ONE of the few comedians happiest without a script is Chicagoan Jerry Lester, star of WNBQ's "Broadway Open House." We attempted to interview him via long-distance phone but Lester's busy schedule made it impossible so we called on his former school teacher, Miss Melita Skillen, dramatics instructor at Senn.

Fans of Lester have heard the Bean Bag King many times refer to Miss Skillen on the air, but few have had the pleasure of chatting with her about the perpetual-motion comic who barely missed being a professional ballet dancer instead.

Miss Skillen also introduced us to Mrs. Tecla Birk, another Senn teacher, who knew Jerry, and the two of them talked about his 1929 and 1930

days in school. They recalled seeing the young thespian do serious as well as humorous roles like the character of Messr. Beaucaire in "Molyneaux."

From the very beginning, they said, they felt Jerry was going to be an outstanding person. They *knew* he was going places—"or die young." Probably his best-remembered role was in "Charley's Aunt," in which he appeared with Brett Morrison and Hugh Marlowe.

Senn high school, we discovered, is the only high school in the city having a full-time dramatics course. It was in this class that Jerry Lester captured the admiration of Miss Skillen.

Miss Skillen told us that Jerry had a good record in all of his courses. She rated him superior in his dramatic ability, and certainly his talent in making people laugh. It was very easy to see that in Miss Skillen, Jerry Lester had a strong ally who was interested in his welfare.

That was true also of Mrs. Birk, who had a story to recall. "After a class upset one day, I kept Jerry to get a better understanding. He said his ambition was to be a comedian, and with considerable effort intended to go to the top."



Mrs. Birk confided that Jerry was so sure of himself that she believed at least one part of what he said. "Alright," she answered, "If that's your attitude, I'm willing to go along with you. When you say something funny we'll all laugh with you and enjoy it. . . . My sense of humor is as good as the average."

"But when it's not funny," Mrs. Birk recalled saying, "I'm certainly going to tell you, and we're not going to have this class upset."

The result was that Jerry Lester was no longer a problem at Senn and both students and teachers had fun with him.

Some years later, when Jerry played the Uptown theater in Chicago, he returned to Senn one afternoon and walked unannounced into the classroom dancing and kidding in typical Lester fashion. The class was at first stunned by his entrance, and then exploded. For about 10 minutes he kept up the line while Mrs. Birk prayed the principal would not show up to find an economics class turned into a vaudeville show.

"I would have liked seeing the dean walk in," Miss Skillen told us jokingly.

Only a few Sundays ago Jerry tossed off another salute to Miss Skillen when he and Burr Tillstrom appeared on the Colgate Comedy Hour. Tillstrom was also a student of Miss Skillen's, and has the same high regard for her as does Jerry.

Bean Bag Jerry Lester may never negotiate peace terms at the United Nations, but he is making America take down its hair and laugh. His performances on "Broadway Open House" have been called "fracturing," "stampeding" and "amazing," all of which bespeak of chaos.



Lester was born in Chicago February 16, 1910. After graduating from Senn he attended Northwestern university. His father, a music critic, gave young Lester a well-rounded musical training. Jerry studied ballet dancing with Marcel Berger and took voice lessons from Alexander Nakutin, famous as the singing coach of the opera star Tito Schipa.

BURNS & ALLEN



WACKY is the word for George Burns and Gracie Allen, WBKB stars featured on the cover of this week's *TV Forecast* Magazine. Most Chicagoans agree: they look and act the way they sound.

In radio, George Burns was more often known as the stooge, the straight-man who helped Gracie with her never-ending collection of jokes. Now, on television, George is a new man. With cigar in hand, he calmly opens and closes each new chapter in the lives of these uproariously funny CBS comedians, in a manner so disarming you cannot but help like this same couple that has entertained radio audiences for more than 17 years.

Grace Ethel Cecile Rosalie Allen (the lady's full moniker) was one of four daughters of Edward Allen, a song-and-dance man then booked in San Francisco. There is no evidence that her birth had any connection with the earthquake of that year.

By the time Gracie Allen was three and a half years old, she could talk so well she made her stage debut. She



didn't make a career of it then, however, returning to school books until she was 14. Then, through with book learning, she went behind the footlights to hoof with her three older sisters.

Soon after, she lit out with the Larry Reilly Company as an Irish colleen, doing jigs and singing songs of Irish laughter. She developed a brogue she had difficulty shaking later. The colleen left the Reilly company over a disagreement over billing. That was at Hoboken, N. J., which is, she discovered, a short train or ferry distance from New York City. Weary of what seemed an insecure livelihood in the theatre, she joined a secretarial school to learn the secrets of shorthand and a typewriter.

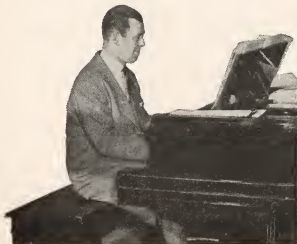
It was while she was at school that a girl friend, Rena Arnold, persuaded Gracie to take a trip back to New Jersey to catch a vaudeville act playing at Union Hill. The act was a comedy routine, with song and dance, in which a male comedian was supported by a

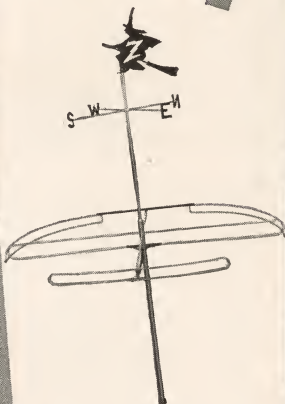

You would have liked her. So many half-hour dramas are trite because of their shortness, but Lux does very well, considering the time taken out for commercials.

One of the best cooking shows is the one with Louise Leslie on WBKB the same time Kate Smith is on WNBQ. She's hefty enough so you feel she enjoys her own cooking. I also like the exercise show on WBKB in the morning. They tell you what you're doing, and why. It isn't too long. The radio exercise shows used to be on so long I got tired and gave up. The girl who does the exercise on WBKB is named Inky, and she has such a cute figure you hope you can get something like her.

their kids win dogs which are given away on several programs. How'd you like to have your kids trot home with a Great Dane pup?

Once a week they have a children's section. She tells a children's story while the camera watches the faces of 8 or 10 kids in the studio. Their expressions are wonderful.

It's a crime that they replaced Panhandle Pete and Jennifer three days a week with Gabby Hayes. There are so many stupid Western pictures on the air already, and the live shows are so much better. Between the mush-mouth way he talks and Howdy Doody's mangling of the language, you won't be able to understand kids, the way they like to imitate. We should have more children's shows with good enunciation.

I wish Stewart Granger would be on TV. Mmmmmmm.

Playing fairs in the Chicago district to earn money during summer vacations, Lester made his debut as a comedian when a torn ligament temporarily halted his ballet dancing. He had to talk—and talk he did, starting a career which earned him the title of the “Talking Comic.” He ad libbed through a routine for ten curtain calls.

An audition with Gus Edwards one afternoon while Lester was still in college started him on his professional stage career that same night. Gus Edwards took one look at Lester's imitation of Ted Lewis and his tap dance routine, and Northwestern had lost a student.

Lester made his first NBC appearance as guest artist on the “Shell Chateau” with Al Jolson. In 1940 he was signed to appear on the Summer program which replaced the vacationing “Bob Hope Show.” The following year he was featured regularly on NBC's “Kraft Music Hall.” His unbroken chain of radio-comedy successes led right up to the “Jerry Lester Show” on another network.

Off the air, the former dancer has left patrons howling at the Copacabana and the Latin Quarter in New York; the Blackstone and the Chez Paree in Chicago; and Ciro's in Hollywood, to mention only a few night clubs.

Lester's frequent Broadway appearances have included star comedy roles in Earl Carroll's “Vanies,” Vinton Freedly's “Jackpot,” George Abbott's musical comedy, “Beat the Band,” and Leonard Sillman's revue, “All in Fun.”

When “Broadway Open House” is over at midnight, Lester boards the first possible train for Old Greenwich, Conn., where he is known as something of a country squire. His main preoccupations at his Connecticut home are his barbecue pit and his impressive collection of old United States coins.

Lester's greatest discovery is an amazing amazon known as Dagmar. The 23-year old beauty, whose 120 pounds and five-foot eight inch frame is topped by a mass of strawberry blonde hair, has just one order: “stay in camera range, that's all.”

In real life, Dagmar is Jenny Lester, a native of Huntington, W. Va., where she attended high school and business college. In 1944, after a career as a prize-winning tap-dancer as well as prize winning typist, Dagmar set out for New York and a career on the stage. She made one appearance at an audition and hasn't been out of work since. She landed a job with Olsen and Johnson's “Laffin Room Only” after only two months in New York.

In 1946 she toured USO camps and Army hospitals, entertaining the troops. She returned to the stage in 1948 with Bert Lahr in the hit musical, “Burlesque.”

female "straight" assistant. The girl, Billy Lorraine, was leaving the act, and Gracie had a chance to replace her. She went backstage, met the man and won the job. The man, of course, was George Burns.

Burns, too, had been in show business since he was a child. Born Nathan Birnbaum in New York January 20, 1896, he organized, while under ten years of age, a group of child singers known as the Peewee Quartet. They sang in taverns and saloons, and passed a hat. Gus Edwards took over the act, but Burns took his changing voice to strike out alone. Before he was out of adolescence, he had been a trick roller skater, a dancing teacher and a vaudeville comedian of some repute.

The new act of Burns and Allen started, as did the old act of Burns and Lorraine, with George Burns as the funny man. They played three shows, for which they got \$15 and something infinitely more important. George found that Gracie got more laughs than he did. Being no dope, George immediately switched the act and made Gracie the comedian. Today George is probably the most famous straight man on radio. Privately, he is a sharp wit who more than holds his own in such fast company as Jack Benny and Groucho Marx.

Burns and Allen played the vaudeville circuit for three years, during which time George became convinced that he wanted Gracie for a life partner as well as a stage partner. He courted her, but was spurned. Gracie just couldn't make up her mind. On Christmas Day, 1925, he gave her ten days to make up her mind. She waited nine days and then said yes. They were married in Cleveland on Jan. 7, 1926. "I owed Gracie \$20," George wisely cracks, "so we decided to take a gamble."

Jack Benny, playing in San Francisco, thought he would rib his newlywed friends. He telephoned the Burnses at 3 AM on their wedding night. Getting an answer from a man, Benny asked "Hello? George?" A gruff voice answered "Send up two orders of ham and eggs," and the phone was slammed

down. Burns knew how to take care of practical jokers.

It was in 1933 that Gracie panicked the nation by a search for her brother. Not only did she continue the gag on her own show, but she popped up with it on other programs. Her real brother, a San Francisco accountant, was forced to go into hiding until the gag ran its course. Not until 1942 did Burns and Allen appear as a married couple on the air.

Gracie has made a smart thing of acting dumb. She has been versatile and clever enough to have confounded the experts in appearances on "Information Please," to have covered the political conventions of 1944, to write syndicated articles, and to paint surrealistic pictures. She has appeared in many motion pictures, some of them without George. Their first movie was "Big Broadcast of 1932."

The two moved to Hollywood in 1934, and bought a twelve-room home of their own in Beverly Hills. The modest house does have a swimming pool. They have two adopted children, Sandra Jean, born in July 1934, and Ronald John, born a year later.

Gracie is five feet tall; George is five feet nine inches. She calls him Nate. and he calls her Googie. Her nickname came from an incident many years ago when she asked him to say something funny.

"Googie, googie," George said.

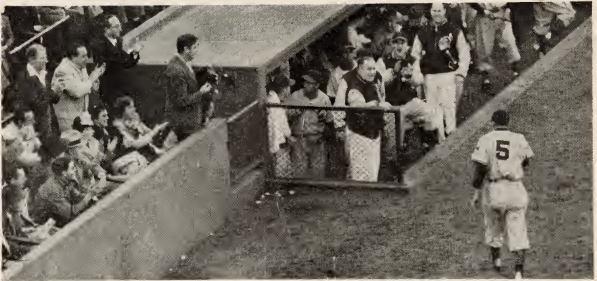
Gracie laughed, and has been Googie to George ever since.

Lou spends his time keeping in shape at Thornton high school by working out with Tom Nisbet's basketball squad. He also has one of those rugged after-dinner speaking schedules but primarily, he is enjoying the relaxation so appreciated by ballplayers after a rough major league season.

Chicago's Massro Whirls To Fame In Derby

You either like it or you don't. There's no in between. That's the customary reaction of TV viewers watching the Roller Derby every week over WENR-TV. If you like it, you'll soon find yourself rooting for Chicago's contribution to Roller Derby competition — Russ Massro, Coach of the Chicago Westerners. Russ, like most kids today, began as a Roller Derby fan, watching his idol Billy Bogash of the New York Chiefs.

An alumnus of Chicago's Lake View high school, Massro came up the hard way. He started street skating when he was eight years old in front of his family's home at 1137 Addison street. As he grew older, he branched out from the neighborhood sidewalk race campaigns into the roller rinks around the windy city and later became the first alumnus of the Uptown Arcadia Speed Club to enter the Roller Derby.

"I often think of how I used to look at the great Bogash whirling around the track at the Chicago Coliseum. Now here I am matching strides with him on the track and strategy off the track. He's sure a tough guy to beat," said Russ.

Massro studied the printing trade at Lakeview, working with his grand-

father as apprentice printer but the skating urge was in his blood. "I tried out three times in Chicago, then in Milwaukee, and finally in Kansas City," recalled Russ. "They kept turning me down. When the Derby would move on, I'd be in the next city before they got there. Finally, they got tired of my pestering and I got a job on the construction crew. Later I became the skate boy. That was heaven to me."

A "skate boy" is required to do a multitude of jobs. They sweep out the quarters, pick up towels, and bring coffee for the wheelers. The pay isn't much, but they get the satisfaction from seeing a lot of Derby skating from the inside of the track. Massro watched intently, asked questions, and took skating tips in earnest. Everyday, whenever he could get someone to skate with him, he'd practice on the banked saucer-like track.

He learned how to jump over chairs, how to block and repel blocks. Soon he mastered the art of relaxing when he was spilled—a trick so essential in avoiding serious injuries. Lanky and awkward at first, Russ was taken under the wing of another Chicago North Sider currently coaching Brooklyn, Ken Monte. Another famous skater to take an interest in the ambitious kid's training was Billy Bogash. With the combined talents of Monte and Bogash as tutors, Massro took his instructions seriously and began to develop rapidly, but not without the usual mishaps.

He was such a stumbler around the masonite track that he actually became a menace to welfare of other training skaters. It was during such a practice drill that he knocked out four of Mary Lou Palermo's front teeth.

"I fell down in Houston, she and the rest of the pack piled up over me," said Russ. "That's when she had her teeth knocked out. I was to blame, all right."

Mary Lou was forgiving, however, and even rates Russ as one of her very best friends . . . Three months later, Massro got his big chance when he was summoned to skate in Milwaukee.

Time and again he crashed and the pack came roaring and tumbling into him. It was his proclivity of falling so often, generally at the wrong times, that gave him the name "Rubber Legs." It required two years to wear off that brand. Despite his spills, he managed to escape serious injuries. Although his spills were damaging to the opponents, they were equally as damaging to his team mates . . . "I know of no man who hurt so many other people, accidentally, and hurt himself so slightly," said Bogash . . . To date, Massro has suffered four brain concussions—all from hitting the rail—and a broken wrist.

The whirlwind sport was born on a table linen in 1935 at Rickett's North Side restaurant in Chicago. Sired by Leo A. Seltzer, the Roller Derby finally hit big league stride as America's fifth major sport last year.

The Derby is considered the roughest of all sports for women, yet, the girl skaters seem to take physical punishment in better stride than most

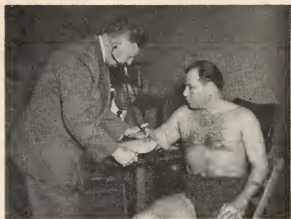
men. They compete equally with men, although not against each other, on the same physically dangerous level. In the Roller Derby, Seltzer sees a panacea for broken homes; a shock treatment for neurotics or hypochondriacs; crowd thrills by the wholesale and a whale of a game that calls for brains, brawn and guts with teams of men and women racing around a dangerously banked track at break neck speeds. Just tune in WENR-TV some Thursday evening and see for yourself.

"Tiger Joe" Marsh, a rugged wrestler of some stature, visited Chicago long enough to spend a few days with friends and to appear in a match against Paul Martin at Rainbo (WENR-TV, Wed.). Typical among leading grapplers is "Tiger Joe." A Chicagoan, "Tiger" has wrestled professionally for 24 years, served in the Navy during the last war, and can currently be seen in his second movie as a tough Bos'n in "Panic In The Streets."



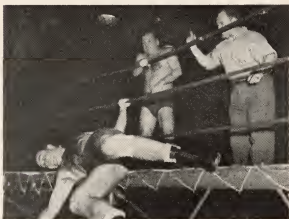

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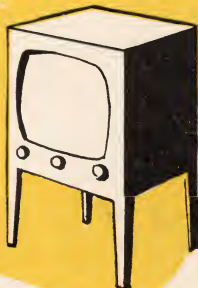
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
