including a special set of quiet games and play-at-home series, it was learned this week. Channel 3, at present, is using video to teach nature studies to children at home.

CONSIDER yourself lucky to be in the privacy of your home while viewing Olsen and Johnson, explosive TV comics who have taken over Milton Berle's spot on NBC.

The only way you can escape their Tuesday, July 26 show on WNBQ, channel 5, is get aboard a flying disc headed for Nowhere, Texas.

As whacky and zany as they come, Olsen and Johnson—thanks to Buick, their sponsor—are now in a medium that suits their brand of explosive, uproarious comedy. In radio they were dead; nobody could see them. On television their entire cast of 90, including 30 stooges and dozens of relatives, all get into the act.

While five NBC cameramen do their best to cover the "cheerful nightmare," with five cameras, instead of the normal two, Chic and Ole revive for a new generation of slapstick lovers the old routines of scampering midgets, severed arms, cupids, and baboons in full cry.

John Sigvard Olsen and Harold Ogden Johnson were born about 55 years ago, but nobody but their families would recognize them by these names. Olsen was born in Peru, Indiana, and is a graduate of Northwestern university, where he majored in music.

Johnson, who answers most readily to Chic, was born in Englewood, Illinois. They are probably the oldest, continuous team in show business, having worked together for 35 years, during which time they have never laid off for more than two weeks at a stretch and that voluntarily.

It was in 1914 when Ole was playing with a group known as the College Four in Chicago that he went to a music publisher to pick up some music and heard someone playing with what he still describes as "the most powerful right hand I have ever heard." It turned out to be Chic. The music publisher introduced them, and they made a deal to work together on the spot.

For years they stayed west of Chicago, playing the Keith circuit though they had offers to come east, but the usual procedure required a cut in salary until a new act had established itself on the Eastern circuit, and they preferred not to take the cut.

Chic and Ole have joined practically every national organization and every club in every town they ever visited. Once introduced to them, people feel that they are intimate friends, and invariably wherever they play, backstage after the show looks like Times Square on New Year's Eve, as everybody they've ever met comes back to say hello and introduce grandmother and Aunt Minny. When they were playing in New York at the Winter Garden, the New Yorker called Ole's dressing room the greatest cross section of inland America anywhere in Manhattan.

Surprising as it may seem they have never in 35 years of the closest kind of association in the most temperamental of businesses had a serious argument. Though in discussing the production of their shows and bits of business they pull no punches in making suggestions or criticisms to each other.

Their shows have always been family affairs. Ole's mother, who is now 87, still turns up to help. Ole's wife, his daughter, Moya, and Chic's wife have taken part, though they are no longer members of the cast.

Back in '38 they had finally gone east as far as Philadelphia, where one evening Ole went out for a steak sandwich and met Nils T. Granlund, who became quite enthusiastic about a sudden idea and called Lee Shubert, to come down from New York and see the Olsen and Johnson show. Though doubtful, Shubert offered to back them in a show in New York—mainly because he had several empty theaters.

All the drama critics were in complete agreement on opening night—they agreed that it was the worst show they had ever seen. The only exception

was Walter Winchell, who said again and again in his column that it was the bellylaughingest show he had seen in a long time, and to this day O & J credit Winchell with having helped put them over into the big time. Hellz-a-poppin, their first of the Broadway shows, as a matter of fact, ran for 1,125 performances.

They had at various times played all over the world from Australia to England with complete audience success if not critical. Only last summer, Ole, while riding along in Paris, noticed that one of the movie houses was showing their Hellz-a-poppin film. He stopped off to ask the manager how business was. The manager replied that it had been very good for the last 18 months!

Both Olsen and Johnson are astute businessmen. Their investments have ranged from custard stands in California to a boy's camp outfitting shop in New York. They own income produc-

ing property all over the United States. For several years they ran a restaurant in New York and at the moment run a restaurant adjacent to Chic's farm in Carmel, New York. The farm, starting casually as a place where Chic and his wife could spend weekends, now represents an investment of about one million dollars.

While Chic has never been known to turn down a benefit or even a private party, he does have his moments when he likes to get off to his home and relax. He also grabs every spare moment—of which there are very few—to get in some hunting and fishing. Chic is inclined to worry about his health and always insists that it comes first, however it is significant that neither of them has missed a performance in 35 years.

Up until now they have always worked with only the sketchiest kind of a script. In fact, when Hellz-a-poppin opened in New York, their lawyer asked for a script to be sent to Washington for copyright purposes and to his horror discovered that they had none. It was necessary to sit their stenographer in the wings and take down the show as it unrolled so that it could be copyrighted.

Their work in TV changed that. They work from carefully prepared and timed scripts. While they are the first to admit that they were never particularly successful in radio, they made the point that is made by most people in show business, that O & J are exponents of visual comedy and to enjoy them, you must see them, which makes TV a natural medium for them.

Recently they met one of their Midwestern fans who lugged a carton backstage containing the stubs to prove that he had seen their shows more than 1,000 times in the past ten years. O & J were so impressed that they gave him a sterling silver lifetime pass to all their shows.

Old Tiger Not Iconoclastic, Just Relaxed and Hopes You Are, Too

By DAVE GARROWAY

A reviewer for one of the more prominent trade papers recently opined that our show, Garroway At Large, is throwing away a "fundamental sense of showmanship in an effort to be casual."

While I'm inclined to agree with his earlier statement that "Garroway must be kept under control" (mother always used to say the same thing) I fail to see how nonchalance can be theatrically unsound.

I'm not trying to be iconoclastic, but it seems to me that holding hands with the viewer is preferable to an approach resembling amateur hour at a sevenyear-old's birthday party.

On a TV variety show, formality is psychologically bad. The viewer doesn't—and shouldn't—feel that he is just one little atom in a large audience as he does in a theater. He's not sitting in a stiff theater seat, but lounging around on the floor, or stretched out in his underwear on the sofa, or curled up in a chair. He's being casual—and he must be casually entertained.

Our above-mentioned reviewer declares that nonchalance, such as we try to achieve, is alright for radio—but out of place in TV. Well, in radio you are just a disembodied voice and the voice has to stand for your personality. In TV, you're a visual thing, invited in to sit on the old familiar chairs in the old familiar room.


Of necessity, a sense of intimacy must be developed and kept alive. That's why we try to keep the format, dialogue, acting—the whole feel of the show—as unostentatious, as informal as possible. We try to effect transitions showing scenery, props, cameras and mikes—giving the audience a sense of being in behind the scenes.

We're all just trying to be ourselves—and inviting old Tiger out there to be himself, too. If the viewer feels this, then I think we've hurdled one of the big barriers of TV's limitations.

Remember "Little Cliffy in Pusson?" He's Bright Spot of WENR-TV's Super Circus

If you're five or six years old, and a regular Sunday televiewer of "Super Circus" on WENR-TV you're probably a fan of Cliffy the Clown.

This Sunday, July 24, ask your mother and dad to watch the show, that is, if they are amongst the few who haven't made "Super Circus" a weekend "must." Reason: Cliffy the Clown is an old radio personality they are sure to recognize.

If they remember the original Minstrels with Big Bill Chiles, radio's gift to the ladies, and Fritz Meisner-"My mammy calls me T-Bone," then they'll surely recall Cliff Soubier, Little Cliffy in Pusson.

Born in Radford, Ontario, Canada, where his parents, medicine show performers, were playing, Cliff's first performance in the entertainment world was unrehearsed and untutored. Scarcely eight months old, he crawled from his trunk-tray cradle, to the center of the gas-lit stage and into the arms of his mother. Having made this unscheduled debut, which brought loud guffaws from the audience, he was prompted during each program to repeat the performance. When he had outgrown the crawling stage he imitated his father's act and became a juvenile clown. Thereafter, until he was sixteen, he was an integral part of the show.

Enters Repertory

In his sixteenth year, he attended a performance of Mrs. Henry Woods' "East Lynne" which was being presented by the American Repertory Company. He became so entranced with the relative splendor of the group, he joined them as an actor. He was assigned to specialty numbers used between acts to divert the audience while the scenery was being set. Later he entered what was called "general business," or jackof-all-histrionic-trades.

He was with the American Repertory Company for one year. Subsequently he was with numerous stock companies, including the Myrtle Ross Players in Lexington, Ky., the Mae Desmond Players in Philadelphia, Pa., and the Dudley Players who performed on Chicago's West Side on the corner of Kinsey and Madison Streets. While with the latter he met and married Maria Wood Powers, an actress.

Joins Minstrel Show

In 1929, when the Dudley Players folded, Cliff made his debut into radio. His first performance was an interlocutor with a minstrel show which was heard at seven o'clock in the morning over ABC's Chicago affiliate Station WLS.

In the years that followed, Cliff joined the First Nighter program with Don Ameche and emceed a children's program known as Old Pappy. He travelled to Hollywood and was seen in eight movies including "Tovarich" with Claudette Colbert and Charles Boyer, "Black Legion" with Ann Sheridan, "They Won't Forget" and "Gold Is Where You Find It," with Claude Rains. But he missed the midwest and he's back in Chicago for good, delighting kids and adults alike with his act as "Cliffy the Clown."

Want to be a TV critic? It's easy.

Writing a column is like falling off a log. You don't mind it the first few months, but after that—as all columnists admit—it is the hardest way to make a dishonest dollar.

First thing you do is to buy four television sets, each from a different manufacturer. Don't want to hurt anyone's feelings, you know. Then install them all in one room, so you can watch channels 4, 5, 7 and 9 simultaneously.

From that point on it's a breeze.

After spending the night watching all sorts of funny people perform, you go back to your typewriter and Joe Miller book of jokes for columnists and try to pound out a review. That is, unless McCarthy jr wakes up and cries for his bottle.
