# The Hanky Makers "STRIKE IT RICH"

AT THE birth of the quiz show, when sixty-four dollars symbolized a triumph of the intellect over stage-fright, radio audiences laughed their approval. A bungling contestant, a fumbled answer, an unconsciously cute story meant an hilarious time for radio listeners.

Today, quiz shows are not so funny. The public, jaded with the question and answer game after a decade or so, is not laughing any more. Still, new quiz shows, courting hilarity, keep popping up—some of them disguised comedy programs, others lifeless panel quizzes played for double-edged laughs.

One particular quizzer, however, is not in the market for laughing faces. Entitled "Strike It Rich," the show is put to the humor test would probably rate only a far cry. For in the most basic sense of the expression, "Rich" (pluckily billed as the "quiz with a heart") is a good old fashioned tear-jerker.

Emceed by the suitably sympathetic Warren Hull, the show is a kind of court of human agonies that doles out money instead of wordy advice. The format consists in some needy person relating to emcee Hull his problem, then answering a series of questions which will net the unfortunate enough to aid him. The result is some happy tears and the feeling that Christmas comes six times a week, fifty two weeks a year.

Money not being everything, a special feature of the CBS show is the "heart line," an on-the-spot telephone which carries word from time to time of any outside help from viewers who are touched enough to further help the contestant. An invalid mother will be presented with a free airline ticket to

visit her daughters in California. A boy who is losing his sight will be financed for a delicate eye operation. An artificial limb will be donated to an amputee victim.

Needless to say, the effect on the viewing audience and more particularly, the studio audience, is trying. Cameras catch agonizing glimpses of the strained, often times tearful faces of the people watching the show. It's a touching, even uncomfortable insight into the problems of the "other fellow." But how the women love it.

The man who keeps this show free from the vale of sweat and tears is a familiar voice to those who remember radio's "Vox Pop" program. As co-emcee on the show with Parks Johnson, Warren Hull became an old hand at guiding ordinary people through the ticklish business of telling their own intimate stories. Any experience he gained on "Vox Pop" has become a crafty tool in keeping "Strike It Rich" from becoming a runaway soap opera without a plot.

"Strike It Rich" is seen daily, Monday through Friday on channel 9 at 10:30 a.m. It is also seen each Wednesday evening on channel 4, 8:00 p.m.

## FOLKS GET POKER FACED



TO SOME people the mention of the Great Stone Face summons up vague ideas of a few chiseled images on Mount Rushmore. But to a vast collection of coast-to-coast television owners, the most famous of stone faces belongs to a rugged-looking

and likable Irishman named Ed Sullivan, who is currently emceeing the top variety show on TV.

As any New Yorker will tell you, Ed Sullivan, besides being a video personality, represents the highly respected by-line which heads a breezy and informative gossip column called "Little Old New York." His newspaper strip blankets the usual coverage of politics, sports and rumors—with a special emphasis on show business. Sullivan has had wide experience with show people. Beside managing a vaudeville troupe himself, he's had his own radio show, has been a great organizer of benefit shows (which he also emceed) and even handled several telecasts of big sporting events.

So it seemed a logical choice when the well-known newspaperman was chosen in the summer of 1948 to emcee a new hour-long variety television program called "Toast of the Town." With a well stocked friendship with celebrities in the show

world, Ed was assured of getting the top stars in the business as guest performers. He had an ample budget with which to work and the first regular big time variety show on TV seemed to be ready.

*But when newspaperman Sullivan stepped from the pages of his morning sheet to make his first appearance as emcee of the "Toast" opus, televiewers got a stark look-see at the proverbial fish out of water.*

It was quite a contrast to the Sullivan who authored the crisp, self-assertive column in the *New York Daily News*. His emceeing was sincere, but wooden, his memorized lines shaky, and on the screen he looked a little like a cigar store Indian draped in a tuxedo.

In spite of this, the show came off well. The acts were top notch—critics and viewers acclaimed it a success. And Sullivan at least had, consciously or not, avoided the cardinal sin in emceeing: hogging the show. Indeed, he was almost inconspicuous. As for his few rough edges in the emcee department, viewers were sure that with time the diamond would become smooth.

Now, three and a half years later, Ed Sullivan is by no means a polished diamond. He still appears wooden and it's a standard gag to kid him about his failure to smile. Some more sympathetic souls have passed the word around that Ed looks uncomfortable on stage because of physical defects. He has been variously connected with having a silver plate in his head, facial paralysis, a twisted spine disorder and some sort of a ring injury as a result of a boxing career.

*But the truth of it is—Broadway's "laughing" boy is physically perfect. Viewers still write inquiring if he might be a hunchback. They get that idea because Sullivan has an extra large neck which gives the unfortunate im-*

*pression that he has no neck at all.*

Admitting to be no Adonis on a television screen, Ed does have a certain indescribable charm. Viewers, who get their fill of the brassy, uninhibited emcees are rather taken with this diffident, sincere performer. Ed explains it himself by saying, "People get maternal about my looking embalmed."

The non-grinning Irishman (he denies the appellation, claiming he now smiles at least once every show) was born 49 years ago in Port Chester, New York, only a few miles from the big city where he was to gain his fame. After graduating from high school he took a job as sports editor of the *Port Chester Daily Item* at \$10 a week. In 1920 he joined the *New York Evening Mail* as a sports writer. Then for twelve years the ambitious youth chronicled sports for various dailies before establishing his "Little Old New York" pillar with the *Daily News*. It is interesting to note that Sullivan took over the space that his rival, Walter Winchell, had before the latter moved over to *The N. Y. Mirror*.

Sullivan's contacts with celebrities in Manhattan, Hollywood and abroad helped bring him right into show business. As emcee of his own radio show in 1933, he introduced to the airwaves such notables as Jimmy Durante, Gertrude Niesen, Irving Berlin, George M. Cohan and Jack Benny. In 1942, on his tenth anniversary on the air, Benny re-

peated on his own program the script of that broadcast.

*Sullivan has done equally as well on TV in presenting star performers to the medium of the time. Such personalities as Margaret Truman, Bob Hope, Charles Laughton, Faye Emerson and Martin & Lewis have made their video debuts on "Toast of the Town."*

Whatever Ed lacks in mechanical perfection as emcee on "Toast" he makes up in progressive innovation. Thus far this season Sullivan has put over three shows by profiling some of the greats in show business. Actress Helen Hayes, Lyricist Oscar Hammerstein II and playwright Robert Sherwood have all been saluted on his show.

The story of Ed Sullivan, the newspaperman, is a somewhat different one from that of the Sunday evening TV personality. The hard-hitting journalist only recently caused a stir by blasting his hated rival Walter Winchell who—it is conceded in the trade—has lost no love on Sullivan.

Long time enemies, the feud has been seething for many years. The current crisis revolved around Negro songstress Josephine Baker who was allegedly refused service in Manhattan's swank Stork Club—a Winchell hangout. In defending his crony Sherman Billingsley (proprietor of the Stork), Winchell made statements about Miss Baker that the French chanteuse considered libelous.

Sullivan made an appearance on a local New York Radio Show after a "Toast" program to make a denouncement of Winchell that rocked the show world. Broadway is still buzzing over the bald faced and scathing going-over the usually docile Sullivan doled out to the feared W. W.

Since that time Ed has said little. His daily column still sparkles with tid-bits of Broadway and the Metropolitan, Tin Pan Alley and the Bronx. Yet most people still regard him as that fellow with the unsmiling face who has no business in show business—but they'd miss him if he wasn't.

# A VeePee Goes to Work

**“SEE IT NOW” with  
Edward R. Murrow**

**“THIS is London.”**

When a grave unemotional voice cracked out those words during the last war, Americans sat up and listened hard. The voice belonged to Edward R. Murrow, CBS radio correspondent, and his program was probably the most informative and interesting on-the-scene news show of the war.

Hitler's march into Vienna, the sell-out at Munich, and the invasions of Africa and Europe were all covered first hand by Murrow. Now seven years after the invasion of Europe, Murrow has invaded television. Instead of relying on the usual TV news format, he has taken the dramatic impact and the inter-relationship of news and crammed a half-hour Sunday show with television's first really original venture in this field.

*A great editor's eye for the historical as compared with the trivial has enabled Ed to feel the real pulse of the week's news. Combining remote shots, films, recordings and his own terse comments, he gives the viewer a sense of history in the making.*

Dark chiselled features and a tall loose body give added dramatic effect to Murrow's personality. A strong facial resemblance to Humphrey Bogart heightens the impression of what a Hollywood foreign correspondent should look like.

Ed graduated from Washington State college and spent his first few



post-graduate years touring the country for the National Student Federation. His first break came when CBS hired him as their Director of Education. In Europe for research work, he uncovered evidence of Hitler's planned coup in Austria. He chartered a plane and was in Vienna when the Nazis arrived. His account of this for CBS won him a coveted Peabody Award, radio's mark of excellence.

Later he won another Peabody award for his "Orchestrated Hell," a survey of the tragedy and horror in London during the Luftwaffe blitz.

*As a CBS post war plum for valuable service, Murrow got a comfortable vice-president's slot. But the executive garb was too binding on his activities and he soon resigned. He has since been placed on the Board of Directors, more or less a figurehead job. His real work continued to be his nightly news show.*

"See It Now" is the natural offspring of a radio series called "Hear It Now," which has in turn followed a series of recordings of historical events and speeches called "I Can Hear It Now," launched in 1949.

A portion of each week's show is de-

# *This is Music*

## Here's A New Approach To A TV Dilemma

The problem of what to do with a musical show on TV has plagued producers since the era of seven inch screens. Music, being essentially a thing for the ear, doesn't demand the graphic eye of a television camera. But most of the TV powers-that-be felt the sight of forty bald headed musicians making beautiful music was not what viewers wanted to see.

The result was that the biggest part of musical TV shows were over-produced. The melody became a slave to a lavish setting or some leggy choreography.

*Two months ago in Chicago a new show called "This Is Music" set the television world straight on how a musical should be handled. As Alexander Gray, the commentator on "This Is Music" pointed out, "We're bringing you music with more sense than setting, more data than dancing, more fact than filigree."*

The show is a fine example of smooth, fluid, low pressure enjoyment. Using a reverse approach to the usual procedure, the program neatly ties in music with patterns that reflect our every day life. The similarity between classical and popular music is demonstrated. For instance, two different approaches to the "blues" were shown in the opening show with a rendition of "St. Louis Blues" compared to the more classical Gershwin number "Bess, You Is My Woman Now."

"This Is Music" is essentially a mood piece. And Alexander Gray as the show's commentator is a happy choice because his natural charm maintains the mood throughout.

Sharing the vocal honors in the popular music category are Lucille Reed and Bill Snary who are getting their initial breaks as regulars in this network show.

Nancy Carr and Bruce Foote, famil-







# MARTIN & LEWIS ARE GREAT AND SMART

## Minute Reviews:

**Amateur Hour:** This descendant of Major Bowes' original brainstorm continues to grab a large share of the audience every time it comes on the air, and I continue to tune it in spasmodically to see if its magic attraction hasn't finally communicated itself to me.

It hasn't. Ted Mack is a nice fellow, Dennis James really punches the commercials, and there's a pleasant, congenial air about the whole thing. But oh, that endless parade of bones players and yodelers and wheezy baritones and harmonica virtuosos. Maybe it's the endless quest for the unexpected that keeps the customers coming each week.

**It's News To Me:** This show illustrates how one personality can lift an ordinary 30 minutes out of the limbo of commonness, and make it a lively, moving, if not exciting, quiz session. More power to John Daly.

**Courtesy Hour:** I hadn't seen one of Jim Moran's movies (nor anyone else's) for more than a year. I sat in on one a week or so ago, and when the commercial came on, went and took a shower. Missed half of the last part of the picture. Some of these sponsors are getting sneaky, cutting their commercials so you can't get a thing done.

**Texaco Star Theater:** This is offered as information, not opinion. On his first show of 1952, Berle sang a parody on "Changes." He allowed that this year

he won't butt into anybody's act, and he'll be quiet and respectful. "Yah, and everybody'll turn on Frank Sinatra," yelled Berle. "There'll be no changes around here."

**Stork Club:** I've already paid my respects to this blight in the Worst Show voting. This is the kind of a show that makes Communists. Mr. Billingsley's disgusting slop on New Year's Eve, when CBS moved its cameras into his club, was even more inept than his 6:45 efforts. I can't quite figure why some of TV's talented satirists don't go to work on this gent. He should be a good replacement for Peter Lorre or Gary Cooper impressions.

**Martin and Lewis:** Their latest show was as strong as anything they've done yet on TV. These men are not only great comedians, they're smart ones, and demonstrate it every week they stay off the air. About four or six appearances a season of M & L will leave us wanting more for years to come.

**Jack Benny:** Ditto.

**Studio One:** This dramatic show will grab off most of the top awards this season, but not because it deserves them. It is riding on its reputation—well earned, but outdated. Celanese Theater sets new standards in writing, acting, directing, and all around brilliance. If I seem to be spending a lot of time plugging Celanese, it's deliberate. It's the high spot of the week, and I will do whatever I can to get as many fellow viewers as possible watching it with me.



Then it is the decision of this board that there are no programs on TV that we can recommend for any audience.

**P**ETITE as a puppy—sultry as a South sea island dancer—gay as a night on the town! You'll find all three types neatly tied together in a diminutive package, Bette Chapel by name.

This "tempest in a teapot" has stormed her way through TV channels via the smooth-sailing "Garroway-at-Large" show and currently is appearing on "The Bunch," formerly "Your Luncheon Date" televised on WNBQ (channel 5) each day between 12:30 and 1 p.m. and now a network production presented one hour earlier.

The five-foot vocalist, an unusual combination of Betty Hutton dynamo and Dinah Shore sweet touch, claims she "just went along for the ride" when her sister auditioned for the vocalist spot with a dance band. But it was Bette who landed the job and toured the Midwest on dance dates.

Later moving to Chicago to study voice, she won solo billing in local night clubs where she was spotted by NBC video scouts. Unlike most TV performers, she had practically no radio experience before plunging into TV.

Today, Bette, who is wed to Bill Wilkes, a Chicago salesman, looks back on

a video career originating with Garroway some two years ago and studded with unforgettable experiences. Such as the time she and Cliff Norton, dressed as tramps and painted like clowns, combined their talents for "Whistle a Happy Tune." Immediately afterwards, Bette had to wash her face, put on makeup and change her whole attire—IN THREE MINUTES—for her part in the finale. She must have set a new record for women—she was back in a minute and a half.

Her schedule now is equally demanding of split-second timing with script discussions, song rehearsals, dress rehearsals and program-planning conferences each day.

Garroway appropriately dubbed her "La Chapel," because Bette is of Italian ancestry, a plausible explanation for her olive skin, dancing dark eyes and vivacious personality.

Her TV schedule, rigorous though it is, allows her to devote just enough time to her other-than-TV talents—homemaking, sketching her own ideas for formal gowns, spinning through the park on a bicycle, collecting shoes or preparing fried chicken a la Chapel!

# Beauty

## from top to toe

Stress Naturalness in '52 says Patricia Vance

**I**T'S just about time to begin breaking those New Year resolutions you made so painstakingly on January 1.

But, watch out for those beauty resolutions! They're a year-round responsibility, not made to be broken or even bent slightly if you want to preserve a well-groomed appearance in 1952.

*This authoritative view comes from Patricia Vance, former Powers model who is at present a Chicago TV star and director of the Patricia Vance Charm and Modeling School and its branches.*

Heading the list of New Year beauty resolutions for all women is the need for naturalness, says Miss Vance, whether it's in personality, makeup or dress. "Artificiality is the quickest way to hide your true beauty," she warns.

Here's a practice list containing some of Miss Vance's other resolution suggestions for a beauty-filled 1952: Do they match yours?

(1) Resolved: That I appear well-groomed (and bolster my budget at the same time) by buying simple clothes and varying them with accessories. (Flowers, scarves, pins add a chic note to the smart 'n' simple basic dress. Added tip: Try pinning a flower at the back of the collar for an unusual note.)

(2) Resolved: That I go easy on the makeup, always striving for the natural look. (Makeup suggestion: Apply a thin film of powder base, brushing first with kleenex, then with a soft cosmetic brush to achieve an even application.)

(3) Resolved: That I keep my face CLEAN, scrubbing off all traces of the

day's makeup each night. (A good washcloth with lots of soap is still a woman's best cosmetic aid, Miss Vance stresses. Daily beauty routine: Cleanse face with soap and water first; apply cream, using a rotary motion to get into pores and give skin a gentle stimulation; leave on for 10 or 15 minutes, then wipe off. Approximately 95% of the female species have dry skin, she estimates, and for these a face cream with an oily base is a fine beauty aid. For those with oily skin, Miss Vance suggests keeping a tiny bottle of skin freshener in the desk or purse and cleansing the skin frequently to prevent blackheads.)

(4) Resolved: That I ban artificiality from my hair coloring. (It's a shame to see young girls who dye or bleach their hair constantly, this beauty authority says. No matter what color the hair is, it can be attractive without artificiality.)

(5) Resolved: That I won't follow the trends toward sophistication if they don't suit my figure or personality. ("A girl is a girl is a girl" Miss Vance believes and adds that teen-agers should resist the "blasé" approach to life, practiced by many of their older sisters, and enjoy their "precious years.")

(6) Resolved: That if I diet, I will do so sensibly. (Avoid the lettuce leaves and skimmed milk only routines. Instead, eat healthy, well-balanced meals—meat or fish twice a day and eggs at least once each day. For between-meal snacks, munch on raw celery or carrots. But, go all out against starvation diets!)

(7) Resolved: That I will protect my feet by wearing comfortable and sen-

sible shoes. (The closed-heel, closed-toe pump, available in various heel heights for abbreviated, average and king-size damsels, is tops in fashion, according to the models, and excellent for foot support. Watch out for a loose sloppy shoe which will result eventually in thickening legs and ankles.)

(8) Resolved: That I will dress appropriately for each occasion. (Blue jeans, for example, have their place—on picnics and outings—but not in school or for shopping expeditions.)

(9) Resolved: That I will always keep a full supply of brushes on hand to aid me in a well-groomed appearance. (Brushes are a direct route to beauty, Miss Vance declares, whether they're for clothes, face, nails, shoes, teeth or body.)

Now married to Charles Vance, who manages the school and agency, this beauty authority is also the mother of a four-year-old daughter, Pamela, who frequently appears with "Mommy" on her Wednesday morning television show. Miss Vance was embarking on a modeling career at 16—when most teen-agers are concerned with hamburgers and french fries at the corner snack shop, the latest swoon-crooner platter, or movie fan clubs.

During the World's Fair in New York in 1940, Miss Vance, at 17, was starred in the first regular series of TV programs sponsored by RCA. Winning over more than 1,000 applicants, she appeared in over 6,000 television performances which earned for her the title, "Most Televised Girl in America."

Almost five years ago, she wrote,

produced and starred here in a weekly series for WBKB, "Your Appointment With Charm," which provided hints on improvement of charm, poise, posture, personality, walking, figure, grace, wardrobe, makeup, better grooming, voice and diction, business and social etiquette.

A similar program was written, produced and narrated by Miss Vance in Miami for WTVJ, the city's first television station. The series, first live show over the station, was sponsored by leading department stores and specialty shops in Miami until she returned North in the summer of 1949.

In addition to TV, Pat Vance also wrote, produced and presented her own radio show, "Patricia Steps Out," originally aired over Station WFIL in Philadelphia and later coast to coast on NBC from New York. And she instituted a course with the University of Miami, Florida, which offers three college credits and is designed to "cultivate poise and assurance and general self-improvement in appearance and personality."

Miss Vance can be seen on Channel 4 (WBKB) from 10 to 10:30 a.m. each Wednesday on the Breakfast Party and from noon to 12:30 p.m. each Sunday as emcee on the juvenile talent show, "Stairway to Stardom," also on WBKB.

TV Forecast suggests another resolution: Consult your local beauty shops periodically for makeup and hair fashions. These visits are "musts" for good grooming as well as investments which pay off in attractive dividends.

FOR the past two decades a fancy watering place in midtown Manhattan called the "Stork Club" has been symbolic of American night life at its gaudiest. Top-hatted celebrities regularly parade their lack of virtue for the benefit of star-gazing folk who are happily shunted to less conspicuous tables in the rear of the establishment.

It was inevitable that someone in television would corral all this loose talent into a show so that the folks at home could watch and admire. The result is a fifteen minute interview stint, featuring Stork Club owner Sherman Billingsley.

*Billingsley is a displaced Oklahoman, who in his native state made enough money with a soft drink stand and a drug store to buy into a prohibition era New York speakeasy. This later became the "Stork."*

With this string of successes behind him it is surprising that his television show has not prospered. A year and a half after its debut, the shows ratings are poor. The critics have panned it. And the National Television Review Board has it on the objectionable list.

One of the main weaknesses of the show is host Billingsley. For a worldly cafe owner he is surprisingly unpolished. Stoutish and blunt spoken, he seems to fumble his way through an interview.

*But it is the atmosphere of splendor that never existed, and the phoney half-world of glamour-for-sale that is hardest to take. Weary TV fans, after a rough day at the plant or the office, are asked to digest the pompous success stories of a group whose only apparent daily effort is extracting themselves from bed early in the afternoon.*

The Josephine Baker incident has also left a bad taste in the public's mouth. When the negro star tried to spend an evening at the Stork, she found that a color line prevailed. Billingsley refused to serve her. She, in turn, caused a mild rumpus and took her case to the newspapers.

Billingsley and Walter Winchell, who have been passing themselves off as great social consciences, took to the attack. They tried to smear Miss Baker's past, but succeeded only in unearthing embarrassing evidence that she had been honored by the French Government for her heroic work with the French Underground during World War II. Red-faced Winchell now has a juicy defamation-of-character suit on his hands.

The after dark shenanigans at the Stork will probably continue to be chronicled by name-dropping columnists. But the public seems to be adopting a "who cares" attitude toward the whole business.

Murrow's political views, as anyone else's, will undoubtedly color his reporting, yet the overall coverage is on a very high level. The simultaneous shot of the Golden Gate Bridge and the George Washington bridge had a thrilling effect. Some idea of the scope and the wonder of America can be conveyed when old newshand Murrow is around to keynote the proceedings. "See It Now" is history learned the easy way.

**A** TELEVISION demonstration in Helsinki, Finland has made Finland's sports fans optimistic about prospects for viewing the 1952 Olympic games to be staged there this Spring. Director "Doug" Gabrielle, summoned for jury duty, was locked behind closed doors without communication for 48 hours. . . . The shortest chess game in history was played on the Russ Davis show over WGN-TV recently. Two champions, playing with a time limit of 5 seconds between moves, completed the game in five minutes when Dick Nedved of Glencoe checkmated Abraham Kaufman of Chicago.

Marion Ladewig, the slim Michigan housewife, averaged 203 pins per game to win her third consecutive bowling title. You saw her in action during the 11th Annual All-Star Bowling Tourney. In establishing new all-time records in the women's field, she actually outscored 160 men competing for the men's title.

Since the Roller Derby was pulled off TV in Chicago, Leo Seltzer has been deluged with 15,000 letters of protest from Chicago fans. 


