

Red-Headed Music Maker TV Guest

Wendell Hall, the man who retired from radio in '38 after 25 years of singing, composing, and trouping, makes his first TV appearance Monday. August 15 on WGN-TV's "Silhouettte in Song" show as guest of Nancy Wright.

Radio fans dating back to the crystal and battery-set era will remember Hall's most famous composition, "It Ain't Gonna Rain No Mo," as well as "Mellow Moon," and "Land of My Sunset Dreams." The photo below is an early picture of the star.



WENDELL HALL

Known as the Red-Headed Music Maker, Hall was the first Victor recording artist to appear on radio in 1924. In those days networks did not exist. so trouper Hall toured the entire country. It paid off. In 1929 he starred in the first full hour variety show on CBS.

Hall's days in radio included singing with the Fitch Bandwagon show and later CBS's Community Sing program. together with Milton Berle. Hall's own show featured such great names as Helen Morgan, George Gershwin and Will Rogers.

No longer the Red-Headed Music Maker (his hair is gray now), Hall still lives in Chicago and looks forward to a career in video. TV people who have sat in on his rehearsals feel television is made to order for the singer. and predict he'll be greater than ever before.

Kids-If You Like Western Films Be a Wrangler, Join WBKB's New Club!

All that whooping and yodelling around WBKB these days is coming from Studio "A" where the station's latest offering for children, "Wranglers' Club," is being presented each evening this week, Monday through Friday at 6 p.m.

The program, a western film serial "told" by "Texas" Bruce Roberts, started in July and is increasing steadily in popularity. The Wranglers' Club is a place where western figures gather to regale audiences with their experiences in the west. Texas Bruce, chief yarn spinner, each evening opens the program with a solemn salutation, recaps what he had been telling the night before and then continues his story.

Bruce comes in with various remarks during the film to lend it authenticity. When the villain hides a cache of gold, ol' Tex explains in the background exactly what the character is up to. Then, Texas Bruce closes on camera again with the promise to be back the next evening with more details of what happened to his friends.

Members of the television audience are invited to join the Wranglers' Club and so far the response has been more than gratifying. Texas Bruce promises more gimmicks as the program progresses.

Bruce Roberts, a former disc jockey for WKBW, Buffalo, joined the WBKB staff recently as a staff announcer. While attending the University of Michigan, Bruce did radio work on the side and still found time to participate in track and football.

He gained his first start in radio by announcing for KSO in Des Moines, Iowa; followed this up as staff announcer for WPAG in Ann Arbor, Mich. and, until his affiliation with WKBW, filled in as sportscaster and disc jockey for WHRV-ABC in Ann Arbor. He is well versed in the field of music and his private record library is stocked with pops, classical and jazz recordings. He is single, stands 6 foot 3 inches and weighs an even 200 lbs.

BOXING FORECAST

Championship Bouts Promised by WNBQ

Chicago boxing fans this week were promised 52 more weeks of champion-ship bouts on WNBQ, channel 5, under terms of a new agreement with the Madison Square Garden and the International Boxing club.

Beginning September, NBC telecameras will cover all Friday night ring events in New York. When the garden is not available, top-rated contests will be telecast from Chicago, Detroit, or St. Louis.

NBC television, a pioneer in covering boxing, has presented every major championship ring contest in this country since 1944, with Gillette Razor company as sponsors. Among the historic firsts: the Joe Louis-Billy Conn battle in 1946; the Louis-Walcott matches, 1947 and '48; and the recent Charles and Walcott waltz in Chicago. The latter fight was not viewed by Chicagoans, however.



Boyd, back in 1934, was offered the comedy roles in the series, but requested a chance at the lead, and got it. With his companion, "Topper," silverhaired Hopalong is now hard at work making more films for network TV stations.

Norm Barry Entered TV Back in 1930 -WNBQ Star Likes Dogs, Brahms, Pot Roast

In television before he began a radio career is the claim of Norman Barry, WNBQ video personality who can be seen this week on the Herbie Mintz show, and Walt's Workshop.

An NBC announcer for more than 15 years, Barry made his first appearance before TV cameras in 1930. That was long before Milton Berle became Mr. Television.

Tall—just over six feet—Barry is black-haired and blue-eyed. He likes dogs, Brahms, swimming and pot roast, but his favorite current pet is "Budgie," a budgereegah, zebra parakeet native to Australia.

Watching "Budgie" could be a fulltime job, but Barry spends most of his time at NBC's studios in the Merchandise Mart, either on video or radio productions.

A native of St. Louis, Mo., Barry could turn his hand to expert accounting if he wanted to, but the entertainment business always was more attractive so he jettisoned ledgers for radio after he left Ohio State University.

Shortly after his debut on the air, Norm temporarily gave up the microphone to play in vaudeville, make motion picture trailers and sing with dance orchestras. All of this inclination came naturally—his father was an amateur vocalist and his grandmother, known as Mother Lake, was one of the greatest platform and Chautauque lecturers in her time.

Barry's tours were abandoned in 1933, when he returned to announcing. He joined NBC Chicago in 1934 and has been staff and special events announcer ever since, except for three years during World War II, when he served with the U. S. Navy. He commanded a PT boat in numerous actions in the South Pacific and in the Philippines area and was discharged as a lieutenant.

Among his most vivid memories are his spacing of rescue and announcing during the catastrophic floods in the Ohio River Valley in 1937 and his coast-to-coast, trip in one of the first streamliners in 54 hours.
