More Cable, Channels, Programs

And, we might add, more confusion.

However, the picture looks brighter this week. TV moguls of Chicago and New York are taking a personal interest in your likes and dislikes, and you'll see the results of their snoopings for information before summer arrives.

You'll also hear about—

—More coaxial cable joining Chicago with New York and other eastern cities.

—The Federal Communications Commission's decision on whether to release the UHF (ultra high frequency) channels to video, to provide more stations for Chicago and other big cities.

—New programs, changes of time, dates being switched because of more cable. There will be a little confusion for a few weeks. Daily papers and *Television Forecast* will try to clear up the muddle.

Already some changes are being noted. WGN-TV, channel 9, will be receiving the Ford Theatre productions—a drama each month—formerly telecast by another Chicago station thru CBS facilities. Ed Sullivan's "Toast of the Town," previously heard 8 to 9 p.m. Sundays, now begins at 7 o'clock, effective March 27.

When the Bell Telephone company completes the additional cable from New York to Chicago, TV fans will be tied up in knots over what program to view, because real station competition will just begin. Right now, only one channel can provide a New York show, so if you prefer eastern productions you watch them knowing there won't be any other eastern shows on the screen. It will be a healthy situation to have more shows, better shows, and for those who want to watch all events, there is only one hope for relief: 4 TV sets in the parlor, and a good set of nerves.

Paul B. Mowrey, ABC TV director representing WENR-TV in Chicago has made it clear his network vetoes the use of hackneyed stage pieces, no matter how successful they had been before the footlights. Mowrey favors experi-

menting with short story classics, one-act masterpieces, such as Ring Lardner, Saroyan and James Thurber, so expect to see more entertainment of this type.

NBC has taken the lead in UHF experimenting by planning an ultra-high frequency station in Bridgeport, Conn. The station will act as a satellite of NBC's key station in New York, WNBT, and will be studied by FCC officials and TV set manufacturers with much interest. Most manufacturers have announced they are prepared to produce dual-band sets providing both UHF and VHF (very high frequency) so that viewers may receive programs from all channels. Only Zenith Radio and Television Corporation was able to jump the gun months ago by designing and putting on the market a set which incorporates both bands.

Frank Schreiber, WGN-TV chief executive, recently expressed his feelings toward the motion picture industry and their attitude towards video. The "in-

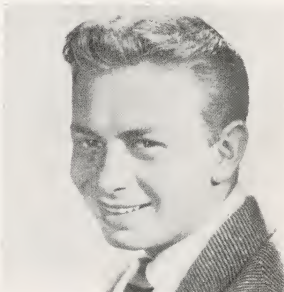
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Out of the Fog Comes Mel Torme

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Meet Johnny Coons Man of Many Voices

A Chicago television star you haven't yet seen but whose voice is known to thousands and thousands of children of all ages is Johnny Coons, the man behind Uncle Mistletoe on WENR-TV's weekday show.

If you're a new TV set owner unaware of the adventures Uncle Mistletoe relates to Jennifer Holt—Aunt Judy—then dial channel 7 Monday night, March 28 and enter the land of fables. You'll hear Johnny in a number of roles, in fact you might recognize his voice as that of Smelly Clark, a radio character, he performed on Vic and Sade.

Johnny, like many TV stars, started his career in radio. Because he specializes in trick voices he was a natural selection for the Marshall Field & Co. show on video.

Studied in New York

A look through Johnny's scrapbook and we see he entered his professional career soon after graduating from high school. From Lebanon, Ind., his family had him enrolled in pre-medical school at Wabash college, but he never got there. Instead, he went to New York to study at the Alviene Dramatic academy, joined a vaudeville outfit as a magician, then began touring the midwest. Later he returned to Broadway to appear in "Bright Honor" after which he played with stock companies in Maine and Long Island.

An offer to appear as a Dead End Kid in the touring company of "Dead End" brought him to Los Angeles, where he stayed for several years doing movies for Columbia and Selznick. From movies, Johnny moved into radio and was soon doing dramatic stunts on network shows originating in California.

Starred on Radio

Chicago offered him the chance to star in a number of juvenile roles, so he returned to the midwest. Since 1946 he has been portraying Clipper King in ABC's "Sky King." Avid radio fans will recall him in Bachelor's Children, and Captain Midnight.

Mr. and Mrs. Coons reside in an apartment on the near north side of Chicago. They're not nightclubbers, but prefer to do their entertaining at home, quietly. This also gives Johnny the chance to demonstrate some of the feats of legerdemain which he performed on the stage. Although he sold most of his equipment (valued at \$5,000) he is still able to baffle and entertain friends without using rabbits, trick tables and false-bottom hats.

Someday we think Mr. Coons will have a show of his own on video, and when he does we're certain he'll add to the stature of video in Chicago.

Hornsby Signs for Cub Games

The old Rajah himself, Rogers Hornsby will be a TV sports announcer covering the Chicago Cubs home games for channel 7, it was announced this week by WENR-TV. One of baseball's immortals, Hornsby held the batting championship of the National league for seven years. There isn't a Cub fan alive who doesn't remember the old slugger.

Hornsby should be interesting on video. He'll make his bow at the start of the baseball season, April 19, competing with veteran TV announcers Jack Brickhouse and Joe Wilson.

For T.V. Service Consult the
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Pennsylvania To Use Color TV in Study

Harold E. Stassen, president of the University of Pennsylvania, this week announced the school is planning to incorporate color television facilities in a projected \$10,000,000 addition of the medical center. An order with Zenith Television, Chicago, was earlier placed for a color TV transmitter and receivers. They are to be used for visual study to groups of medical students.

Pres. Truman, Churchill to Appear on Telecast

President Harry Truman and Winston Churchill, Britain's war-time leader will appear together on television Thursday, March 28, in a pooled network coverage of the mid-century convocation of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

According to network officials, the Tuesday program will begin at 8 p.m. A second telecast is scheduled for Friday, April 1, beginning at 8 o'clock.

A reader this week inquired: "How many complete television pictures are transmitted to the receiver each second?" The answer: 30. Each picture contains approximately 200,000 dots of light or elements. Chicago TV station transmitters amplify the electrical charges created in TV cameras, sending out strong picture-signals, together with syne-signals to hold the picture in its frame, keeping its horizontal and vertical proportions correct and preventing waviness.

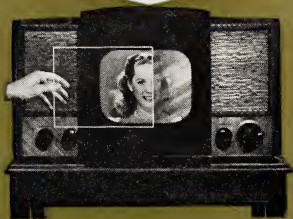
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
