EDITOR'S REPORT:

Aiming Micro Waves at Chicago

Now and then we receive questions from our readers that cannot be answered in a brief note on the letter page, such as the recent query from an Evanston televiewer who asks: "How long is a wave?"

Answering that calls for a discussion of the microwave radio relay system developed by the Bell Telephone Laboratories for transmission of television programs. Last week on this page we explained the role of coaxial cable which has since joined New York and Chicago. Now we are to learn of a system now in use between Chicago and Milwaukee, Toledo and Detroit.

A wave is about as long as a cigarette. Being of a super-high frequency, waves act very much like light waves and can be reflected or bent through lenses or prisms. So well-controlled are these radio waves that the Bell System has utilized them to transmit multi-channel television signals.

The microwave relay system for video is so designed that it can be coordinated with coaxial cable, so that words or pictures may go part way over a pair of wires, part way over a radio relay channel, part way over a coaxial cable, and so on.

Most microwave relay systems make use of microwaves which are in the neighborhood of 4,000 megacycles. Unlike light waves, microwaves are not troubled by rain, fog or snow, static or other man-made interference.

Microwaves do not follow the curvature of the earth, therefore they can be picked up satisfactorily only about as far as the horizon. "Shot" from 30 to 40 miles, these microwaves are gathered into a beam and aimed at towers, usually located on high buildings or in hill-tops. The waves are focused in narrow beams from one point to another by huge horn-shaped antennae, much as a magnifying glass focusses the sun's rays.

This type of horn-shaped antenna, TV bugs will be interested in knowing,

concentrates the energy of the microwave transmitter into a beam about two degrees wide—so sharp that it is 10,000 times more powerful than if the energy were allowed to spread out in all directions. The use of a similar antenna at the receiving tower multiplies the energy delivered to the station another 10,000 times, or a total gain of 100 millionfold over a non-directional system.

Think of it! A transmitting power level of only about one watt—approximately the power needed to light your pocket flashlight bulb—is sufficient to bridge the gap between stations.

In the spring of 1950, it is expected the Bell System will complete building a microwave relay route between New York and Chicago. Reports indicate it will be extended further westward, perhaps all the way across the continent.

Elsewhere in this issue you will read of Illinois Bell's TV control center, to better understand the research, planning and modern day miracles which bring you television entertainment.

Children Will Like These at TV Party

On these cold wintry days, mothers appreciate a television set to help keep their youngsters inside, warm and dry. What child doesn't like to have a party, a party every day of the week? It's easy to stage one with a minimum of work and yet be idolized by your children.

Popcorn Balls are always a favorite, even with the most modern of youngsters who love to munch on them while watching their favorite puppet show.

The recipe: One-half cup of corn equals about 6 cups of corn when popped. Sprinkle corn with $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon of salt. Then prepare the syrup. Stir it slowly into the popped corn until every kernel is coated. Shape the corn lightly into balls with slightly floured hands as soon as it is cool enough to handle.

Here are two family recipes for syrups:

Caramel syrup: Melt $1\frac{1}{2}$ tablespoons butter. Add $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups brown sugar and 6 tablespoons water. Stir these ingredients until the sugar is dissolved. Boil them without stirring to the soft ball stage 238 degrees.

Molasses syrup: Melt $1\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoons butter. Add $\frac{1}{2}$ cup molasses and $\frac{1}{4}$ cup sugar. Stir these ingredients until the sugar is dissolved. Boil them without stirring to the hard ball stage 290 degrees.

Cocoa is more fun and tastier, too, if this old-fashioned recipe is used. Served with homemade cookies it will spark your TV Party. The following will make about 4 cupfuls.

Combine and stir in the top of a double boiler over direct heat: 4 tablespoons cocoa, $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon cinnamon, $\frac{1}{8}$ teaspoon salt, 1 cup boiling water, 2 to 4 tablespoons sugar. Place the top of the boiler over boiling water. Add 3 cups scalded milk. Stir and heat the cocoa. Beat before serving.

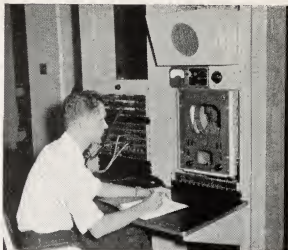

"Traffic Cop" for Chicago's television is Illinois Bell's TV control center, 311 West Washington, which provides monitoring and maintenance facilities insuring constant high-quality transmission, plus inter-communicating circuits used to coordinate operations.

The control center is linked with TV studios, transmitters and important pick-up points, and it was the first of its kind in the Bell System. A special crew keeps a 24-hour-a-day check on both audio and video transmission on its screens and microphones.

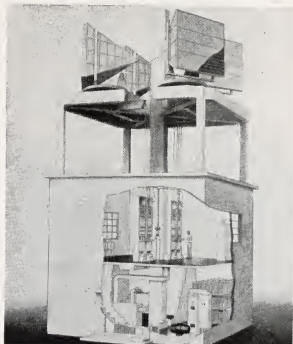
