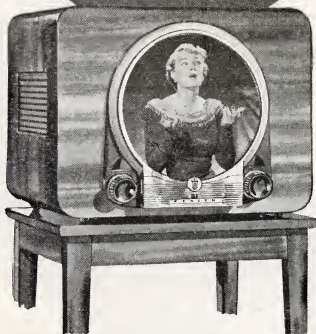

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VIDEO star Frankie Masters of WBKB really intended to be a banker. But a flute, a banjo and a singing voice inherited from his Welsh ancestors triumphed over his original aim, and today Masters is firmly entrenched as leader of one of the sweetest rhythm bands in the nation. Fridays he's sponsored on channel 4 by RCA; weeknights and Sundays he stars at the Hotel Stevens.

The Masters musical success story goes back to his early days in Robinson, Ill., when young Frankie took lessons on the flute. He played that instrument

until he went to the University of Indiana, where he discovered that the banjo would get him further in college activities. He earned his way through an entire course of economics and finance by strumming banjo at fraternity dances, and by his senior year Masters was acknowledged Musical King on campus.

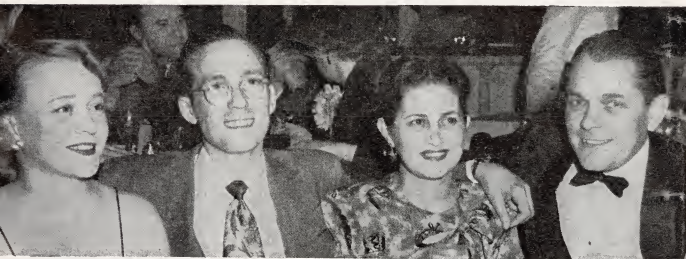
Meanwhile, Frankie organized a college band which did so well that it was booked through the Orient on the liner "President Madison." Maestro Masters and his college boys were each paid the magnificent sum of \$15 a week!

Frankie still looked to banking as his goal in life, so after returning from abroad, he became a bank teller in his home town. But he couldn't resist play-

ing engagements "on the side" and one day he suddenly realized that his future lay in music.

So leaving banking forever, he joined a band that was playing in a Chicago theatre and for the next few years barnstormed around the Windy City. Then he got together a combination of topflight musicians, formed his own organization, and started to play at Chicago night spots. Two years later, when he opened at the Roosevelt Hotel, he clicked over night.

Later, in New York, Frankie signed with CBS and appeared on such shows as "Magic Carpet," "Show of the Week," "Fitch Bandwagon," and "Coca-Cola Spotlight Bands;" he also made records for Columbia.

JACK MABLEY SAYS:

Bob Hope Yes, But Jack Benny's TVenture Doubtful



As you read this the fine programs of Easter Day are only a pleasant memory. But it is being written shortly after Easter, and I'm still punchy from five solid hours of viewing. I wish to pass on some notes made during the week, and if the whole business seems a bit cockeyed, blame television.

Bob Hope's tremendous premier on TV bears out an idea I've had for a long time—that when the varsity comes over to television from radio, the present so-called top flight comics, including Mr. Television Himself, will fade.

I'm sure you noted how clean Hope's show was. The great comedians—even the good ones—don't have to fall back on vulgarity to get their material across. Hope's wholesomeness was particularly welcome, coming a day after Sid Caesar had reached a new low in coarseness with a crack about leading the invasion of a ladies' lounge. I won't cheapen the magazine nor tempt the postal inspectors by reproducing the whole joke.

The younger generation of radio listeners doesn't realize that the best radio comedians grew up on vaudeville stages, and in the days before microphones shot up out of the stage in front of them.

From remembering them on the stage, I've always thought Hope, Ed Wynn, Fred Allen, and Red Skelton would be terrific on television. On the basis of Skelton's silly radio shows and shallow movies, you may object to his presence on that list. But in the flesh he's among the funniest of the lot. TV will never be the same again after he demonstrates "Smoooooth Gin."

Perhaps Jack Benny should be included, but he seems an unknown quantity. Any man who has leaned on the same jokes and same situations in one radio show for more than two decades can hardly be classified as a red hot prospect for television, regardless of his Hooper in radio.

Bob Hope has shown convincingly that he and others of his stature can take television in stride. It means that we'll want to spend even more time watching TV. Oh my aching eyes.

Speaking of comics, have you watched

the mugging of the conductors of the big orchestras, such as Howard Barlow and until recently, Paul Laval and the Band of America? After years of displaying their posteriors to audiences, they suddenly find they are actors, and are having a field day.

Television is making honest men out of a lot of radio sports announcers. A popular indoor sport is to get a ball game or fight on TV and turn on the radio to see how the announcer is describing the event. It used to be downright hilarious, but these days the radio announcers know they're being monitored, and behave. Last winter, though, on dull nights at St. Nick arena in New York you sometimes thought you were watching and hearing two different fights.

We note that a cynical, harassed columnist on a Chicago afternoon newspaper has finally acknowledged the existence of television, if only by a left-handed observation that puppets are more attractive on TV than people. He should add to his list J. J. Morgan, Dirty Eddie, Mignon, Judy, and Sorrowful, who are, in order, a basset hound, a pig, a French poodle, an elephant, and a monkey. J. J. Morgan has the most expressive eyes in television, and the others are master pantomimists, invariably achieving their emotional effects without use of the spoken word. How many people can say that?

That man *Frankie Laine* has cut another *Mercury* disk, and this one, while it isn't in the same league as "*Goose*" and "*Mule Train*," it will still sell a lot more than most any other four singers combined! This one again on a *Mercury* unbreakable is called "*Satan Wears a Satin Gown*"—and is backed by "*Baby Just for Me*"—both on the swingy Laine style with his inimitable phrasing showing to good advantage. It's *Mercury* disk 5358—and if you like Laine like I do, don't pass this disk up.

Bill Lawrence, *Arthur Godfrey's* "mussed hair" voice, has cut a new disk for *RCA Victor*. It is called "*Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday*," and it is a cute song, though Lawrence sings it with his unimaginative style which leaves me cold. Backed by "*Half a Heart*" this *Victor* disk 20-3683, it probably will go the way of all other *Bill Lawrence* disks—sell quite a few despite what I write, because the guy is *cute*.



I've had a lot of folks of late try to put me on the spot to venture an opinion as to which system is better for the home, the 45's, or the 33's. Again I repeat—that believe me, they are both very good, and I think there is room for both systems permanently. The 45's are best when you save single records, and pop and classical selections, and the 33's are best when you go in for long uninterrupted works such as symphonies, concerts, operas, and complete shows.

Don't miss *Hopalong Cassidy's* album for *Capitol*—which is hotter'n a firecracker in sales throughout the nation at this writing. Also if the kids like *Super Circus*—*Capitol* has a line of wonderful "*Bozo the Clown*" sets on Long Play available now.

Chicago Museum Opens Exhibit on Television

This week the Museum of Science and Industry, located in Jackson Park, opened an educational exhibit of television, one of the most comprehensive of its kind for the public according to RCA.

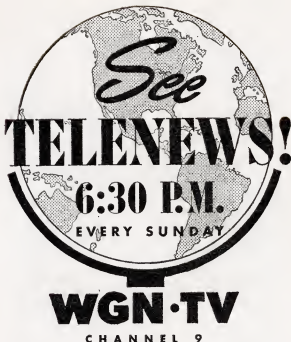

Will Rural Families See Phonevision?

Keith Peterson of Rockford, Ill. asks if phonevision (the proposed system which permits subscribers to receive first-run movies in their homes) will be possible in rural areas.

The answer is yes. Rural phonevision will be possible. In fact, Zenith Radio, chief proponent of phonevision, believes that "phonevision will bring TV to many rural areas which could not support a station on commercial sponsorship alone."

The show would be transmitted from the local TV station and a single line would carry the synchronizing signal from the local station to surrounding telephone switch boards. Zenith has ironed out technical difficulties in transmitting the synchronizing signal over a four-party line so that one subscriber can receive the signal without the others on the line getting it. However, they have not yet perfected phonevision for party lines of over four subscribers.

Zenith points out that discussion of rural phonevision is premature at this time because as of now the FCC has granted permission for only a 90-day limited phonevision test in Chicago.

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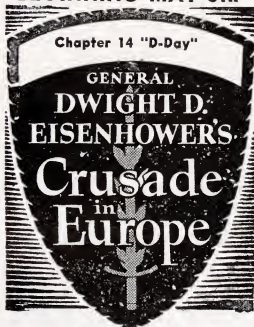

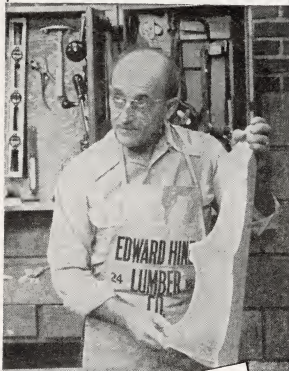

So far as I'm concerned it's a real pet shop and if you still don't believe me, I'll show you my scars.

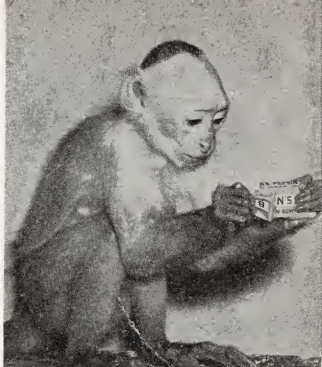

Meet Sid Novak Mat Referee

"TV has done more for wrestling than any other sport," says wrestling referee Sid Novak. Cornered at McKinley high school recently, where he is "Coach Novak," Sid told us, "The phenomenal thing about television is that it has made wrestling a topic of household conversation. Thanks to television, there are more women in wrestling audiences today than men!"

A short, chunky man wearing checked pants, a yellow shirt and a dark blue jacket, Sid led me into his office where he told me the story of his life.

He was born in Chicago. He went to Marshall high, where he was captain of the football team. While at Marshall, he was selected as all-city player.

After high school, he went to the University of Illinois. He participated in football and wrestling there and became middleweight wrestling champ. He entered the school of coaching and graduated in January, 1931.

He then went to work for the Chicago Park District as athletic instructor, and after four years in that position, was promoted to the position of supervisor of recreation. In 1943 he left the Park District and joined the Board of Education, becoming coach at McKinley. Sid likes his job at McKinley, and enjoys working with young people.

At that time, having more leisure, Sid took up another job working with young people. He became director of Camp Ojibwa in northern Wisconsin. It was then, too, that he was appointed wrestling referee by the Illinois State Athletic commission.

We cautiously told Sid how some fans complain that the referee never sees the "dirty work" going on during wrestling matches. "Well," Sid replied, "the clever wrestler generally applies his dirty holds out of sight of the referee, and even though he is often seen by the audience on at least one side of the ring, there is nothing the referee can do. Because according to the rules, the referee can only call what he sees."

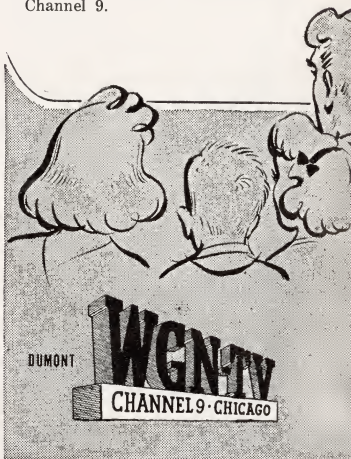

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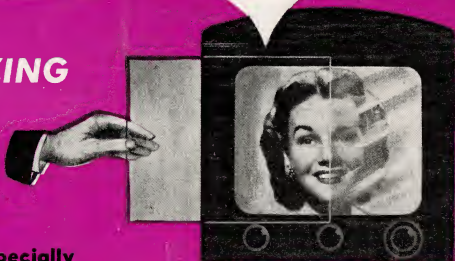
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
