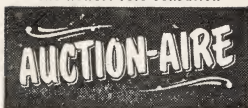

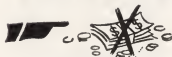

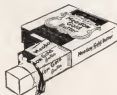

What Does It Cost to Operate Your TV Set? Here Are Figures

NEW or old television set owners who wonder how much their video enjoyment is costing them in terms of electrical consumption will probably be interested in this breakdown of expenses, based on information from Commonwealth Edison in Chicago.

The Edison company believe that the average cost of operating a TV set is less than one cent an hour.

Naturally there is a different cost for smaller vs. larger tubes. However, the average is somewhere around 220 watts, making the average rate paid by residential users approximately three cents per kilowatt hour.

Many video set owners use enough electricity in their homes to obtain a

substantial portion of it at two cents per kilowatt hour. Used for one hour, therefore, the average receiver would probably consume 220 watt-hours of electricity. Since a kilowatt hour (1000 watt hours) costs an average of three cents, the receiver has used about 1/5 of that amount, or slightly more than 3/5 of a penny's worth of electricity.

Actual wattage rating on your receiver may be marked on the name plate, or shown in the instruction book given with each set purchase. If you cannot find it, your dealer or manufacturer will readily supply you the information.

Following is a breakdown of different tube sizes and their hourly or monthly cost:

Little Revue—for Relaxation

"There is music in all things . . . if men had eyes and ears . . ."

Which sentiment is both true and the theme of WENR-TV's Little Revue, one of television's smoothest musical programs. Built solidly around the orchestra of Rex Maupin, ABC's music director, and featuring attractive Gloria Van, the Little Revue is programmed to present each week a visual interpretation of popular music.

"The program isn't a variety show," says Producer-Director Greg Garrison, "we aim for a half-hour of fine music, with pleasant pictures designed to relax an audience already surfeit of detective thrillers, vaudeo, and stone-age westerns."

And the Little Revue comes pretty close to filling that billing. Fed to the ABC-TV Network in Milwaukee, Detroit, Cleveland, Philadelphia, Baltimore and Washington, the show is kinescoped for re-broadcast in Hollywood, San Francisco and Texas.

Singer Gloria Van, a Gene Krupa and College Inn alumna, Dancer Nancy Doran and Bill Weber, the 17-year-old puppeteer are the program's only regulars, outside Maupin and the orchestra.

Gloria, who scores both audio and video, is equally adept in ballad or torrid tempo, while Miss Doran dances out her own interpretations of the music.

Garrison's biggest problem is to keep the visual presentation subordinate to the music. As stated before, the program's purpose is a half-hour of pleas-

ant video, but with talent like Miss Van, Nancy Doran, and guest stars including Bill Snary, Buddy Di Vito and Nancy Evans on the pop side, and artists like Ennio Bologninni, cellist, Leonard Sorokin, violinist, and the Fine Arts quartet, Garrison has to work to achieve the right balance between the mediums.

It was easy enough on "Winter Wonderland," where Greg used a miniature outdoor set, with falling snow and puppets for atmosphere, but the day guest Tony Parrish essayed "Mule Train," with a live jackass, the cogs didn't quite mesh.

Parrish, seated on a prop fence, was supposed to sing and crack a whip at the same time . . . while the donkey part was a slow entrance, stage left. At rehearsal, the mule came on like Frankie Laine, but at the actual telecast, it balked out of camera range.

Parrish sang, popped his whip, ad libbed another chorus, and frowned, but the temperamental burro, making like a rock, stood. A musician, an ex-Boy Scout, began to rub two of Maupin's old batons together, but Stage Manager Grover Allen saved the play by booting the mule in the wings. The demure donkey then went on and acquitted himself like a Barrymore.

"Parrish could have sung Mother Machree, for all the attention the music got," says Garrison.

LIBBY'S AUCTION-AIRE

To The Highest B

THE largest weekly auctions ever to be staged will be telecast again this Friday, Jan. 20 on WENR-TV, channel 7 when Libby, McNeill and Libby sponsor "Auction-Aire" with Jack Gregson and Rebel Randall.

Since September, the show has been seen in other cities via the ABC network, and last week was added to the Chicago chain for midwestern viewers. Oldfashioned in theme, "Auction-Aire" offers such items as TV sets, sterling silver, refrigerators, ranges, washing machines and ponies to home viewers and the studio audience.

The person bidding the largest number of Libby labels wins the article, as the gavel is banged by Jack Gregson.

Home bids are made by telephone, the calls being made to local Chicago numbers and put through on open lines to the stage in New York, originating point of the show. After each auction program, representatives in each city call on winning bidders to pick up their labels, by the bushel and barrel.

Also incorporated into the Libby show is a postcard auction, with a special prize each week. Bids are sent in to the program on post cards, and

the highest bidder is invited to New York to receive his prize on the following week's show. Recently the program has added guest auctioneers—the first two of whom were Maxie Rosenbloom and Roland Young.

Auctioneer Gregson flies 6,000 miles a week in order to do the show in New York on Friday nights. The rest of the time he's busy on the west coast with other commitments.

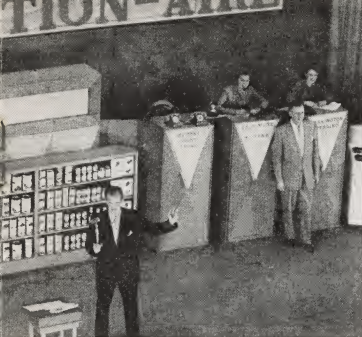
A native of Spokane, Washington, Jack himself was an auctioneer at the age of seven, having been trained by his father. As a boy he barnstormed through the Pacific Northwest selling at automobile auctions, and for a number of years wrote, emceed and pro-

duced "Hi Jinx," the high school radio variety show broadcast over KGA in Spokane.

An outstanding athlete at school, Jack earned letters in football, baseball and was leader of the college dance band. He left college to become an announcer over KDYL in Salt Lake City, and in less than two months was emceeing 12 audience participation shows a week. After a tour of duty in San Francisco and Hollywood, Gregson left the Palladium for service in the Army Air Forces, and spent the first 18 months as a flight officer in Blythe, Cal. Later he served in the Army Transport Command in the Pacific, but always itching to get back to radio.

When the war ended, Gregson sped for Hollywood and jumped back into the job of emceeing shows. He currently is the star of "Your Stand-In," broadcast five times a week, and "Platter Party," a one-hour recorded show heard six days on the west coast.

Jack's favorite fans are his wife, the former Evelyn Ransh of Salt Lake City, and their son, Gerald, better known as "Packy."

Rebel Randall, assistant on the

"Auction-Aire" telecast, is a native of Chicago. While attending Foreman high school she began a career in modeling, becoming so popular that by the time she left Northwestern University to enter Max Reinhardt's Work Shop in Hollywood, her picture had appeared on dozens of billboards and magazine covers around the country.

While in the movie capital, she appeared in more than 30 motion pictures, including "Louisiana Hayride," "Tangiers," and the "Ziegfeld Girl."

During the war, Rebel appeared on many radio shows which were transcribed overseas for Army and Navy entertainment, in addition to making personal appearances with the Bob Hope gang.

Before going into television, Rebel was a discjockey on radio in New Orleans. The show was so popular it was televised on WDSU.

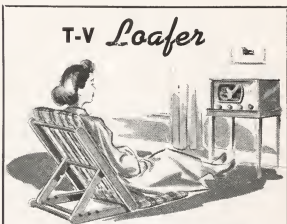

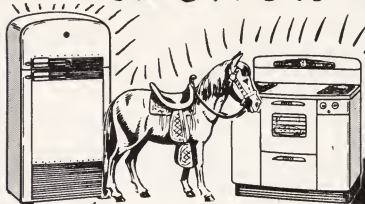

Both sides contain dandy vocals by the stars of the Standard Oil telecast. *Harry Hall* warbles *The Last Waltz I Danced With You* in a pleasing baritone. It's backed by *Nancy Evans*,



versatility personified, as she sings *Forever With You*, assisted by Harry, a nice, easy-going ballad. If you miss this record, you just don't live right.

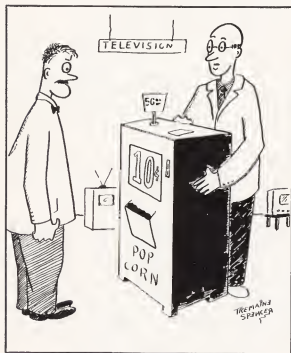
"Down In the Valley" First WNBQ Opera

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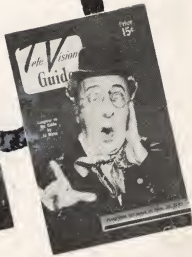
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
