NEW YORK—The Frank Sinatra demise from TV proved to be a costly try for CBS to knock the splinters from under king pin Milton Berle. The net lost an estimated million dollars on the crooner's variety opus. Realizing the Sinatra show was too much like *Miltie's*, a science-fiction program called "Out There" will take the CBS slot opposite Berle. . . . The grand lady of a great theatrical family, Ethel Barrymore, has been signed for a series of videotpix (30 minutes each) in which she will serve as adviser, actress and commentator. Miss Barrymore's only TV appearance thus far has been with Jimmy Durante. . . . Watch for Edward R. Murrow's fine "See It Now" to switch from Sunday afternoon to an early evening slot on the same day.

A few sponsors, concerned about summer replacements for their programs, are considering running shows for a second time on kinescope while their stars are vacationing. Both Groucho Marx and Dinah Shore may wind up having filmed repeats shown during the hot months. . . . Dave Garroway's two hour morning show "Today" has tested its audience and discovered the average viewing time is 56 minutes per listener. . . . CBS's Saturday night problem (how to draw an audience in competition with "Show of Shows") might be solved when Jackie Gleason moves over from DuMont. The formidable lineup would then read like this: Ken Murray, Gleason and "Songs for Sale" in that order—an array which would probably knock a few rating points of the Caesar-Coca extravaganza.

Although "ol' debbil TV" has been accused of ruining every other business, the furniture manufacturers have thrown a new light on the situation. A furnishings exec says TV has helped pick up business 10%. Reason: people are staying home more and chairs and sofas wear out faster. . . . Actor-producer Eddie Dowling is the favorite to succeed George Abbott as emcee of the "Royal Showcase" variety stanza. . . . Marie Wilson, star of "My Friend Irma" says she's enrolling in a correspondence course to learn about love by male! . . . Dick Powell, the original choice to sub for Milton Berle while the latter is vacationing, did not get the job. The reason is that Powell wanted more than the sponsors were willing to give him—including his own choreography and director. Frank Fay is now working the two week period.

Ed Sullivan has made a heated appeal to Television Authority to enforce strongly the rule against guests plugging products other than a show authorizes. As a result of comic Romo Vincent putting in a clout for a beer company on *Sullivan's* show, Ed announced the comedian would never be booked on "Toast of the Town" again. . . . Jack Barry, moderator for "Juvenile Jury" and "Life Begins At Eighty." asserts that any model can tell you that inattention to diet can turn cheese cake into pound cake. . . . An idol of the bobby-sox group is a young TV star who has yet to sing a dreamy ballad. He is Don Hastings, the 17-year-old side kick of Al Hodge, Captain Video on the DuMont space thriller. Hastings already has fan clubs organized on Planet Earth and he has been virtually mobbed by young ladies at public appearances.

HE BREAKS NO RECORDS

But Jockey Hal Tate
IS A Loop Institution



IT'S not generally known, but Ken Murray was invented some time ago by an enterprising New York promoter in order that the East Coast might rival Chicago in one of its gaudier institutions—a genial, cigar-eating man about town called Hal Tate.

Right now, Hal is best known in TV circles as the disk jockey man who comes into the parlor each Sunday with a catchy assortment of tunes, short films and show business celebrities. There's also a generous display of what this country needs most—a good, five cent cigar.

But his earlier life has been a varied and interesting pilgrimage through almost every phase of the video industry. Hal packages a radio show with a mystery gimmick and peddles it nationwide. And he has also produced and directed, and at one time covered the Chicago field as local editor of Radio Daily publication.

Among the weird & wonderful assortment of personalities that abide on the northeast corner of the Loop district, Hal Tate is in the front ranks on the basis of pure color. It's said that on a clear day, his conversation can be heard echoing among the canyons of LaSalle street, a distance of almost a half-mile.

But Hal has a heart great enough to match the volume of his voice, and many folks in show business will attest to his generosity. There's no one shrewder in sensing the latest angle in the entertainment field—his latest sure-fire scheme is a small, saleable program using the unique sketches of Abbe Lane's great & good friend, Xavier Cugat.

Hal has sometimes been described as one of the last survivors of the Ran-



dolph street Rover Boys, but such a term is unkind, because he's still a young man in his forties. It IS true that he represents certain aspects of Phineas T. Barnum days—flamboyant style, breezy manner and everything on a "first name" basis.

In these days, the entertainment business has largely been captured by the boys with hand-painted ties, mink-coated women and phoney Florida sun-tans. They're a tight-fisted, garrulous bunch whose talk is several figures higher than their earned incomes. Hal, who has made and lost several tidy fortunes, is a refreshing change in the grand manner from that set.

Gail and Friend

"Daddy has a strict rule in THE PET SHOP about Easter pets, and I think it is a good one for everyone to follow. The rule is: Never buy a duck, baby chick or rabbit unless you have the proper place to take care of it and the right equipment.

The humane societies do not like pet shops to sell chicks and ducks because most people who buy them do not understand their care. A day-old baby chick needs a lot of attention.

First it must have a warm hover or place to stay as it can catch cold very easily. You can make a nice place for your chick by using a cardboard box, put it upside down with a doorway cut in it, then cut a hole in the top and hang an electric light bulb inside the box. This will keep the chick warm.

In feeding the chick be sure you have chick mash in front of it all the time. Also it must have a constant supply of clean water and it must *not* be ice cold water. You probably will have to go to a feed store to get the right food. If your pet shop is a good one they will be able to sell you a proper diet for the chick. Please don't handle the new chicks too much as they are not used to it and may become frightened. Don't buy any chicks that have been colored by dyes. It's against the law to sell them.

Just about the same facts hold true for ducks. A duck will love some oatmeal, and it's a lot of fun to watch them splash around in a dishpan full of water. But before you buy a duck or a chick just remember they need a good deal of care and are not the cleanest animals in the world.

For a bunny be sure and get rabbit

pellets which make a fine food as they are composed of alfalfa and other basic foods needed by rabbits. Give them plenty of water and a nice warm place to sleep. Lettuce and other greens will make them happy.

Whatever kind of pet you get this Easter please take good care of it and don't be cruel or thoughtless. When you get a pet you become responsible for it just as your parents are responsible for your happiness and good health."

Got a precocious dachshund you want to show off? Or a calf, perhaps, that has made a round-trip solo ride on a railroad? Or an opossum you found under your back porch?

land of fantasy and make-believe, cameras are focused each Saturday evening on the proprietors of "Pet Shop" and the inmates who populate the premises. Gail Compton and his 10-year-old daughter Gay hold court in their animal kingdom while "subjects" the country over display their pets, boast of their intelligence and discuss rearing problems.

Anyone can get into the act—as long as he brings a pet. Even the famous and near-famous have appeared. In the past year, for example, guests have included Cartoonist Chester Gould and his Mugs, a Great Dane who is also one of the primary characters in Gould's "Dick Tracy" comic strip; John Cuneo Jr.'s baby elephant; Colonel R. R. McCormick's dachshund Mexy; Gus the

famous Great Dane owned by restaurateur Riccardo, and two ponies in the Curtiss Candy Company team which performs at numerous horse shows throughout the country.

The cast of former characters has included alligators, owls, burros and lion cubs. Regulars on the show are Sissy the poodle, Tigger the chihuahua, and Charley the monkey who, in his numerous appearances, has proven himself both a comedian and champion scene-stealer.

All monkeys aren't as cooperative as Charley, however. Gail will attest to that. He recently spent nearly two weeks in bed recovering from shots administered him when one of his guests—a high-spirited monkey—ungratefully bit a chunk out of his arm.

Business has been so good, Gail says, that plans are being made to remodel the Pet Shop. Charley will have his own house of bamboo with the latest in monkey architecture and comfort. A combination maternity ward and nursery are also planned for kittens, ducks and puppies so that viewers may watch them grow.

You won't find the Pet Shop address listed in any phone book, but apparently it has carved a permanent address in the hearts and minds of its viewers. This was illustrated not long ago when a Connecticut viewer, visiting briefly in Chicago, enlisted the aid of a personal shopping service to obtain the Pet Shop address. The gentleman made it clear, the personal shopper explained to Gail, that he wasn't "planning to buy anything . . . he just wanted to browse around."

THE sight of a fully clothed ex-school teacher plunging into a tank of water on television recently must have caused some fans to comment "This is show business?"

Ironically, the name of the show was "This is Show Business." For three years it has acted as a sort of court of Human Relations for show folk to air their problems. Such shenanigans are not a normal part of the proceedings, but this touch of the unexpected is one of the reasons that the show is one of the top-ranked on TV.

The original format of the program is fortunately kept firmly in the background. The contrived problems of the entertainers are quickly passed over and the panel and guests then get a chance to do their stuff.

The roster of talent that has appeared on the show reads like a directory of show business. From low comedy to grand opera, practically any type of act is liable to appear, swap dialogue with the panel and then get down to the business at hand, entertainment.

While the acts that appear on the show are usually topnotch, it is the

panel that takes the program out of the "just another variety show" category.

The ex-school teacher whose splash was heard and enjoyed round the coaxial cable was the plump and jovial Mr. Sam Levenson, late of Brooklyn. Sam along with irascible George S. Kaufman and erudite moderator Clifton Fadiman comprise the entire regular cast of the show.

Sam, the critics persist, is a humorist, not a comedian. Then his baptism as a comedian must have taken place when he plunged into the pool after Divena, a water ballerina. His swooping and swerving under water with Divena was one of the wackiest ballets ever staged.

The fact that Sam Levenson is a regular panelist is a tribute to the show's persistence and taste. Sam, after approximately ten appearances in an entertainer's role, was drafted into a regular berth. The Levenson humor is so warm and so honest that practically everybody can see something of himself in the same situation. What a Russian playwright would make into a great tragedy, Sam can turn into good-natured comedy. Take the story of his mama and the pushcart peddler.

"Mama had to bargain. Eight kids? With eight kids you got to bargain or nobody eats. And the peddler—he's poor, too. So one day on his cart there's a rusty old spoon. 'How much?' says Mama. 'A penny,' says the peddler. 'Too much,' says Mama. 'So?' says the peddler. 'Make me an offer.'"

Sam Levenson also has a television program of his own but unfortunately

no station in Chicago is carrying it.

Co-panelist George S. Kaufman is one of the legends of the American Theatre. The list of plays which he has co-authored include "The Man Who Came to Dinner," "Of Thee I Sing," "Stage Door," "You Can't Take it With You," and he is also the author of what Marx Bros. connoisseurs call the boys' classic film, "A Night at the Opera."

A line from "You Can't Take it with You" became one of the standard barbs of the nation. It took place when the mother of an aspiring ballerina asked the Russian balletmaster how her daughter was progressing. He looked carefully to see that no one overheard

and said "Confidentially, she steenks."

George more recently has directed many Broadway stage hits and is responsible for the wonderful and rowdily staged "Guys and Dolls." On his own he has not been quite so successful, having a string of flops in the past five years. That may account for some of the vitriolic commentary from Mr. Kaufman on "This is Show Business."

Clifton Fadiman first gained nationwide fame as the chill-voiced emcee on the sharp radio quizzer "Information, Please." That he was picked to keep the dazzling wits on "Show Business" in line seemed to be a natural choice.


Fadiman has been for years one of America's leading book critics. For a time it seemed that every new book that hit the stalls bore the Fadiman seal of approval. He became as necessary to a book's sale as Good Housekeeping is to a baby's formula.

Mr. Fadiman was a friend of all the great literary figures of the thirties such as Sinclair Lewis, Alexander Woollcott and Robert Benchley. Rumor had it that Clifton could read a book at a glance and it even made Ripley. He actually reads at about 120 pages an hour if the reading is fairly light. At that rate the average novel takes him a couple of hours.

With the warmhearted Levenson, the sad-eyed and sarcastic Kaufman and the witty and genial Fadiman "This is Show Business" can boast of the best balanced panel on TV. Add to this the high class talent that guest star on the show and it comes out as one of the brightest half-hours on the air.

At that time she will share top emcee duties with Dave Garroway, describing the annual Easter Parade on New York's favorite glamour stretch, Fifth Avenue. The duo will face the NBC cameras from their vantage point in the Palm Court of Hotel Plaza, the traditional brunching place on Easter.

What combination of talent makes this singing star eligible for the Easter commentary slot? In addition to her operatic talent, Miss Piazza possesses a unique clothes consciousness with which she cuts a pretty figure in the fashion world. Recently, the Fashion Academy voted her the best-dressed in opera.

One of her cardinal fashion rules is: Select a wardrobe according to your way of life. For her it means a wide variety of glamorous evening and cocktail dresses, since a major portion of her time is spent making personal appearances.

Practical, despite the demanding extravagance of her social position, Miss Piazza keeps her wardrobe down to a budgeted minimum. She buys one new suit each season and wears it for luncheons and business engagements. For rehearsals and at home she favors casual skirts and sweaters or blouses.

Her backlog of these casual clothes is brightened each season with accessory touches—a colorful scarf at her throat, a gay hankerchief tucked in her pocket or a conversation piece costume pin.

Another Piazza basic fashion rule is her theory that there's never too much of a good thing. When she finds a style she likes—in shoes, evening dress or accessories—she duplicates it in different colors and textures, or adapts it for various occasions and seasons. Save shopping time, too.

Every Saturday noon a fraternity of husky truck drivers converges on a bar down in Chicago's stockyard district to watch television.

Like Tom Sawyers who simmer down when their Aunt Pollys catch them in a moment of mischief, these dust-caked tourists of the open road lapse into a sphinx-like hypnosis.

Who's responsible for this sudden metamorphosis? A couple of guys and a gal who have centered their mimicking talents on entertainment for the younger set. They've come up with "Pantomime Party."

The two fun-loving clowns (former disc jockeys) who burlesque their way through the comedy spheres admit they don't know whether "the men come to see us or whether we drive them to drink." But apparently it's the former. The truckers have formed a loyal 20-member fan club, with eyes and ears so tightly glued to the bar's TV set each Saturday that not even a tall foaming glass of amber liquid can pry them loose.

The "two men with records"—as they prefer to call themselves—are assisted in their mad antics by a rubber-muscled girl who since her arrival from Germany in 1937 has made a "name" for herself by becoming a professional dancer and marrying Clark Davis, one of the two comedians.

Clark and Ellen and their partner, Bill Cain, ape the motions while Durante and Traubel, Peggy Lee, Frankie Laine or another of many name stars

vocalize in the background—on records, of course.

Bill and Clark, both in their mid-twenties, have been partners in 'mime since they met back in 1943 during their high school days at Senn. Although the pursuit of higher education more than once interrupted their dramatic roamings, they never completely broke up the team.

Bill took time out to graduate from DePaul University college of law and now spends his week days as a trial lawyer in the civil and criminal branches. Clark's alma mater is the Goodman Theater where his training spurred him to position of television and radio director of a large national ad agency.

In their spare time, the young professionals clowned and joshed, much to the amusement of Clark and Ellen's young son and Bill's two nephews. This enthusiastic reception was the cornerstone for Pantomime Party antics. A few months ago, Clark and Bill brushed up their routines, polished their salesmanship and peddled their wares. One week later they were on the TV lanes with Pantomime Party.

Today the trio has reached another peak of glory: One television manufacturer uses Pantomime Party instead of test patterns to test his sets!



JENSKA SLEBOS. . .
"Musical Dutch Girl"

IT'S A MAN'S WORLD, BUT...

Jenska Makes Good

SOME 15 or 20 years ago, a 12-year-old Dutch girl skipped down the gangplank in New York. She, her parents, two sisters and a brother were moving to the "land of golden opportunity" from Santpoort, a tiny village in Holland.

Her family didn't know at the time that Chicago's musical world was to become the child's magic circle. They didn't know she would crash the rigid enforcements of the Windy City's talent circle and emerge a "queen" in her own right.

But, today that little Dutch girl—still retaining some of her reserved and shy old-country manner—is making her mark in a man's world. Today she is one of the few women in the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, assistant first cellist with both the orchestra and Chamber section which performs each Tuesday night on ABC.

Jenska Slebos is that little Dutch girl, a creative artist, sensitive, aesthetic, detached from the bustling noise of a raucous industrial city. The stage of Orchestra Hall and the lower confines of the rehearsal chamber are her sanctuaries. There she shuns the matter-of-fact routine of everyday life and

envelops herself in a shroud of sharps, flats, syncopation and melody which have been woven into musical patterns by the genius of the Bachs, Tschakowskys and Prokofievs.

Jen is a cautious woman. Yet she combines the persistence and perseverance of the Dutch with American overtones of aggressiveness. For she knows that in her man's world, a woman must be above reproach, beyond criticism and capable of maintaining a consistently high standard of performance. She knows that only constant practice, beyond the three-hour rehearsal sessions and actual programs, will qualify her to perform on the same level with men.

For these reasons Jen conceals any inclinations toward casual banter, gossip with the men or informal sessions under an impenetrable veneer of diffidence. "I come to do my work," she states, "and when I'm through there's a long trip home and always more practicing to be done."

This attitude may stamp Chicago's musical Dutch girl as a "stuffy long-hair." Actually it is more of a testimony to her serious concern for her career, a culmination of her desires reinforced by many long and strenuous years of study and practice.

During her brief encounters with the 100 men who comprise the Symphony orchestra, Jen has been impressed with their complete lack of staginess. Flare-ups, contrary to popular opinion, are not a constant standby of the musical profession, she declares.

Jen believes the less conspicuous you are as a woman in a predominantly male orchestra, the better the impression. For this reason, she chooses her garments with caution, favoring drab, dark colors with no flashy styles. She wears her tawny hair in simple fluff arrangements, uses conservative makeup and is content to subordinate her appearance to her profession.

For this one girl among 100 men doesn't want to be a rose among thorns—in the orchestra, Jen prefers to remain incognito in every respect but one—her music.

Backstage Diary

CHICAGO—There's been a great fuss & to-do about Our Town losing its identity as a TV center. Whatever the howl of protest, it's all true and certainly justified. But NOT so well publicized is one of the real reasons for Chicago's downward slide as a healthy TV metropolis—the apparent lack of faith in Chicago video by major Chicago advertisers.

Let's take a look at a group of the biggest, known as the Merchant Princes of State Street. These men, somewhat used to reading favorable press clippings about themselves in the local dailies, have, with one notable exception, passively aided in killing off TV here by their horse & buggy philosophy of "Ignore it and maybe it'll go away."

The one exception is Marshall Field, which thought well enough of the 20th Century to sink thousands into two shows—Uncle Mistletoe and Pace of Chicago. Goldblatt served up Hank Grant and "Let's Have Fun" for awhile but gave up the TV ghost some time ago. The Fair tried two gimmicks—

their Teen Club amused the younger set, and "Tel-A-Shopper" was a 30 minute commercial.

The rest, Mandel's, Stevens', Lytton's, Baskin's, Bond's, Rothschild's and Carson's, apparently haven't yet heard of television, or else their acquaintance is so sketchy that no one can remember it.

Who then is carrying Chicago TV? Mostly the newcomers and the smaller fry (comparatively speaking). Jim Moran, Bud Hauser, Polk Brothers, Morris B. Sachs, Rubin's, Hines Lumber, Harvey Lumber, DeMet, Tele-Tronics, Cole-Finder and many others who have shown the faith and leadership in Our Town that keeps it from becoming a TV ghost city.

The same tycoons, however, who will sink a fortune into a new building, realizing that the investment will pay off in 20 years time, shy away from the TV expense because they won't get their money back in 13 weeks. A citizen doesn't become a booster simply by attending civic luncheons and pasting an "I Will" sticker on his window.

We're not mad at anybody, and we're not preaching radical reform. We're fully aware of the great record of the State Street group in building Chicago. But for heaven's sake, let's file away the scrapbooks and start looking at a blueprint of the future.

For those who were misled by our recent true-false quiz on Mary Hartline, she does NOT wear a wig. Mary is actually a blonde and a very beautiful one at that.... Latest entry into the TV field is tiny Jan Teresa, the new daughter of WGN-TV newscaster Robert Hurleigh. Bob now has a brood of five.

Aarons Heating Service provides a good example of a TV success story. As a result of "Aaron's Action Theatre" on channel 9, every Sunday, business boomed so much that its quarters became too small. So the company has moved into a big new location at 6805 S. Halsted. Celebrated its grand opening last week.

Boxing probe hampered by noisy sportscaster

WORKING quietly and meticulously, the Department of Justice has long been looking into reports received on legally licensed managers who are working under cover for persons with criminal records. They have been gathering data and incriminating evidence on deals of promoters, match-makers, and state commissions with men of unsavory records.

Meanwhile in Chicago, Joe Triner, IAC chairman, and his associates Lou Radzienda and Ralph Metcalfe are being unfairly criticized of laxity and touted at the same time by an irresponsible sportscaster.

The Department of Justice has learned loud-mouthed tactics without evidence do not bring convictions but only hamper their investigations and drive suspected persons under cover.

That Frankie Carbo, known underworld hood, was suspected of being Jake LaMotta's manager is not new to the Justice Department, nor are Eddie Coco's ties to Rocky Graziano any revelation to the department. A sportscaster's eagerness for schlocky sensationalism and personal publicity hinders, rather than aids investigating officials.

Last year during the Robinson-LaMotta pre-fight press luncheon, Irving Cohen, manager of Rocky Graziano, was caught off guard and paid Robinson an unexpected compliment. Cohen was asked if he would allow his protege Terry Young to fight Robinson. Cohen screamed: "Robinson! He's the best fighter of all time. I'm a manager, not an undertaker!" . . . Could be that Robinson will provide Cohen with Graziano as his first piece of business in a new vocation.
