
CHICAGO—The history of the Republican National Conventions is one of electrifying events, complete with "smoke filled" rooms, fanatic crowd demonstrations, bitter partisan fights, eloquent speeches, dealings and double dealings. . . . Out of the confusion and turmoil and angry words of a national convention comes hard-fought decisions that have played a huge part in this country's history.

The noisiest GOP convention accompanied the contest between Lincoln and Seward in 1860. Both were vieing for the presidential nomination in Chicago. . . . The Eastern-imported Sewardites, attired in uniforms and led by a huge band, marched down Michigan Avenue proudly flaunting their numbers. Meanwhile the Lincoln supporters had filled the stadium and when the weary marchers returned they were unable to get into the hall! . . . The wildly screaming Lincoln enthusiasts literally shouted Abe into the nomination. One writer described the demonstration by saying, "Imagine all the hogs ever slaughtered in Cincinnati giving their death squeal together. No Comanches, no panthers ever struck a higher note or gave screams with more infernal intensity."

The classic example of a "smoke filled" room dealing took place in 1920. Warren Harding, the eventual winner, got only 65½ votes on the first ballot, not even winning all of his state delegation. But on the 10th ballot he pulled down 692½ votes to clinch the nomination. Harding admitted afterwards that the party chieftains met in a hotel room and decided to throw their weight in his direction. As he put it later, "They had nothing against me and the delegates wanted to go home anyway."

The most unpredictable outcome in the GOP nomination race was the famous Wendell Willkie blitz in 1940. Willkie, who had voted Democratic up until 1938 whipped up some contagious enthusiasm on the part of the delegates and came off with the nomination on the sixth ballot. . . . The sweep was thoroughly an emotional one and down to defeat went such GOP stalwarts as Bob Taft, Tom Dewey and Arthur Vandenberg.

A move that ruined the Republican chances for victory in 1912 was executed by the colorful Teddy Roosevelt. Irked by the policies of William Howard Taft, Roosevelt bolted the Republicans and formed his own party—the Bull Moose. This split the GOP vote and led to the eventual election of Democrat Woodrow Wilson. A few pundits have suggested that if Eisenhower doesn't get the nomination this year he might, by bolting the party, block Taft's election. If this longshot ever occurred, it would be a monumental piece of coincidence and irony, the same thing happening to a father and son, both seeking the presidency!

THE CONVENTION

Comes to Town-

WISCONSIN

The city of Chicago has its big shoulders primed to carry the most exciting event in our nation's history—the political conventions. When the gavel is pounded this week to signal the beginning of the 1952 Republican National Convention, Chicago's famous "barn," the International Amphitheater will be the housing place for the expected pyrotechnics. Sixty-five million interested onlookers will share the thrills, commotion and tempestuous doings through the medium of TV. The flavor of the convention can be captured best by recalling some of the comments and incidents of the big shindig in the past.

- Irvin S. Cobb, the stinging wit and raconteur of a generation ago, thought little of political conventions. "A convention," said Cobb, "is more wasted energy, more futile fruitless endeavor, more useless expenditure of noise, money and talent than any other institution on earth."

- The first large-scale convention (as we know it today) was held in 1832. In an effort to squelch the small group of party bosses who picked the man of their choice, the regular state delegation was installed through the urgings of Andrew Jackson. The Democrats in that year nominated Jackson, in what was termed as a defeat for "King Caucus."

- Republicans are noted for quick nominations. They usually elect their man on the first ballot. The Democrats are notorious for deadlocks. In the 1924 convention, John W. Davis was nominated after 16 days and on the 103rd ballot.

- In the last GOP convention Tom Dewey pulled 434 votes on the first ballot, 515 on the second and was nominated (with 1094 votes) on the 3rd bal-

lot. One lone Wisconsin delegate held out for General MacArthur. In '44 Dewey won on the first ballot.

- Popular tunes are often the theme songs of conventions. In 1936 when Alf Landon was nominated, the song-inspirer was "Happy Days Are Here Again." Tom Dewey caught the crowd's fancy in 1940 with "Hi-Ho, Hi-Ho, It's Off To Work We Go."

- Delegates from some states, Wisconsin for example (with 30 votes pledged for Taft), are bound to vote for their man on at least two ballots or until the candidate gets less than 10% of the total votes.

- There are 1206 total GOP votes. 604 are needed for nomination.

- The important committees who decide party procedure are the following: Credential Committee—passes on recognizing delegations. This committee will decide on the contested Eisenhower-Taft representatives in Texas, Georgia and Louisiana.

- Rules Committee—passes on procedure at convention.

- Resolutions Committee—draws up the party platform.

- In a recent national magazine story seven men in the Republican party were listed as being the "most influential." They were Dewey, Taft, Harold Stassen, MacArthur, Earl Warren, James Duff of Pennsylvania and Joe Martin of Massachusetts.

- Should Taft win the nomination and election he would complete the second father-son presidential pairing. His own father, William Howard Taft, served as chief executive from 1904-1908. The other father-son relationship was John Adams and his son John Quincy Adams.

THE END OF A LONG CHASE?

Ever since the day that 19-year-old Robert Alphonso Taft rode ceremoniously down Pennsylvania Avenue with his portly, mustachioed father (who was to be inaugurated as President of the U.S.), Bob Taft has had his eye on the highest office in the land. For over 12 years Taft has campaigned like no other man in this country's history to become president—and live again in the home where he spent his youthful manhood, the White House.

He tried in 1940—and failed. He sat it out in 1944 when Tom Dewey vainly carried the GOP colors. In 1948, after a vigorous campaign, he dropped the convention nod to the same Dewey.

Now four years later Bob Taft, his scars of political battle healed and toughened, is only a few delegate votes away from traveling his most important mile on the route to the White House—the coveted nomination. Over his long, hard-fought political life, Taft has emerged with a skilled political machine, oiled and purring and hitting on all fours, a major advantage over his closest pursuer of the nomination, Dwight Eisenhower. With the right breaks in the Chicago convention, the labor put forth on the machine might vault Mr. GOP into realizing his ambition.


The title of Mr. GOP or Mr. Republican undisputedly belongs to Bob Taft. Born 62 years ago in Cincinnati, he has been a tireless worker for the party from the time he spent as a lowly precinct captain to his present status of Senator from Ohio.

Taft is the staunchest spokesman for traditionalism. He has energetically opposed the present administration, blasted the New and Fair Deals and showed contempt for red tape in a bureaucratic government. He deplores what he terms "excessive federal spending" and has fought vigorously the trend toward giving a President too much power.

Taft's biggest grievance with his own party are the "luke-warmers" or "me-too-ers." Canny Bob insists that the reason for the GOP's flop in the last three elections was the failure of the Deweys and Willkies to fight the administration's policies, leaving the voter no real choice. Taft is determined to carry out an out-and-out fight against the Democratic nominee. "I'm not interested in the 'mug-wumps' or independents. We're going after the non-



voter, the fellow who didn't get out and vote because he saw no real difference in the men who were running."

Indefatigable Taft is a six foot, 196 pounder with wispy, balding hair who looks sour-faced when he isn't smiling and overly-hilarious when he is. He's extremely self confident, although he is somewhat shy and lacks his father's joviality. Men who know him claim his personality doesn't come over on television too well. He feels so passionately about his beliefs that he becomes easily nettled on TV and loses his temper at the slightest disagreement. Although he has worked at improving it, Taft's personality is not generally ingratiating. In this respect, Eisenhower ranks far ahead of him.

Taft's voting record has been "flexible." Although he is not now considered isolationist, he did vote against entry into World War II, the North Atlantic Treaty and opposed the draft. He favors limited foreign aid. He believes that once we get embroiled in a mess we should do our utmost to get out of it, no matter whose fault it is. In this respect he has advocated an out-and-out fight in Korea, even though (as he terms it), it's a "Truman war."

The three words that gall Taft most are, "You can't win." His opponents (and friends, for that matter) have pointed out his lack of glamor and fights with labor would cost him any election. Taft pooh-poohs the "can't win" label. He doesn't believe glamor should decide an election (yet it is conceded it does). As to labor (Taft is the co-author of the much-disputed Taft-Hartley labor bill) he points to his overwhelming victory in 1950 in Ohio (a largely industrial state) as an indication that labor isn't as soundly against him as is charged.

Mr. Republican and his entourage have set up headquarters in Chicago's Congress Hotel. The big battle, Taft vs. Ike, is ready to start. It ought to be a good one.

SPOTLIGHT ON A MILITARY

In the land just south of the United States known as Texas, there's much glee these days. For the sleepy cattle town of Denison, Texas is the birthplace of the man who could become the first Texan ever elected to the U. S. presidency. Among the man's qualifications is the fact that he left Texas for Abilene, Kansas shortly after he was born. But once a Texan, always a Texan. At any rate General Ike Eisenhower, still an Abilene citizen, could be the strongest Republican nominee since Teddy Roosevelt.


Born Oct. 14, 1890, Dwight David Eisenhower up until World War II was an unsung, relatively obscure Army colonel. A regular army man, he graduated from West Point, 61st in a class of 164. He played halfback on the football team until an injury sidelined him. He then became the academy's number one cheerleader, a moot distinction.

The Eisenhower career was most unspectacular although he did spend nine years serving under another "pretty fair" soldier, General Douglas MacArthur. The outbreak of World War II started Ike's brilliant rise to the rank of five star general, and while doing so, to become one of the most highly respected military men on earth. From the invasion at Normandy until V-E day, Eisenhower was Commander-In-Chief of all Allied European forces, a job which required some diplomatic handling of fiery French and British generals. In Europe Eisenhower is looked upon as the American liberator and, according to one French cabinet minister "The most

popular American in France since Benjamin Franklin."

Ike's postwar duties included a spell as chairman of the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff from which he retired to mufti and the presidency of Columbia University. When the North Atlantic Treaty Organization was formed Ike was named as leader of their combined armies. It was from this post that Ike, after much soul-searching, resigned to seek the nomination.

What are the Eisenhower qualifications for the Presidency? Personally he's loaded with charm, a point that Republicans pooh-pooh by saying that so was FDR. Although Ike is in many ways politically naive, he's looked to by the internationalist wing of the party as their only hope for healing the party's wounds and at the same time administer a sound thrashing to the Demos in November.

Domestically, Ike is a trifle on the conservative side, although he resents being called so. About the only issues he's spoken out on are federal FEPC—he's against it; blanket federal education grants to states—he's against it;

and Tidelands Oil;—he believes control should be returned to the states.

On one point Ike is firm, and that is that the government has become overcentralized and as a result has bogged down into a bureaucracy. Too much emphasis has been placed on security and not enough on personal initiative. His most famous words on this were delivered to a rabid Texas crowd in 1949 when he said "If all you want in life is security, why not commit some crime that will put you in prison." In the same speech he advised the U. S. against becoming "kept men and women."

A factor that may harm Ike's convention chances is that the Convention keynote address will be delivered by General MacArthur. Although Ike and Mac admire each other professionally, it's no secret that privately they dislike one another. Best guess why: MacArthur resented having his former subordinate running the campaign in Europe which was given priority on supplies, while MacArthur's Pacific campaign had to make do with left-

Waiting bashfully in the wings like the understudies on a TV show, such dark horse candidates as Earl Warren, Douglas MacArthur and Harold Stassen watch carefully while Robert Taft and Dwight Eisenhower stage their titanic struggle for the Republican nomination.

In case of a deadlock between Bob and Ike, one of these men may become the compromise candidate. And it could happen if neither of the major candidates gets a simple majority (604) of the votes.

Strongest of the three dark horses is General Douglas MacArthur. The Hero of Bataan has a tremendous opportunity to stampede the GOP delegates on the strength of his keynote address, although right now he's firmly pledged to Taft.

At the start of the convention MacArthur has few delegates pledged to him, but mainly because he has urged his supporters to back Taft instead. But all delegates realize that MacArthur still has a grip on the imagination of the U.S. voters, and in case of a deadlock, they may turn to him as a substitute choice.

MacArthur's policies, if they can be boiled down simply, are: 1. A tough attitude towards Russia. 2. More government by the individual states and less by the federal branch. 3. Less taxation thru the abolition of needless government bureaus and services.

Governor Earl Warren is another who looms as a strong dark horse in the GOP race. He's been twice governor of California, each time winning both the Republican and Democratic races for that office (in California, a candidate can be nominated by both parties).

Before the convention was launched, Warren had more than 70 delegates pledged to him. Last minute deals, however, may have changed this total one way or another. He's the favorite son of California, which supplies 70 votes of his total.

A big handsome man, Warren was the GOP vice-presidential candidate in the 1948 election. Paired up with Tom Dewey, he lost to the Democratic team of Harry Truman-Alben Barkley. One of his 1948 handicaps was that he wasn't well known outside the West Coast. Since then, he's spent much time traveling about the country making speeches and getting acquainted.

Warren's platform, if any, is a sort of straddle between GOP conservatism and New Deal "liberalism." He favors more states' rights as opposed to federal centralization. At the same time, he's found to the left of traditional Republicanism on many basic national issues—health, insurance, and farm policy.

Harold Stassen, the third major dark horse, has been running for the U.S. presidency ever since birth. Formerly hailed as the boy wonder of politics, he's had experience as the governor of Minnesota and president of the U. of Pennsylvania.

Politically, he's a hybrid concoction of New Dealism and "grass roots ideal-

ism," the latter an historical hangover of the Wisconsin-La Follette political era. He preaches a sort of revived Teddy Rooseveltism, but it's apparently only the latest stage in a series of political flip-flops that have characterized his career.

Others who may be included in the dark horse stable are U.S. Senator Everett Dirksen of Illinois, Governor Tom Dewey of New York and Governor Theodore McKeldin of Maryland. But only in the event of a major crisis (such as the mass suicide of all other candidates) can these contenders be considered seriously.

Out of a total of 1206 delegates, 604 are needed to nominate a Republican candidate. The approximate numbers of delegates pledged to the major candidates, before the convention gets underway, are 480 for Taft and 392 for Eisenhower.

If either Taft or Eisenhower starts picking up steam early (i.e. on the second ballot), the convention may never see a third ballot, because delegates will start jumping on the bandwagon in increasing numbers, while blocs who voted against the apparent winner will later ask for a chance to switch their votes on the same ballot.

But if neither the Taft nor Eisenhower total starts growing, then watch closely for the dark horse, who in the best tradition, starts the race well in back but moves up when the favorites jam. Before anyone realizes it, the dark horse can beat the field.

CHICAGO—Here are some vital statistics on the International Amphitheatre, where the eyes of the world will be focused this week:

The Amphitheatre is 530 feet long, 310 feet wide and includes 255,000 square feet of space . . . the specially-built air conditioning plant will provide

the cooling equivalent of 2 million pounds of ice daily . . . 2,200 pairs of telephone and telegraph wires have been installed, along with 9 coaxial cables to carry the GOP convention coast-to-

coast . . . the Amphitheatre was built in 1934, of fireproof steel and concrete. It's the permanent home of the International Live Stock Exposition, Automobile Show, Sports & Outdoor Exposition, Kennel Club Show and wrestling & boxing bouts. . . . Senator Bob Taft helped to break a world record here for food-serving when 4,000 Republicans attended a fund-raising dinner at which he was guest speaker.

Quotable quote of Mayor Martin Kennelly—"Despite the cynics and the gag writers, politics can be, and should be, the highest of all professions." . . . Indicative of the careful coverage by the networks is the giant moving job done by ABC who moved 6 tons of equipment valued at \$1 million from New York. The trip took 4 days by truck to get here, where chief engineer Ed Horstman supervised its installation.

Talk about progress—it's estimated that 65,000,000 persons will see the convention on TV, compared to 1 million viewers for the 1948 conclave. . . . The CBS school for training political candidates in the tricks of TV brought out two hopefuls early—Senators Bill Benton of Connecticut and Ed Martin of Pennsylvania. They found out that white shirts don't televise well, because they cause a glare. They also learned that arm-waving and table-

pounding are taboo on the new medium.

While there's room for 7,500 spectators at the Amphitheatre, viewers had better reconcile themselves to watching the convention happenings at home. Reason is that the tickets have been quickly exhausted by politicians from 48 states, their relatives & friends. In addition, Chicago firms who helped raise funds get batches of tickets. Watch your TV set and you won't miss a thing.

A convention highlight will be provided by moderator Lee Schooler and channel 9's "Press Conference" show, which will beam nightly during the GOP meet. Political moguls fresh from the convention floor will be quizzed by Schooler and a panel of Chicago newsmen in WGN-TV's big Studio One, which opens on Mich Boul. The public is invited. Here's the schedule—Sun. July 6, 7:30 p.m. . . . Mon. Tues. & Wed. at 7 p.m. . . . Thurs. at 7:30 p.m.

What to watch for—Keep a close eye on Governor John Fine of Pennsylvania and that state's fat chunk of 70 votes. Likewise watch California carefully. When these two titans, with 140 votes between them, start switching votes to either Taft or Eisenhower, the race is almost over. . . . One of the most devastating political slogans of all time was the late Harold Ickes' slam at 1944 hopeful Tom Dewey. Ickes cracked "Dewey has thrown his diaper into the ring."

Chicago has hosted 12 Republican conventions since 1856, yet no Chicagoan has even been nominated by the GOP for president. . . . Philadelphia places second as the Elephant's favorite site, the Quaker City having played host 5 times. Minneapolis, Kansas City, St. Louis, Cincinnati and Baltimore have each had one convention, while Cleveland has been the site twice.

It is being predicted that baseball will bar television after 1953. . . . That's rumor, but definite fact is that TV blackouts in cities where big fights are held give a big boost to the gate . . . but they create so much ill-will in the city toward the regular sponsor of the fights (Pabst or Gillette) that they are a terrific problem for the advertisers. . . . Anyway, I'm perfectly happy if the IBC takes their big fights to New York, Philly, Detroit, or any city they care to black out.

Francois Pope's favorites

(No. 2 of a series)

HOLLYWOOD has long been heralded as a center for tempting "dishes." In addition to the whistle-bait starlets—another type of dish has reached star proportions.

As pleasing to the palate as Hollywood women are to the eye, is Caesar Salad, a Hollywood original. Francois Pope, TV chef, has chosen it as his second favorite in the current *TV Forecast* series.

Caesar Salad should be made at the table where everyone can see its preparation, Pope says. Make it immediately before serving.



CAESAR SALAD

1 pound Romaine lettuce	1 tbbsp. Parmesan cheese
24 small croutons	1 coddled egg
2 medium size cloves of garlic &	1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1 tsp. salt (for salad bowl)	1 tsp. dry mustard
6 tblsps. olive oil	1/2 tsp. salt
2 tblsps. wine vinegar	1 tsp. black pepper
1 tbbsp. fresh lemon juice	

4 filets of anchovies cut up in small pieces

CROUTONS

Cut six slices French or Italian bread $\frac{1}{2}$ inch thick into 4 pieces each. Saute in olive oil or butter with 2 or 3 slivers of garlic in open skillet until crisp and golden brown on each side. Croutons may be sauteed hours in advance.

CODDLED EGG

Put 1 fresh egg in small bowl of hot water for five minutes or simmer gently for $1\frac{1}{2}$ minutes.

In large wooden salad bowl put 2 medium size cloves of garlic sliced in half and 1 tsp. salt; crush with fork until bowl is well flavored with garlic (about 2 minutes.) Discard garlic and salt.

Add olive oil and beat with fork until thick (about 1 minute); add wine vinegar & lemon juice and beat well until thoroughly blended with oil. Add Worcestershire sauce, dry mustard, salt, pepper, anchovies, Parmesan cheese; beat until well blended. Add chilled Romaine lettuce which has been cut in medium sized pieces. Toss well with salad fork and spoon until well marinated. Add coddled egg and mix well. Last add sauteed croutons, mixing and tossing salad. Do not allow croutons to become soggy.

SERVE AT ONCE in individual salad bowls. Makes 4 to 6 portions.

overs. Mac has been openly campaigning against having a military man for President, a very obvious jab at Ike, and peculiar in that Mac was willing to accept the nomination himself in 1944 and 1948.

Ike's strongest point with the convention may also be his weakest. It's admitted that he'd have a strong pull with Democratic voters, which leads die-hard Republicans to ask why he doesn't run on the Democratic ticket. His detractors say that like all good generals he speaks only in generalities. But lately Ike has been spelling out his views and lots of Republicans with their ears peeled to a November landslide are listening.

There's no question that Bob Taft is a more conventional Republican and more popular with the party's old guard. Taft, going into the convention, has a delegate strength of about 480, 124 short of nomination. But if Taft doesn't win on the early ballots, a man from Abilene with a friendly cherubic grin might lure away enough delegates to carry him into the White House.

Postpone two WENR-TV Monday Night Fights

BECAUSE of ABC-TV's coverage of the political conventions in Chicago, there'll be no **Boxing From Rainbow** telecasts July 7 and 21. The Monday night boxing series will be resumed July 28. . . . On his last Eastern swing with the Chicago White Sox, Bob Elson met his family in New York City where they paid a surprise visit to General Douglas MacArthur. Sitting and chatting in the general's spacious Waldorf-Astoria suite, MacArthur's first words were: "Say, how's Minoso doing with those White Sox these days?"

Ralph Metcalfe, former Illinois Boxing Commissioner, still refuses to recognize Lauro Salas as the world's lightweight champion. Metcalfe claims the beetle-browed young Mexican didn't merit a title shot. . . . Steve Ellis, CBS-TV sportscaster and fight manager, reports his TV job is in serious jeopardy as a result of recent adverse publicity. We feel that as a fight manager Steve is better qualified to give the blow-by-blow accounts on TV. Should his brewery sponsors be foolish enough to release Ellis, fight fans would be deprived of one of boxing's top commentators.

David B. Wallerstein, general manager, Balaban & Katz Corporation, revealed that **Theatre-TV** has not been a money making proposition to date. State-Lake Theatre with five World Series showings in 1949 lost \$3,317; State-Lake and Tivoli with six college football telecasts in 1950 lost \$18,000. Boxing telecasts in 1951 set back the State-Lake another \$18,000. The only event to pull itself out of the red was the Sugar Robinson-Randy Turpin title bout Sept. 12, 1951 when the turnstiles registered a \$1,212 profit for the Tivoli.

Wrestling cuffnotes: A card from Tiger Joe Marsh informs us Joe's about ready to end his European tour after a brief visit to his birthplace in Yugoslavia. . . . Verne Gagne and Lou Thesz have fought to their fifth "draw" in the heavyweight title series. . . . Frank Sexton is touring South Africa where he recently defeated Willie Liebenberg, the South African Champion.



WNBQ, WGN-TV Televising 19th Annual Classic; Brickhouse, Allen Announce

ONE of baseball's greatest shows, the 19th annual All-Star Baseball Game, will be televised over WGN-TV and WNBQ Tuesday, July 8, at 12:15 p.m., direct from Shibe Park in Philadelphia. Assigned to work behind the mike by Commissioner Ford Frick are Jack Brickhouse and Mel Allen.

In last year's tilt, the National Leaguers trounced the Junior Circuit 8 to 3 before a near capacity crowd of 52,075 at Briggs Stadium in Detroit. Ralph Kiner, Stan Musial, Bob Elliot and Gil Hodges belted a record four homers, good for six tallies, to hand the Nationals their sixth and second consecutive victory since the series began in 1933. The American Leaguers have won 12 games to date. Vic Wertz and George Kell, both members of the Detroit Tigers, also contributed four baggers. The six circuit clouts represented the best home run total of any previous All-Star clash.

The starting lineup for each league is determined by a poll conducted by the *Chicago Tribune* and 305 newspapers and radio stations. The Chicago White Sox, who were heavy contributors last year with six players, are again well represented but Cub left fielder Hank Sauer proved to be the most popular of Chicago players.

A rule restricting managers to one pitcher of his choice from each team in his circuit has been discarded by American League club owners at their annual winter meeting.

I can only thank every loyal fan who has supported this contest through thick and thin. You have proved to the nation that TV is not detrimental to sports and that you will attend ball parks or arenas to watch a *good* program, no matter what outside influences are exerted. And I can only thank the television industry for the splendid job they are doing to promote good, clean sports. . . . Television combined with loyal fans everywhere have helped to make the All-Star game one of the year's outstanding sports events. I will remain always in deepest gratitude.

Ed. Note: An internationally famous sports promoter, Tribune sports editor Arch Ward has also originated the Annual All-Star football games and has advanced the Golden Gloves from an inter-city to an international status.


