NEW YORK—It's reported that the daily newspapers are not too keen about Dave Garroway's news-glutted TV experiment "Today." Some dailies are not publicizing the morning show anymore and others are forgetting to list it in their program listings. . . . Mild mannered Senator Estes Kefauver is slated for another extra-curricular job due to his famous televised crime hearings. He will appear in a film entitled "Captive City" with his fee going to the Cordell Hull Foundation for World Peace. . . . NBC is about to close a deal with the progressive Metropolitan Opera general manager Rudolph Bing calling for a generous number of the Met's top singers for frequent appearances on the net's top musical shows. . . . The "Gerard" of radio fame, Arnold Stang (he was comic Henry Morgan's chief laugh-getter) is going TV. He will star in a show entitled "Malcolm Murdock, Boy Detective," a tongue-in-cheek lampoon of video's private eyes.

The rests between shows for hard working Sid Caesar and Imogene Coca are few and short. The rehearsals for the comedy team's Saturday night "Show of Shows" begins on Monday. . . . CBS, in a refrain of their what-to-do-about-Saturday night theme song, has decided to expand Steve Allen's "Songs for Sale" to a ninety minute show. The network's proposed "extravaganza" to compete with "Show of Shows" has been shelved for this season, anyhow.

The huzzahs for Jack Webb's radio import "Dragnet" aren't dying down since the mystery series made its first few TV appearances. Webb has parlayed a documentary style with some refreshing underplaying plus an intelligent profiling of the police department into the kind of mystery show that is making other TV whodunits look like hangovers from the silent screen era. . . . A woman on the sentimental quiz show "Strike It Rich," made mention that her son, now in the army was an author. "Does he write for money?" asked emcee Warren Hull. "Yes," said the woman, "in every letter he sends home."

A very hot bid is being made by both major networks, NBC and CBS, to book Laurence Olivier and Vivien Leigh's productions of "Caesar and Cleopatra" and "Antony and Cleopatra" for successive night TV shots. The two legit are currently playing to packed houses on Broadway and the plan is to put the plays on television at the end of their current run. . . . It is not true as rumored that Groucho Marx intends to call it quits in show business after this year. The funniest of the zany brother team is even considering another picture with his brothers Harpo and Chico—in addition to his television show. . . . There has been considerable furor stirred up by the actors union in protest of the "blacklisting" of actor Phillip Loeb (Molly's husband Jake in "The Goldbergs") because of his listing in "Red Channels." Loeb is demanding a hearing to deny the charges.

With NBC and CBS set with sponsors for the July political conventions, ABC is dickering with Time and Life magazines for a sponsorship deal. Henry R. Luce, the Life-Time publisher and tub thumper for Eisenhower as president, could use the television time to advantage—except that NBC and CBS have left few independent stations for their network rival to offer Luce.

WOULD GRACIE ALLEN MAKE A GOOD PRESIDENT?

ASKING me that is like asking Mrs. Eisenhower if General Ike would make a good television comedienne. Frankly, I can't say. I've never been a President's husband so your guess is as good as mine. But, here's something that may give you a rough idea of Gracie's qualifications.

A few years ago Gracie did run for the Presidency, but she did it indirectly. When she learned she'd have to swear she was 35 or over, she withdrew in favor of her Uncle Sidney. She managed his election campaign and, as she herself says, she'd have been the same kind of President he would, if he'd been elected—because they not only hold the same political views but also have the same type of minds.

What a campaign that was! Gracie had thousands of posters printed with catchy campaign slogans like: "Uncle Sidney for President! He's Never Let the Voters Down . . . All He Asks Is a Chance!" Another was: "Uncle Sid . . . He's One In a Million." He was, too. In fact, in a country of 150 million he was even less. Anyway, nobody ever saw these posters. Gracie kept them hidden so Mr. Taft and the other candidates wouldn't get wise to Uncle Sidney's campaign strategy.

She also wrote speeches for him. They promised that if Uncle Sidney

didn't make the U.S. a better place to live in, then he'd find some other way for the tax-payers to spend their time. Of course, some of their campaign promises were silly, but nobody knew that because Gracie kept them secret, too. She had her Uncle dictate all his speeches into a rubber hose and they were used to inflate spare tires. But Uncle Sidney carried secrecy too far. He didn't even want anyone to know he was shaking hands to get voters... and he was finally caught shaking hands with a voter who still had his hand in his pocket.

He finally dropped the campaign when he learned that, as President, he wouldn't be able to collect his weekly Unemployment check. Personally, I don't think Gracie or her Uncle had a chance of actually being elected. But—as Mr. Dewey will tell you—you never know what voters will do.

REVIEW

Simple Principles

THE National Television Review Board, an independent group of private citizens, this week released its Citizens' Television Code as a guide for the TV industry. The Code has been formulated only after the Board has been in existence for 20 months, reviewing and rating shows during that period.

Membership on the NTRB is composed of outstanding Chicagoland citizens who are primarily interested in TV's effect on family life. Members include Mrs. Byron Harvey Jr., Rev. Donald Masterson, Mr. George Jennings, Judge David Mandell, Mr. Samuel Culbertson II, Mr. David Balkin, Mr. Jesse Owens, Lt. Robert A. Kubicek, Mr. Martin O'Shaughnessy and Miss Helen Mawer (Secretary).

Each month, TV programs are reviewed and rated. The findings are published monthly by TV Forecast as a public service and an aid to the TV industry.

The new Code is an attempt to set down simple, basic principles of programming, rather than bog down TV producers with a maze of legalistic, heavily-detailed mumbo jumbo. The Board stresses its willingness to allow the widest possible artistic freedom to program executives, in order that TV's creative effort is not stifled by a ponderous mass of legislation.

• A Citizens' Television Code

Presented by the National Television Review Board

We believe that the dynamic and tremendous influence of television should be directed towards information and

education as well as entertainment.

We further believe that the aim of television should be the betterment of citizens everywhere, that the eventual purpose of this great communications medium should focus its main attention on basic natural values—the dignity and integrity of man, the existence of God, the love of, and loyalty to, family, church, country and one's fellow-man.

We believe that laughter and fun are necessary to the enjoyment of life.

We reject the idea of absolute censorship. We prefer a sense of responsibility on the part of those who present television programs. We as citizens therefore present this guidance list of television standards for the benefit of stations, networks, agencies, sponsors, producers and performers.

• Definitions

Approved—Either entirely wholesome, adequately wholesome, completely harmless or sufficiently harmless.

Variable—Offensive either as a regular minor part of a program, or occasionally offensive as the performers and/or program content change from week to week.

Objectionable—Completely harmful or offensive, or sufficiently harmful or offensive as to dominate the program theme.

"For Children and Family," or "For Adults"—Programs are broken into two categories, depending upon (in Board's judgment) whether program is aimed at children or adults.

In general, the Board recognizes that some programs are dull, some mediocre, and some interesting. In no instance

will the Board attempt to provide professional criticism of technique or presentation. In all cases, the fundamental question will be: "Is this show good for ourselves and our family?"

• What Shall Be Deemed Objectionable

1. Immoral, lewd and suggestive words and actions, as well as indecency in dress.
2. A deliberate presentation of vulgar and sordid situations.
3. Irreverence towards religion or patriotic symbols where it is not essential to a dramatic situation.
4. Excessive bad taste in words and actions, deliberately projected for their own effect.
5. Excessive frivolity concerning established traditions of family authority and customs.
6. Malicious derision of racial or national groups.
7. Undue glorification of criminals and undesirables.
8. Excessive violence, bloodshed and cruelty.
9. Excessive noise, confusion and tumult to a point where it disrupts normal family relations.
10. Any ideas, situations or presentations that essentially injure the dignity of God and mankind and the inalienable right of human integrity.
11. Shows which tend to glamorize false values.
12. Disloyal or subversive sentiments which might injure the United States.

WITH March still around the corner, optimists are turning their thoughts to spring—just one step behind fashion designers who have already debuted their initial forecast for '52 spring apparel.

TV Forecast for women presents these spring fashion trends as modeled by Jean Cordell, Chicago songstress who appears on the Bill Ballance show at 10:30 p.m. Monday through Friday on WBKB (Channel 4). Clothes are presented through the courtesy of Carson Pirie Scott & Co.

Here, in abbreviated form, is the spring fashion picture as outlined by the country's leading stylists:

COLORS: All shades of blue, beige

and white will lead the fashion color parade.

TEXTURE: Material has grown increasingly important with the feeling of the weave giving the fabric a definite profile.

STYLES: Silhouettes emerge as the style keynote with two shapes predominating—the narrow slim figure—with emphasis on ease and the full defined shape featuring pleats and folds.

- (1) Jackets: The shorter the better with brief box varieties, (often double-breasted), ranking high on the "in-style" list.
- (2) Skirts: Both narrow and full styles show promise of popularity with the latter

controlled and worn without petticoats unless "built-in." No change is evident in skirt lengths which will again vary with individual tastes.

- (3) Coats: Extra-brief toppers are the newest vogue.
- (4) Evening wear: Covered shoulders get the fashion nod over the former favorite—the strapless. Lace and chiffon are forging ahead to capture the popularity lead in materials for those special events.
- (5) Sleeves: More puffs forecast in the Gibson Girl tra-

dition with the puffiness slipping way down to the elbows.

- (6) Shoulders: The shoulder line will remain natural with less padding evident.

FASHION EMPHASIS: A strong trend toward a back-to-femininity fashion scene is indicated with particular stress on the high look or empire waistline. This new look can be achieved through use of short fitted jackets (introduced by Dior) which end under the bustline, by high belts or bodice-emphasis.

They Come, They See, SHE Conquers

A Cincinnati television studio is the scene each week-day of a Julius Caesar quotation parody: Fifty people come, they see, but are conquered by the namesake of the Ruth Lyons' 50 club.

So named because it is limited to 50 guests, this housewives' sorority, dedicated to women who "don't have much to do except housework," has quietly and in unheralded fashion, carved a niche for itself in the network daytime web of programs.

Miss Lyons, a middle-aged blue-eyed blonde, who steers the conversation and activities through a helter-skelter pattern each day, has the power to captivate her audience. She and her hen-pecked announcer, "Willie," whose vocabulary is limited mainly to an occasional "What happened?," "That's true," or "Uh-huh," open the program with a gay song 'n' dance introduction faintly reminiscent of burlesque.

Perhaps Miss Lyons will offer a joke as an ice-breaker such as "If the pilgrims came over on the Mayflower, how did the midgets arrive?" Then, with a sly glance toward the audience, television cameras and Willie, she'll chirp: "On SHRIMP boats."

This animated femcee uses the now-familiar informal approach to the audience, strolling through for personal chit-chat, reading mail from far-away places, conducting a musical chairs session during which guests receive prizes if seated in the "lucky" chairs, and cementing these ingredients into program continuity with interspersed musical numbers and a constant stream of almost inane chatter.

The special Lyons magic, when analyzed, is primarily a combination of cosmopolitan personality and a spark of

Midwestern corn which adds up to housewife appeal. Employing a Kate Smith style of informality, volatile Ruth occasionally philosophizes, always with an overtone of merriment, but more often chatters like the proverbial chipmunk.

There's an air of the giddy, scatter-brained clubwoman—ala Gracie Allen—about this TV celebrity from Cincinnati, but credit is deservedly hers. During the 1937 flood crisis, she brought in \$56,000 to the Red Cross for Ohio flood victims in a single week through radio appeals, a feat which was the greatest single fund-raising achievement in Cincinnati at that time. More recently a fund-raising project conducted by her over the air netted \$40,000 towards Christmas presents for children in Ohio hospitals.

Back in 1929, just a year out of college, she began her radio career in her home town, Cincinnati, as a pianist, organist and musical librarian for an independent radio station and eventually won two full hours of radio time. In 1942, she left to join station WLW where she graduated from local to four-state coverage with "Morning Matinee" and in 1946 took over her present "50 Club." At home, she's wife of a college professor and mother of a six-year-old daughter, living in a Cincinnati suburb.

Ruth Lyons can be seen on the "50 Club" Monday through Friday from 11 to 11:30 a.m. on WNBQ (Channel 5.)





Bergen Evans: The professor is wise and he is witty. He reminds me, naturally enough, of the rarest of all creatures, the college instructors who make classes a pleasure. He also makes watching television a pleasure.

Fran Allison: There's a little personal prejudice here, because I know that Fran is just as wonderful off the screen as she is on, and that's as high a compliment as can be paid.

Fred Waring: Another low pressure guy, always a gentleman, always the perfect guest, who always leaves you feeling better than when he came.

Marlin Perkins: Mr. Perkins has a way with animals, and he doesn't do too badly with people. Television has enabled him to take a million boys and girls and men and women on personally escorted tours of his zoo every Sunday. He is friendly and sympathetic and tremendously interesting.

It's quite a privilege to be able to visit with people such as these in my home every week.



Where's Our Wailing Syrian?

Danny Thomas Eats Caviar With The Bosses

ONE of the great comic props of all time is the human nose. In the tradition of Jimmy Durante and Cyrano De Bergerac a bulbous nose is a foil for yaks, rather than a cause for shame. The classic proportions of the nose of Danny Thomas are used in a different way. Its curved elegance is the trademark for the famous "Wailing Syrian."

With a white tablecloth draped around his head and shoulders, and his arms extended from his sides, Danny will balance his nose precariously upon a microphone and gasp, "Look! No hands!" Then the classic lament of the starving Syrian begins. For his long and tedious hours of labor, what are the rewards? Stale rolls. And the "bosses" have special vaults just to keep the rubber bands they wrap around their wads of money. The revolution is

coming. Let the bosses take the losses.

Danny's famous hook and dark features make him a natural for earthy character parts in his involved and hilarious routines. From a \$50 a week job at Chicago's since-shuttered 5100 Club, often called the "upholstered garage," he has vaulted into the six-figure income brackets. He is a night club legend. Even when business is "stinkin' all over," the club Danny plays will hang out the SRO sign.

The Thomas personality has undergone some changes since its TV debut. The old routines are still there, but they are surrounded by weepy sentimental material more suitable for "Mama" or "The Goldbergs." One of the regular features is a battle of wits between Danny—as a perplexed Italian-American, and his wiser-than-her-years kid played by Bunny Lewbel. It's effective all right, but it just isn't Thomas.

The Thomas fable began when Danny as a talented Toledo, Ohio youth decided to strike out for Chicago and show biz. His real name, Amos Jacobs, seemed unsuitable for bright lights, so he grafted two of his brothers' names together and became Danny Thomas.

Much of Danny's success is credited to St. Jude. Danny, down and out in Chicago, wandered into a church and lit a candle to St. Jude, Patron Saint of the Hopeless Cause. Shortly afterward the 5100 job fell in his lap. Since then Danny has been conducting a one-man campaign to build a hospital for the underprivileged. The hospital will be named for Danny's patron saint—and plenty of Danny's own cash will be in it.

The new watered-down Thomas seems to guarantee him a long and bright future. His TV show has a comfortable rating. His latest movie "I'll See You in My Dreams," with the accent on tears, is a solid click. When not in New York for TV, Danny lives with his wife and three children in a plush Beverly Hills home, with no mortgage.

Yet Chicago, long a stronghold for Thomas fans, yearns for the good old days at the 5100, when an undiluted Danny had people begging to pay an entrance fee into an old garage. There, the "Wailing Syrian" could do no wrong.



Theatre-TV for Cards, Bears in '52?

TO SAY the National Football League "bans" live television would be unjust and unwarranted. The pro elevens, like anyone else, have a right to protect their business interests. Television is not banned by the NFL, since most of their pigskin activities are broadcast and televised.

TV is restricted only in cities maintaining two clubs—such as the Cardinals and Bears in Chicago. No game may be televised in a league city where a game is being played without the consent of the other team. Nor can games be televised within 75 miles of a league city where a game is being played on the day of the teevee game.

The government is currently charging the NFL with restraint of trade and unless the government wins its case, Chicagoans will have to forego another season of pro football on TV. George Halas, coach-owner of the Chicago Bears, added: "The title game and pro-bowl game will continue to be televised. Perhaps something can be worked out in Chicago some day and there'll be plenty of football on TV." Subscription and Theatre-TV was hinted for the NFL.

Adventure: A few years back, one of Chicago's most enthusiastic fisherman, Bill O'Connor, and NBC-TV director, Larry Schwab Jr., set sail off the Florida Keys for a three day hunting and fishing trip. To their dismay, they soon learned the hazard of sailing without a radio when a lusty hurricane hit on their second day out. The sea rolled heavily and the boat began taking water. The wind whipped relentlessly, carving huge waves that battered the craft. The powerful waves tore the tennis shoes, trunks, and shirts off their bodies and washed them overboard into the Gulf Stream.

Fortunately, a fishing trawl spotted their plight and threw them a line. There was no extra clothing aboard ship, but nevertheless, they were never happier than when they stepped ashore at the Coast Guard station dressed in burlap bags.

Cuffnotes: The Rocky Marciano-Lee Savold fight, Feb. 13, from Convention Hall in Philadelphia is slated for WBKB. Indications are that it will surpass the record 46.3 rating obtained by the Ezzard Charles-Joey Maxim dance. . . H. V. Porter, executive-secretary of the national federation of state high school athletic associations, announced Indiana, Iowa, Ohio, Oklahoma and Kentucky will televise their state cage finals. Because of technical difficulties, Northern Indiana and Chicagoland cannot see the Indiana finals at Indianapolis.

VIDEO wrestling fans blinked their eyes in disbelief when Jack Brickhouse first introduced Verne Gagne (pronounced Gahnia) over WGN-TV during a Marigold wrestling show one Saturday night.

Here was a strapping six footer, with a handsome smile and an ordinary haircut. His hair wasn't curled, there was no shaggy beard, not even a fancy alias. What's more, his performance was clean, fast and highly skilled. Verne was all business on the mat. He avoided eye-gouging, hair-pulling, clawing, gaudy attire. This was something new in wrestling.


The ex-collegiate football player stunned the "master showmen" who predicted his lack of showmanship would eventually be his downfall. However, Verne appears to be winning a major victory over jungle-simulated movements and masculine burlesque. This is a refreshing rejuvenation being popularized by Gagne. As sports-writer Dick Cullum put it: "The personality kid has sold himself by being that freakish thing among wrestlers—no freak."

The 26-year-old grappler is a graduate of the University of Minnesota with an arts degree. As a Minnesota Gopher, Verne won all-American honors on the gridiron. He's married to Mary Marxen who claims: "He's still the handsome boy that I met at a wiener roast when we were both going to Robbinsdale High School in Minnesota." The Gagnes now make their home in a newly purchased seven room house at Lake Minnetonka in Minn., with their 3-year-old son, Greg, and 10-month-old daughter, Kathy.

Verne has moved into the heavyweight ranks after losing his light-heavyweight championship title to Danny McShaine.
