TED MACK

Man With 500,000 Friends

If anyone in the world ever had full opportunity to gratify a childhood ambition, that person is Ted Mack, spokesman-entrepreneur for the famous Original Amateur Hour. Fans can see him Sunday, Feb. 20 on WGN-TV, channel 9.

Beside having worked with and been tutored by many of the great names of recent theatrical history, Ted's own career of discovering new star-material, covers every branch of theater arts. A lengthy list of present day stars owe their status to his helpfulness, advice, or discovery.

For over two decades, Mack has been a performing headliner in his own right.

Through the eyes and ears and judgment of Mack, some 500,000 hopefuls in search of theatrical fame and fortune have been auditioned or screened in 15 years. Of these, perhaps 10,000 were found sufficiently worthy of further encouragement. These have either appeared on the Original Amateur Hour on radio, or were gainfully employed while touring theaters with travelling "in person" stage-unit shows, during the past 15 years. Of the 10,000 who had opportunity to be seen or heard, perhaps 500 are now permanently in some department of show business. Hundreds are stars appearing in grand opera, concert, motion pictures, radio, television, vaudeville, or night clubs. Not a few became "owners," or producers, executives or technicians.

Ted Mack was a saxophone tooting law student at Denver university in 1930. He had been leading his high school band and university orchestra to provide tuition and upkeep while he struggled towards a law degree and a doctorate in musical and dramatic arts. In these early Ted Mack orchestras were two players, Glenn Miller and Matty Malneck. A third, Harry Barris, became a famous song writer and member of Paul Whiteman's original Rhythm Boys, whose other members were piano-playing Al Rinker, and a singer named Bing Crosby.

During the period immediately fol-

lowing Ted Mack's graduation from college, he appeared with his own orchestra in cities from coast to coast—in dance halls, cafes, and theaters. In these early years, Paul Whiteman was among the first to help mold Mack's career.

In Los Angeles, Ted met Bing Crosby and went to Whiteman with the suggestion that a "rhythm" trio be formed. Harry Barris, one of Mack's bandmen, became a member of the trio.

Mack joined Ben Pollock's then sensational orchestra, which included in its personnel, clarinetist Benny Goodman, Glenn Miller (from Ted's old Denver high orchestra), trombone comedian of the screen, Frank Jenks, and Wayne Allen, composer-arranger for MGM musical productions. Bix Beiderbecke, Red Nichols, and Jack Teagarden were among others under Pollock's baton, and from each Ted gained varied knowledge and experience that was to stand him in good stead later on.

When, sometime later, he married his childhood sweetheart, a pretty young

Forty teams of champion amateur boxers will be eligible for the February Tournament of Champion bouts, one of the largest entry lists in Golden Gloves history. The territory from which these teams are recruited ranges from California to Cleveland and Toledo, and from Minnesota to Texas and Tennessee.

While attending the University of Chicago she studied dramatics and participated in little theater work on the campus, in addition to acting as translator—German into English—by which she earned her schooling expenses.

In 1942 Alma Platts, then a woman of 50, visited a local radio station. The odds were against her. Ordinarily directors are given into fits of frenzy by applicants auditioning for dramatic parts, so strenuous is the job of sifting talent. Mrs. Platts was an exception. Not only did she have a successful audition, but soon began a career in radio.

During the past years, Alma has become prominent in radio, gradually increasing her activities. This year finds her in the leading role of a video serial, the industry's attempt to project soap-operas on the screen.

school teacher, Ted organized his own orchestra. In a Los Angeles vaudeville theater, he was called upon to introduce each act, and it was thus he got experience that was to make him one of America's best liked masters-of-ceremonies.

When MGM offered Ted a job as musical supervisor for such films as "The Great Ziegfeld" and "Beat the Band," the late Major Bowes, affiliated with MGM, saw those films and induced Ted to go to New York, where he became actively engaged as the Major's first assistant in the talent selection, production and direction of the famous Major Bowes' "Original Amateur Hour."

Major Bowes insisted on Ted becoming his "understudy." Ted routined the radio acts and programs, as well as the stage-unit shows, of which, at one period, 14 were appearing in halls and theaters, from Broadway to California, and in remote desert and mountain villages. These units were often employed as fund-raising attractions, and are credited with having produced millions

for charitable, patriotic and other purposes. Often they were the first and only "flesh and blood" shows the populace had ever seen. During the war, these Unit shows were among the first to entertain the troops and help establish the U.S.O. Camp Shows.

The travelling stage-unit shows continued under Mack's guidance with the "know how" help of Bowes' big staff of experts, after Bowes' death. When television reached its postwar development, the Original Amateur Hour with Ted Mack was first to be seen in the new medium in New York, and now in Chicago via network facilities.
