NEW YORK—Queen Elizabeth's coming coronation is giving television its first real chance for a try at trans-oceanic transmission. The colorful pageant of England's biggest royal event in 15 years will be telecast direct from the British Isles across the Atlantic by means of six specially equipped DC-6 planes cruising at intervals of 450 miles. NBC is anxiously hurrying plans for the experiment. . . . In the tradition of Milton Berle, show-wise Ken Murray is about to be signed to an 11 year pact by CBS with a guarantee of 2 million dollars. Like Miltie, he will serve as both performer and producer.

NBC, which was hot for nabbing the brace of current Broadway legit, "Caesar & Cleopatra" and "Antony & Cleopatra," has cooled off to the point of frigidity. Gilbert Miller, the shows' producer was willing—but for the inflated price of \$650,000, negotiations flopped. . . . The ghoul-infested TV thriller "Lights Out," which has caused a lot of discussion among parents and teachers in regard to the impression the show makes on children, is losing its sponsor. It is doubtful whether the mystery will be picked up or sustained after its current run.

"Juvenile Jury" moderator Jack Barry tells of the youngster who was invited to supper at a friend's home but refused. His mother asked why he didn't want to go. "Aw," sneered the boy, "he just wants me to help him eat up his cereal so he can have the box tops!" . . . Bosomy, unemployed Dagmar was a big hit in Buffalo recently where the video star of last year put on a performance that broke all attendance records there. Her new NBC-TV show is slated for a showing soon. . . . Martha Raye is about to sign a comfortable 7 year pact with NBC. The net is more than satisfied with the comedienne's recent shots on "All Star Revue."

Ventriloquist Paul Winchell, who has been playing night club dates along with his weekly television shows, lost some 15 pounds recently and has gotten the "slow down" direction from his doctor. . . . "Today," Dave Garroway's AM show (which one columnist labeled "'Quo Vadis' in the morning") deserves special praise for its intelligent handling of the news of George VI's death. Without any frantic lacing, Garroway & Co. left nothing to be desired in the way of newsreel shots, interviews and observations. The program is showing definite signs of developing.

The frequent transmission breakdowns on coast-to-coast TV shows is beginning to irk sponsors and agencies, especially when the snafu cuts into a commercial. The harrassed networks are currently trying to work out a rebate system for their dissatisfied clients. . . . The proposed Andre Kostelanetz show, which has been on a touch and go basis for months, is waiting for someone to pick up the tab. Since Coca Cola (which had first pickings) has demurred, other sponsors have begun bidding for the stint.

Comic Cliff Norton (who ought to know something about it) defines humor as: "something sometimes you are in a good." . . . Cynthia and Jack Lemmon, featured as "The Couple Next Door" on the Frances Langford-Don Ameche show are actually a married couple in real life.

Look alikes?

IN the annals of show business, one of the great surprises of the 1940s was the rise of a series of crooners, each sending his bobbysox audience into spasms of ecstasy. Most of these singers have since fallen by the wayside. Sinatra is more comedian than singer and Dick Haymes has become an actor. The loyal legions of Perry Como claimed the field.

Then along came the team of Martin and Lewis. Como fans shuddered. Not only did Dean Martin employ many of the Como vocal mannerisms, but even went so far as to look like Perry.

But Como fans need not be overalarmed. Dean's singing is only a part of the all-around appeal of the Martin and Lewis team. Perry, for smooth and effortless singing, still ranks at the top.

And the physical resemblance between the two which at first glance seems striking, at second glance just isn't there. Both are dark featured Italians, Dean's real name being Dino Crossetti and Perry's Pierino Como. But Dean is tall with long curly hair and a slightly battered nose which is a relic of his prizefighting days. Perry is constructed along smaller lines with a finely chiselled nose and short straight hair. The resemblance is more imagined than real.

Dean Martin is seen periodically on the Comedy hour seen Sundays at 7:00 p.m. on channel 5 (WNBQ) and Perry Como is on Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 6:45 p.m. on channel 4 (WBKB).

CLAUDIA

SUBURBIA, U.S.A., that slice of upper-middle class humanity which lives in fine, mortgaged homes and drives sleek, financed automobiles, is a favorite setting for modern writers. The suburbs, the novelists feel, are where the "typical" reside.

Twelve years ago Miss Rose Franken, a writer of considerable commercial know-how, employed this sure-fire setting in a series of magazine articles which she entitled "Claudia."

"Claudia" was the story of the infantile bride, the young girl married, yet not ready for it; the affectionate, harebrained wife of a very endurable guy named David; the spoiled, bungling girl who ran home to mother when difficulties arose. Somehow the Franken formula jelled. Her magazine articles evolved into a stage play, a novel and two movies.

Now, a dozen years later, after spreading her childish charm through all the media, Claudia has come to television. She's made all the rounds now and in the process has become as



familiar a fictional female as *Lady Macbeth*.

Certainly not as sinister as Shakespeare's famous lady, Claudia is just as adept at disrupting households and husbands. Yet she has a wear-ever quality about her that appeals to both sexes.

The secret of her charm, perhaps, is the same that has made the Irmas, the Lucys and the Dagmars so popular. The Male Animal's ego is massaged when a confused woman shows need of a man. And the average woman is presented with the romantic illusion that she's a little brighter than the average gal when a Claudia displays an eyebrow-raising I. Q.

Playing the title role on TV is the pert and talented Joan McCracken who gained her first success in a dancing role—that of the "fall down girl" in the Broadway hit "Oklahoma!" Miss McCracken is following in the footsteps of other actresses who gained fame through their Claudia portrayals, the most successful being Dorothy McGuire, who originated the role.

Joan (who is a tiny 5'2", 108 pounds) began her career bent on dancing for a living, but her handling of straight ma-

terial earned her other roles, the most recent of which was a semi-successful go in a revival of "Peter Pan." (Readers will notice Miss McCracken's hair-do is a boyish Peter Pan coiffure just sprouting into a feminine bob.)

Because the Claudia stories have seen such heavy duty from all the media, it is natural that Miss Franken's heroine has become a little diluted. The biggest danger when working with a Claudia is that the script writer, anxious for laughs, might reduce her to a mere Irma. The line between Claudia's simplicity and Irma's stupidity is only as thick as the writers want to make it.

Happily, Joan McCracken's performance bears a strong resemblance to Miss McGuire's deft handling of the role. She's cute, pixieish and only as naïve as the part calls for. The scripting on the show is hardly up to the original, a great deal of the dialogue being somewhat listless, although faithful to the Franken story line.

With Hugh Reilly (who plays David) and veteran actress Margaret Wycherly (who portrays the star's mother) in the cast, much of the writer's task is

helped immensely. The casting is certainly top grade.

Like the stage show, the tales of Claudia, the child bride, suburban style, are easy to take. Pleasant incidents in the life of a young wife who can neither make her checkbook balance nor successfully soft boil eggs.

Of course the stage production saw to it that Miss Franken's heroine eventually grew up. Claudia's mother, for whom she had an almost unhealthy devotion, dies in the original version at the same time that the young wife is bearing a child. This was enough to convince readers and theatergoers alike that Claudia had finally become a woman.

It is unlikely, however, that the powers-that-be will allow television's Claudia to grow up. Like Little Orphan Annie, she's hit material now without allowing any hasty changes to take hold.

favorite recipes

No. 20 in a series



QUICK 'N easy to prepare. That's one dish all housewives are searching for when entertaining at those pick-up suppers.

Here's one, suggested by Mrs. Spencer Allen, wife of the WGN-TV newscaster, who declares it's the homemaker's answer to simplified meal planning. Especially appropriate now for those Lenten mealtime headaches, it boasts added appeal because it leaves an uncluttered table, and plates can be handled without precarious balancing.

Try Shrimp Creole for a buffet supper main dish accompanied by a salad and dessert during Lent. It's tasty, tempting and time-saving.



Shrimp Creole

- 1 cup sliced onions
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup diced celery
- 1 minced clove of garlic
- 3 tablespoons fat
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon granulated sugar
- 1 tablespoon chili powder
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup water
- $\frac{3}{4}$ cup water
- 2 cups canned tomatoes
- 2 cups canned peas
- 1 tablespoon vinegar
- 2 cups shrimp

Cook onions, celery and garlic in hot fat over medium heat until tender. Combine flour, salt, sugar, chili powder and $\frac{1}{4}$ cup water and add to first mix-

ture. Add $\frac{3}{4}$ cup water, simmer uncovered over low heat for 15 minutes. Add tomatoes, peas, vinegar and shrimp. Heat all thoroughly. Arrange ring of rice on platter and fill center with shrimp creole.

For fluffy rice, Mrs. Allen suggests the following procedure: Heat oven to 400° F. Measure $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups rice into baking pan. Bake rice for 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Heat 1 quart water. When rice is golden brown, remove from oven and spray with cold water. Turn toasted rice into $1\frac{1}{2}$ quart casserole. Add $1\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoons of salt. Pour $3\frac{1}{2}$ cups boiling water over rice. Cover casserole and bake for 25 minutes in 400° oven.

SPENCER ALLEN

BACK in the early days of radio when rapid-fire announcers Graham McNamee and Floyd Gibbons were setting vocal speed records, a kid from downstate Illinois decided that newscasting was going to be his baby. At one time or another most boys nurture this same ambition, but this sprout hung on to his hopes. Today he is one of the glibbest and best informed news analysts in the business. His name—Spencer Allen.

Allen's show, a combination of newsreels and commentary, started out as a sleeper. It has become, ratingwise, one of the top-ranking shows in town. Spence, now chief of the WGN news staff, puts the emphasis on complete and impartial coverage with a minimum of personal opinion. The result is a crisp, neatly packaged view of the news.

It's been a long haul for Spence. Since graduating from the University of Missouri in 1935, he has been announcer, writer, and producer of news shows all over the U.S., including Texas. Perhaps Texas turned him toward civilization, for it was after a stint as staff announcer in Fort Worth that he came to Chicago and latched on at WGN, in 1938.

The army plucked Spence from the WGN staff in 1942, gave him a lieutenant's commission, and set him to work unraveling the snafu army communications system. His major effort of the war was the establishment of the first armed forces radio station in the

South Pacific. This was accomplished at Guadalcanal in 1944. For his effort, the army rewarded him with the shiny gold maple leaves of a major.

In 1946, newly-discharged Major Allen found a reporting plum that popped him into the newscasters big leagues. The atrocity slaying of tiny Suzanne Degnan had just shocked the nation. Spence wangled his way into the home of the aggrieved parents for an exclusive interview, which he followed with on the spot coverage of all the grisly details of this notorious murder by William (Blue Eyes) Heirens.

The oil tank explosions in Texas City, Texas, which practically demolished the town, had complete Mutual network coverage and the man on the scene of the disaster was WGN's Spencer Allen. He had flown down as soon as news of the explosions broke and set up a broadcasting station in the backyard of the Texas City phone company. His topnotch work on this assignment made him the obvious choice for a news show when WGN started its TV station.

"The most complete news show on television" is the modest claim WGN-TV makes for Spencer Allen and the News. That may be overstating the case a bit, but it shows that a dreamy-eyed downstate kid didn't pick the wrong profession.

Spencer Allen and the News is seen Monday through Friday at 6:30 p.m. on channel 9.

WHATEVER the future of U. S. entertainment, there's not much doubt that the present era offers some amazing phenomena. And the most surprising example is a skinny young singer named Johnnie Ray who sings under a little white cloud.

Perhaps the unkindest description of Ray was delivered by a cynical writer—"a woman who's built like a man who sings like a woman." A disturbed trio of teen-agers went even farther—"dramatic and loose-jawed . . . he could play in the Frankenstein and Dracula movies and wouldn't even need a mask."

But there's no disputing taste, because the fabulous newcomer has pushed the sale of record platters past the two million mark within several months. His hottest sellers have been "Little White Cloud" and "Cry."

Shy and sensitive, Johnnie Ray has zoomed overnight as the most valuable TV package in the market. His guest appearances—on Ed Sullivan's "Toast of the Town" and the Perry Como show—have permanently deranged thousands of young American girls.

But it took a special 45 minute program recently arranged by WGN-TV to warn Chicagoland parents that their virginal young daughters might well be the victims of a modern day electronic "triumph"—seduction by remote control.

Because Johnnie pulled out all the stops on that show. He quavered, quivered, shivered and shook. He emoted and agonized.

He wept, wailed and wilted. When Johnnie's performance was over, and emcee Howard Miller handed him an award from a record company, the young singer broke down and nuzzled his face into Miller's shoulder. Howard, whose emotional contacts are chiefly with women, was visibly shaken by the display.

How do the critics look at Johnnie Ray? Well, Jack Mabley thinks that, despite "the swoons, screams and riots, you can't fake a million record sales." Johnnie's "Little White Cloud" disk did that well in several weeks. Mabley, in somewhat good humor, also added that "he is a fine showman."

Bill Irvin, in a warm burst of applause, said that Johnnie "loves to sing,

and probably would put as much emotion into it if he were singing in a hall closet."

The emotional young singer, however, is no fool when it comes to milking an audience, and his sales pitch is especially effective when it's directed at his youthful fanatics. Says Johnnie: "Boy, when they crowd around me, I could die I'm so happy."

Every time he appears on TV, the mail pours in by the bushel. And the questions asked invariably are the same. "Is he afflicted with something?" "Is he deaf?" "Is he blind?" "Why does he cry?"

And the answers are something like this—No, he's not afflicted, he just sings that way. He is totally deaf in his left ear, and usually wears a hearing aid. He is not blind. He cries because that's the way he feels when he's singing.

Surprisingly enough, Johnnie's frantic style which has made him a national figure almost overnight is the very reason why he had a tough time getting started. Booking agents took one look at the hysterical sound effects and turned thumbs down. They figured that Johnnie might drive the customers away. Sometimes, a venturesome agent

would take a chance on a one night stand, but that's about all.

Actually, the chief criticism of Johnnie's style is its "peculiar weirdness," and yet a quick once-over of popular singers of the past reveals that in every case, an individual gets to the top by showing something different. To name a few—Al Jolson featured an enthusiastic frenzy in putting his stuff across, Eddie Cantor used an unusual skipping and hand-patting, and George M. Cohan strutted and bounced.

Whether Ray gets completely out of hand is a point that is causing nationwide controversy. In other words, does a singer that mentally disturbs a large part of his audience have a right to get away with it, even though many of his listeners love the stuff? In short, does Johnnie Ray, the new sensation, really belong on the entertainment scene?

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

THE INVISIBLE COP

"Plainclothesman"
Does His Sleuthing
Without Being Seen



Here is a scene from "Plainclothesman" in which a suspect is confronted with damaging evidence. The never-seen lieutenant is seated off-camera, while Jack Orrison who plays his assistant, Sgt. Brady, looks on. This camera-eye technique was first used by Robert Montgomery in the film "Lady in the Lake."

"The Plainclothesman" is one sleuth who solves his riddles in crime without ever being seen by the viewing audience. He's TV's invisible cop who swaps his identity so that his eyes become *your* eyes. His every movement is designed to make the viewer "feel" the action and solve the mystery right along with him.

Here's how this effect works:

The *camera* is the Plainclothesman. Every scene is televised from the eye level angle of the unseen, but ever present detective. When his head turns, the camera turns; when he walks or sits, the camera's movements indicate it; when he writes at his desk or reads a newspaper his hands and arms appear in the foreground.

The viewers are in on every piece of evidence that Plainclothesman uncovers. He solves the crime right along with the viewers. And he contorts himself into every possible position (around and below the camera) to get that effect.

"Plainclothesman" is seen each Sunday at 8:30 p.m. on channel 9.

Ken Lynch stands by behind scenes while some tense-faced actors and actresses look straight into camera. Each week new members of the cast have to be cautioned to play directly into the camera (which represents the Plainclothesman) to create the eye witness illusion.

HOUSE CLEANING IN THE TV TRADE

by JACK MABLEY

At the risk of being repetitious, we'd like to again point out that while there is still plenty of cause for complaint in the moral level of many television shows, on the whole there has been a vast improvement in material.

The worst onslaught of blue matter came about three years ago, when TV stations were booking acts out of night clubs, and the boys forgot they weren't doing the midnight show at the Blue Haze. Some serious slips led to quick reforms and careful screening of night club acts.

The next expression of public indignation came when TV directors discovered the female bosom. The boys who point the cameras behaved generally like a bunch of high school sophomores at their first burlesque show, and received generous co-operation from such as Faye Emerson (who soon soared far above such exhibitionism), Mary McCarthy, and any number of female singers.

Once again the customers beefed, mostly because their kids were learning too much too soon, and necklines went up.



I could talk a lot plainer if I didn't have to go home after the show.

The next cycle was extreme realism in horror programs. The excesses were far worse than you'll see in movies, and the clamor for cleaning up the gore was loud and prompt. Because the horror shows are cheap and get relatively high ratings, it was harder to clean them up, but gradually they have been improving. It's not too easy these days to see murder techniques charted for you step by step on the screen.

In justice to the vast majority of telecasters whose shows are clean if nothing else, it should be reported that the whole industry gets the lumps when one program gets blue.

TV has taken plenty of bum raps. You probably recall the big black headlines of a few weeks back relating that "GIRL SHOOTS SELF WHILE WATCHING TV." It turned out that the TV program the group of teenagers was watching was a movie about a Yank in Paris. Television's sin in that instance probably was one we're all too familiar with—the show was so boring that the youngsters got restless and turned to other things.

When public reaction against poor taste in television was at its highest, the broadcasters got together and worked out a self-police code which they claimed would stamp out vulgarity, graphic portrayals of crime, excessive commercials, and most of what we find objectionable in TV. (They can't do a thing about old jokes, however).

It was, and is, a noble document, about 300 times as long as the tight little code of decency adopted by the National Television Review Board, and saying exactly the same thing.

Possibly the broadcasters have reformed, and they may really mean business with this new code. However, it was drawn up and is being enforced largely by the men who ran the radio industry during the past decade, and on the basis of past performances, it isn't worth a pot of beans.

Some telecasters will go just as far as the public will let them. They'll be as dirty and vulgar as they can get away with. The public forced them to clean up during the past three years, and they forced them to adopt this new code. And if we keep on banging the telecasters when they get out of line, we'll get entertainment that we aren't ashamed to have our kids see.

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

Dragnet and Impact are two GOOD shows. I think they could be better if: Jack Webb would mix some exciting fiction with his true police records on the Dragnet series. The acting and direction are so superior to the Kanes, Kings and Kweens of TV, I can't help wondering how a little "assist" to the true facts might spice up the plot lines a bit. Let's see a little twist here, an unexpected witness drop in there and even an occasional reverse of the obvious denouement now and then. As Wendy Barrie, of unfond memory, used to chirp: "Nature isn't always right. . . ."

Then I'd like to see the very fine IMPACT smack us a little harder by simply using a little less Tell and a little more Vision. Too much of that program could be done on radio. Can't they get some movie cameras out around town and film some action shots for us? Instead of newspaper still shots of hoodlums, let's say, how about moving pictures of their squirming under the fiery questionings of outraged civic leaders.

We know the Daily News reporters can unearth exciting, in fact startling, news-behind-the-news but just listening to a reporter tell about it isn't always the best television entertainment. Let's sic those wild and woolly newspaper photogs on some of the juicier news assignments and hand em a Cine instead of a brownie—just to see what would happen. About that time, IMPACT could tell March of Time to roll over and play dead.





A NEAR record crowd is expected to jam the Chicago Stadium on Friday, March 7, to see the hard-hitting Golden Gloves finals. Ringside seats are already sold out but good seats are still available at the *Chicago Tribune* offices. For unfortunate fans unable to attend, WGN-TV will carry all the action.

The leather pushing enthusiasts that bust through the finals Friday night, will move on to Madison Square Garden, March 24, to meet New York's best. From there the Chicago boxers move on to greater things. They'll embark for Dublin, Ireland on April 25, with stops for more fisticuffs in Paris, April 29; Berlin, May 5, and Rome on May 10 before returning home.

It all started twenty-five years ago when the *Chicago Tribune* decided to test the state law prohibiting boxing in Illinois. The late Walter Eckersall was assigned to handle details. Some 424 boxers comprised the initial tournament that netted \$6,000 for the disabled war veterans fund.

The test tourney, however, was not accomplished without difficulty. Rev. W. S. Fleming of the National Réform Association attempted to stop it and an injunction had to be obtained to conduct the tournament. It was not renewed until boxing was legalized in April, 1926.

Meanwhile, the *New York Daily News* in 1927 organized a boxing program called "The Golden Gloves," a name adopted by the *Tribune* in 1928.

That same year, *Tribune* sports editor Don Maxwell phoned Paul Gallico, then sports editor of the *New York Daily News* and suggested an intercity meeting with New York. Gallico agreed, and the first intercity Golden Gloves was held on March 28, 1928 before 10,000 in the Coliseum. The teams battled to an 8 to 8 draw.

Under the present *Tribune* sports editor, Arch Ward, the Golden Gloves have advanced to an International status. In 1936, Arch Ward arranged to make the tournament a vehicle for national tryouts to represent the United States in the Olympic Games at Berlin. From 1937 through 1940, American Golden Glovers annually fought All-European teams. Now in 1952, the American squad will make their first European trip to what may well establish a new precedent.

INTERCITY GOLDEN GLOVES

THE Golden Gloves amateur boxing rivalry between Chicago and New York was started in 1928 when the cities tied, 8 bouts to 8, in the Chicago Coliseum. Since then the annual tournaments have been held either in Madison Square Garden or at the Chicago Stadium.

Last year's tie was the sixth in the 24 years of the competition. Chicago's

representatives have won 12 times. They have been defeated five times.

Since inception, the Chicago-New York rivalry has become national in scope. Chicago's squad was selected from two score of centers from Cleveland to Los Angeles and from Minneapolis to Texas. New York's territory covers the East. All parts of the country are represented.

INTERNATIONAL GOLDEN GLOVES

IN 1931 the *Chicago Tribune* inaugurated Golden Gloves bouts with European nations. France was the first to send its amateur champions to America. The series was broken in 1936 when the *Tribune* conducted the United States

Olympic boxing tournament, but it was resumed the following year against the best boxers in Europe.

The world war interrupted the series, but it was resumed in 1947. This year the American team invades Europe.
