NEW YORK—The latest on that Bing Crosby-Bob Hope telethon has it that about thirty percent of the people kicked in with donations. Add up staggering production costs, plus time, telephone and talent costs and the show, originally figured as a roaring success turns out to be in the red. The networks intend to go slow on any future telethons. . . . **Milton Berle**, never one to waste opportunities, has been working hard on gags involving his ratings slice since Bishop Sheen came on TV. Berle's latest, when asked in London about the Bishop's competition. "We're both using old material." . . . **Danny Kaye**, just about the last all-around comedy star not on TV, is readying his own variety revue which will play San Francisco for two weeks, with a possible TV screening of the revue to follow.

"Celanese Theater," which to many exemplified everything that was mature and intelligent in TV drama, looks like a casualty. The Celanese Corporation has pulled out as a sponsor, and with no new sponsors nibbling, what was perhaps TV's best dramatic series may be the latest victim of that Wednesday night powerhouse—boxing. . . . Hippity-hip-hip columnist **Walter Winchell** will probably do a simulcast of his Sunday night radio show starting in the fall. Rapid-fire Walter seems to have recovered from an illness that some thought would permanently retire him and said to be brought on by a series of damaging articles about his reputation in the New York Post. . . . **Patti Page**, CBS chanteuse, is said to have cancelled \$85,000 in bookings in order to do her new TV show.

The networks were ready for everything at the conventions except the hired "goons" hired by the various candidate's manager's to invade the various telecasts to make it look like a stampede for their candidate. Convention coverage was first-rate although a hassle over pooled coverage between CBS and NBC took place. NBC was supposed to be covering a Republican credentials hearing but didn't have a camera present because it was telecasting the All Star game. CBS raised a howl and brought in its own cameras while NBC, spotting its mistake, returned with its cameras. It was all straightened out, but it didn't improve the already-strained relations between the networks.

The **Lou Cowan** agency, long a champion of Chicago TV, has unveiled still another Chicago network production "Super Ghost." This is the seventh Cowan Chicago TV production and it stars **Professor Bergen Evans**, brilliant moderator of "Down You Go" who is finding TV a far more lucrative field than the halls of ivy. . . . Life with Luigi, still another of radio's top comedy shows to go TV, will star **J. Carroll Naish**, great movie character actor and star of the radio series. . . . **Nina Bara**, vamp star of ABC's "Space Patrol" was married July 10th to **Bob Sheldon**, stage manager of the show. Nina says she liked his cues so well she decided to let him cue her for life. . . . Coca-Cola and Bing Crosby have dropped negotiations for a fall show. Now General Electric is showing some interest in signing **El Bingo**.

Howdy Doody, the galloping kids show, is about to become Latinized. Plans are in the works for Mexican and Cuban versions of the popular puppet program.

No Villains in His World

WITH our music editor banished to the stock for controversially selecting Jane Froman and Eddie Fisher as TV's top singers, we continue our survey of the television scene. After a hard, close look at the TV comedian's field, we are spotlighting, for the next five weeks, TV's top five comics. This week, number five.

That old show business saw about a clown with his makeup off being a tragic character doesn't apply to porcine Sam Levenson, the Brooklyn family man. Sam's humor, which flows in a rich gentle vein, is an extension of his observations of life on the tenement level. Holding the mirror up to human nature he reveals a comic opera world minus the villains.

No one enjoys the Levenson "little stories" as much as Sam himself. His roly-poly body shakes with laughter as he lovingly reminisces about his family, his friends and his favorite subject, his mama.

"Mama was the one who used to say 'Sammy, go to the store, but first you wash your ears. It might be you get run over by a milk truck' or 'Papa, go outside and see what Sammy is doing and tell him to stop.'"

Much of Sam's nostalgia is reserved for an institution that seems to be dying out in America—the big family. He was one of eight kids who learned early the value of a dollar. "For a penny we used to buy a paraffin whistle. We blew on it all week and on Sunday we ate it. Today you need a couple of dollars if you even want to go out of the house." By pinching his pennies Sam was able to work his way through college as a pants presser in his father's tailor shop. After college he entered the teaching profession on the theory "Sure I'll starve, but I'll starve steady."

Then began ten years as a teacher in New York City high schools. On the side he picked up a little money by telling his stories at club dates and finally, at the urging of his friends, he went into the humor business full time. His big TV splash was on "This is Show Business," where he made eight return appearances before being tapped for a regular panelist's post. A show of his own followed, which through some mishandling, never really got started. It's expected to be back on in the fall.

Sam's standards for his humor are so high that many people consider him to be building a modern folk lore. No Pollyanna who finds good in everything, he still casts a golden haze over a life that most people still look back on with bitterness. Sam's delicate handling of this life, plus his rare penetration of its problems helps other people to look back at their poor beginnings and say "maybe it wasn't so bad after all." That's the joy of Sam Levenson.

DRAGNET



IT SEEKS the only way that an average person can find out what cops are really like is to go to jail. The fiction field has done such a super job of painting the law in every possible off-color shade that you can't tell your flatfoots without a color scheme.

Cops come in three peculiar colors: 1) blood and thunder red (like hard-boiled Rocky King), 2) stupidity blue (à la Inspector Faraday of "Boston Blackie") and 3) underplay white.

The last named hue—by far the rarest—is reserved for a couple of soft-spoken, grim-faced, intelligent fellows named Sergeant Joe Friday and Sergeant Ed Jacobs, both cops. They're fictional dicks, mind you, but they resemble real live Constables on Patrol.*

TV fans know Friday and Jacobs as the quiet heroes of the taut and talkative mystery "Dragnet."

"Dragnet" is a kind of reactionary movement against all the other phony whodunits. Drawn from the records of the Los Angeles police department, the program is so intelligently handled that it would be unfair to label it a who-

dunit. Doubling in brass to keep "Dragnet" on top of a shabby lot of *real* whodunits, is producer, director and star, Jack Webb. His sidekick is played by Barney Phillips who replaced Barton Yarborough when the latter died unexpectedly after working in two TV episodes.

Webb places the emphasis not on the crime itself, but rather on the tedious day by day routine of a couple of cops checking clues, grilling suspects and patiently tracking their men down. The glamour of fiction's more celebrated cops and private eyes isn't there. No drinking bouts with blondes. No millionaires getting waylaid by a notorious and ruthless mob. No endings and our hero muttering, "I'm OK, Baby, it's only a flesh wound."

Instead, boredom, frustration and loneliness on a night shift. Finger prints to be checked. Blind alleys. Monotonous conversations. Weeks, sometimes months, on a case with perhaps one lead to work on. Routine. Cops' routine.

To say that "Dragnet" is the best mystery on TV is superfluous. It is. But some viewers after watching the show a few times are beginning to wonder if the characters on "Dragnet" aren't actually as unbelievable as something out of Mickey Spillane. Every member of the cast—policemen, suspects, bartenders, barflies, landladies, blowsy blondes, crime detection men, even the murderers—appear to be imitating each other.

Here's where Webb's realism gets it in the soft underbelly. In striving for a fresh twist to the mystery problem he has got all his players in an underplay rut. This underplay mold so piqued TV

That Sometimes Misses The Mark

Forecast columnist Chub McCarthy that he wrote, "Once, just once, lemme hear a Dragnet character who stutters or lisps or rants or laughs or cries or just plain falls asleep in the middle of a Joe Friday quiz session!"

The realistic touch is enhanced by many on-location shots of Los Angeles, warts and all. Webb is a stickler for the minutest detail of authenticity (all underplaying actors notwithstanding). In a recent telecast in which a safe was suppose to have been looted, Jack spent a half hour wrenching loose the lock with a crowbar—just as it might have been done by the culprit—all for realism.

A popular and equally intelligent mystery show on radio, "Dragnet" is proving a very costly operation on the new medium and consequently some of its previous episodes are appearing again. It's hoped that Jack Webb won't make the same mistake committed by the sponsor of "Amos 'n Andy" showing filmed repeats.

The stories themselves are simple, direct and honest. In one episode a child-starved woman kidnaps a three-year-old baby from a maternity ward. Underlying the whole investigation is a note of pity for the woman. There are no surprises. She of course breaks down and confesses, pointing up the touch role that soft-hearted cops often must play.

Woven throughout these basically simple plots is tight, clever dialogue which Webb sprinkles liberally with touches of irony. While breaking down a suspect charged with robbery, for instance, Friday and Jacobs allow him to call home to his wife frequently when it appears that the evidence is stacked too high against him. Each call he makes results in a busy signal. "Yakity yak. She always talked too much. Never stopped talking in her life. I don't know how I've stood it this long." Then fed up,

he confesses he stole because his wife nagged him into it. As a fitting ending, the thief makes one more call home. Again, the busy signal. Resigned to his fate, he leaves for jail while his wife, supposedly unconcerned, is still gabbing away on the phone. The result: dramatic irony at its best.

SHE'S STILL A RED HOT

When the Last of the Red Hot Mamas was introduced by columnist-emcee Ed Sullivan, she appeared, as usual, elaborately gowned and jeweled, a sheer handkerchief in her hand and a dewy look in her eyes. Her voice, matching her generous proportions, sang of the old, old days and nostalgia dripped like cured honey.

The result of the combined debut and "farewell" appearance of Red Hot Mama Sophie left dainty housewives, bobby soxers and furry-chested laborers as well, dabbing away at their eyes. Finally Sophie, overcome by the nostalgia, draped herself, weeping, into the arms of Ed Sullivan. Tears of happiness, choked emotions and general awe at this great medium brought the house down. It was a performance that left show biz people limp. Sophie's debut was a smash—if you like sentiment—and who isn't sentimental around Christmas?

Sophie Abuza was born in 1884 like all entertainers hope to die: on the road. Her mother was traveling out of Russia when the child was born. Mrs. Abuza was en route to America in a wagon anxious to meet her husband who had escaped Russia when he switched papers with a dead Italian to gain admission into this country. The family settled in Hartford, Connecticut and started a restaurant there which catered especially to show business trade. Young Sophie (who at 13 already tipped the scales at 145 lbs.) spent part

THE big gal had been boozing out her throaty tones for 45 years. She had shouted 'em into hysterics in burlesque, made 'em weep in vaudeville, tickled them with sexy songs in the night clubs and shimmied her way to huzzahs on Broadway. Now she was ready to make her farewell performance—on the infant medium television as a guest star on "Toast of the Town."

At 68 years of age, there was something institutional about Sophie Tucker. Everyone knew the name. But not everyone seated in the quiet of their living rooms had battled the smoke and fumes of the niteries where Sophie had played. To them, it was like watching a leprechaun dance into reality.

For Sophie, the prospect of television as a way of slaying listeners didn't add up to any picnic. The sobriety of a parlor audience wasn't the ideal setting for the goddess of off-color laughter. The one way to fracture 'em was sentiment, pure oozing maudlin sentiment. Happily, the time for the sentimental approach was ideal. It was close to Christmas, 1951.

of the day hustling showfolk into her parents' eatery. Once there, the customers would be entertained by the youngster's lusty singing. They showed their appreciation by tipping.

Bitten by the incurable show biz bug, Sophie decided she could make enough on the stage to take her family away from the long hours and dirty dishes of a restaurant. She got a job in a beer garden as a black-faced coon shouter. The proprietor insisted on the makeup. "She's so big and ugly, better get some cork and black her up."

Then burlesque. Sophie spent years giving the raucous males what they wanted on their day off: lots of spicy

songs sung with plenty of volume and loaded with double meaning lines. Miss Tucker's disputable theory on sex in songs: "The innocents aren't shocked at my stuff 'cause they don't get it and the others get a big belly laugh out of it."

In vaudeville Sophie was first billed as the "Mary Garden of Ragtime," a title that might have caused a raised eyebrow from the leading American opera singer at the time. Later, however, "Last of the Red Hot Mamas" stuck and Soph has been carrying that tag line with her ever since.

The glitter of a Broadway show evaded Sophie for almost thirty years since she first almost became a star. In 1909 her number stopped the show during a tryout and the star, Nora Bayes, bolted at the thought of having her vehicle stolen by an "upstart." So Miss Tucker was dropped. She never gained fame on Broadway until 1938 when "Leave It to Me!" starring the venerable trouper brought out the SRO Sign.

Sophie's repertoire includes, of course, "Some of These Days," which is to Tucker what "If You Knew Susie" is to Cantor. For the lusty stuff she'll do a string of verses from "How You Gonna' Keep 'em Down on the Farm?" If it's a tear jerker the audience wants, nobody does a better version of "My Yiddishe Mama." And for the always-hit nostalgic material, Sophie brings

PART I

IT'S been jokingly suggested that Chicago's finest export of ham is produced by Swift, Armour and news commentator Paul Harvey.

In the talent business, many top performers actually "ham up" their acts for the sake of showmanship. Newscasters, however, are a much more somber group—they generally get so weighted down with the problems of the world that their delivery comes across with the well modulated drabness of an undertaker.

Not so with Paul Harvey, whose Shakespearian talents have made his TV-radio news shows nationally known classics of drama and suspense. But more important, Harvey has a habit of timely blasts that make him headline material from coast to coast.

The Argonne incident was one. When Harvey attempted to prove that military security was lax at the Argonne National Laboratory, the resulting fu-

ror shivered official Washington right down to its socks.

More recently, Harvey was called to testify before the House committee investigating TV-radio morals. He charged that comedians "rooted so deep in Broadway and the bawdy night life of Manhattan" are trying to impose "their distorted views on the rest of the 47 states."

At least nine of Harvey's broadcasts have been incorporated into the Congressional record. He's been cited by the Freedom Foundation for "outstanding defense and extension of the American way of life."

Harvey is especially proud of a 1947 slam by Moscow's Communist Red Star. The Russkies intoned: "Station WENR's nauseating news analyst Paul Harvey is a prohibitionist by conviction. His convictions, however, are for sale for \$3,000 a week. That's what he's said to get from the Edelweiss brewers to

plug their beer."

"That's a sample of the Commies' usual accuracy," smiles Harvey. "Wish they were right. \$3,000 a week—WOW."

Harvey isn't held in too high a respect by some of his newscasting colleagues. They claim he over-emotes on his broadcasts at the expense of fact. To millions of American listeners, however, he ranks as a great American, and a bellwether of U.S. citizens.

His anti-administration campaigns have kept many New Deal bigwigs on a perpetual hot seat. As a result, when Harvey got into difficulty over the Argonne incident, there's not much doubt that the word came down from high Democratic circles—"Sweat this Republican, but good."

Harvey, a militant crusader for an adequate national security, had word that the Argonne defenses were not all they should be. He attempted to prove it—like any good newsman—and ran

afool of the government.

Administration moguls—aided and abetted with loud whoops and howls by the left wing press, leaped into the case. It was surrounded with a top secret hush-hush. The net effect was to smear Harvey with a "spy scare" brush—instead of giving him credit for a patriotic attempt to improve his country's defenses.

The object of all this attention is a youngish (he admits to 34 years), stocky family man who admits that, to his knowledge, the "greatest living American" is his attractive wife "Angel." Despite his quick rise to fame, Harvey believes that he owes most of it to Angel, whose real name is Evelyn.

Together with a young son, Paul Harvey II, age 4½, they live in an apartment on Chicago's north side. No great participants in the city's social whirl, nevertheless the Harveys welcome their guests with a quiet and sincere hospitality.

Almost as famous as Harvey himself is the late, lamented Reveille, a handsome cocker spaniel which died in February at the age of 7½ years. Harvey says he won't get another dog, in deference to Reveille's memory. In fact, the pooch lives on in a sort of immortality. Harvey's ranch in Missouri, a 160-acre affair on the Mississippi River, is named after Reveille.

Much as any man would discuss his pet in conversation, Harvey used to mention Reveille often on his broadcasts. The fan mail that poured in for Reveille sometimes matched the flood that Harvey himself draws.

The Harvey teamwork has probably done as much to help Paul's success as any other factor. Angel is the former Evelyn Cooper of St. Louis. She's a graduate of Washington University there, and holds not only a master's degree in English, but sports a Phi Beta Kappa key. Paul usually writes his own scripts, but when he gets rushed, Angel pinch-hits on the typewriter.



CONVENTIONS PLEASE

NOTE: STREAMLINE FOR TV

The full impact of the telecasts of the national conventions won't be felt until four years from now, when the politico master minds sit down to map out the 1956 conventions. These meets are almost certain to be "television" conventions.

The 1952 sessions were supposed to be, but they weren't. Many think that the breakdown of relations between the GOP and Taft headquarters on one side, and the radio and TV industry on the other, was the greatest single contribution to Taft's defeat.

Regardless of the merits of the case, public reaction went strongly against Taft and the Republican brass because of the discrimination against TV cameras in the pre-convention activities. The Eisenhower forces capitalized on the break, and found television working for them. It proved a powerful ally.

It was a bitter lesson for the GOP leaders, and a shrewd victory for the Ike managers. It will assure that in 1956 television will be treated as a powerful instrument of public enlightenment, and not as a nuisance that causes the politicians a tiny bit of discomfort because of lights and cables.

In looking toward 1956, it is difficult to see how the political parties can hold their conventions anywhere but the International Amphitheatre in Chicago. No other hall in the country offers the facilities that the big stock yards barn has. The networks shudder at the thought of trying to do their job with any less space.

The only alternative would be to hold the conventions in one of those tre-

mendous television studios they're building out on the West Coast. This would make common sense but not political sense.

You may be certain that virtually all hearings will be open to TV, and that plenty of accommodations will be set up in advance for the cameras and wires.

The programs will be tighter. There was supposed to be a minimum of oratory at the 1952 conventions, but it didn't seem that way to viewers who followed all of the sessions. The Republicans in particular had a lot of long-winded orators.

The streamlining of the conventions which was talked about this year will become a reality in 1956. It goes without saying that both parties will groom candidates whose first qualification will be that they are telegenic.

Sen. Taft was one of the weakest of all the Republican candidates in registering on TV. It's a shame that the future of a nation might be decided on whether a man shows too many teeth when he smiles at a television camera, but that's what's happened, and we might as well learn to live with it.

I often wonder how George Washington would have registered on TV.

The visual reporting of the convention proper was the greatest thing television has ever done. The camera work was excellent. The variety of shots, and the alertness in picking up everything that was happening on the floor, could scarcely have been better.

The conventions removed all doubts as to television's maturity and its ability to carry the responsibility as the greatest medium of public information in history.





down the house with a long soliloquy in song that passes for a musical version of her life.

In private life, Sophie has been married twice, both times unsuccessfully. In her biography, she confesses that her one crying wish was for a man with whom she could share life. "What's the matter with life, or with Sophie Tucker," she writes, "that I have never had a man in my life to stand up to me and give me as good as I could give him... I looked for him and I went on looking, but we must have been on different circuits."

For all her seeming command of an audience, Miss Tucker has never made an appearance where she hasn't felt those peculiar nervous butterflies flitting around gaily in her abdominal area. It is said that after all these years she's still not completely sure whether her performance might flop or not. Somehow it never does.

The people in show business love and admire the old gal who operates in the splendiferous gowns and gaudy jewelry. The era of the Red Hot Mamas would come to a close at the passing of Sophie Tucker. But like the legend of the leprechauns who form the wonderful world of fantasy for the Irish, it just doesn't seem possible that the legend of big, lusty Sophie Tucker could ever die.



TV SPORTSCAST:

Feuds Flare Anew In Network TV & Theatres

THE battle for sports between Theatre-TV and Network Television is in full swing. Both factions are bidding astronomical figures for exclusive rights to spectator sports with special emphasis on boxing. As a result, shrewd boxing managers hold up contracts to play both sides against each other for more money.

In Jersey Joe Walcott's recent title defense against Ezzard Charles, Walcott's manager, Felix Bocchicchio, boldly demanded \$150,000 as Walcott's cut of TV revenue. It wasn't until after much haggling that a settlement was finally made. The Gillette Razor Co., shelled out \$175,000, (a sum which almost equalled gate receipts) for the privilege to sponsor the coast-to-coast telecast. Charles and Walcott split 60% of the gate and TV-radio fees.

Theatre-TV in the meantime was far from dormant. The theatres, which now have swelled to 75 houses in 37 cities, purchased exclusive rights to the Ray Robinson-Joey Maxim light-heavyweight championship June 23. The theatres charged their customers \$2.40 per seat and paid the promoters 90 cents for every ducat sold. It was not revealed what percentage the fighters received. . . . The only local theatre to report empty seats (600) was the Paramount in Hammond, Ind. . . . Watch for future issues when *Forecast* visits the Paramount for a complete run-down on how Theatre-TV works.

To get the real story behind the Olympic Telethon flop, we visited Bob Hope at his Edgewater Hotel suite. Although the discussion centered around the telethon, our interest was also attracted by the Republican Convention on TV. . . . Dressed in blue cotton pajamas, Hope inadvertently leaped from his armchair when Ike's nomination seemed imminent and shouted: "Wow, Ike's only twenty jokes away from majority!"

Ernie Simon who started as a wrestling gabber back in Washington, D.C., and hit his video peak as WBKB's Curbstone Cut-up will return to TV as a sportscaster. Ernie is slated to assist Jack Brickhouse on WGN-TV's new kid baseball series, "Major Little League," Wednesdays, 8-8:30 p.m.

GOLF CLINIC

WGN-TV SPOTLIGHTS SPECIAL GOLFERS' TELECAST

FOR the benefit of Windy City golfers unable to attend the Tam O'Shanter Golf Clinic July 30, WGN-TV will televise a carbon version called "PGA Golf Clinic," from its loop studios, on Wednesday, July 30, at 8:00 p.m. The clinic is a discussion and demonstration by such PGA greats as Sam Snead, Lloyd Mangrum, Jimmy Demaret and Cary Middlecoff on how to play the game properly. Chick Harbert will act as master of ceremonies and will be assisted by WGN-TV's ace sportscaster Jack Brickhouse.

For duffers interested in attending the session personally, 800 studio ducats will be made available on a first come first served basis. To obtain tickets write: "PGA Golf Clinic," WGN-TV, 435 N. Michigan Ave., Chicago, Ill.

These PGA stars will present a comprehensive instructional 30 minutes based on the fundamentals of golf. As the master of ceremonies, Chick Harbert describes the festivities in detail. The format consists basically of one or more players arranged in a semi-circle to face the TV cameras and to teach,

say, the proper grip. Then Chick Harbert describes the grip on a club and the players simultaneously clasp their clubs to demonstrate his point. The same procedure is followed in regard to the correct stance. An entertaining feature is provided when the players point out the dangers of wrongly performing these basic functions. They adopt wrong positions in order to show how the swing is contorted and that's when the fun begins.

The players then pose two clubs in front of them, one horizontal to their feet and the other perpendicular to their left heels where the ball is normally lined up. This way, the clubs diagram the stance. In demonstrating the stance for iron shots, six balls are lined up to indicate where the ball should be positioned in relation to the stance for each of the various clubs. The ball farthest away from the feet requires a two iron, and the ball nearest the feet calls for the shortest club, etc. . . . To demonstrate wood shots only three balls are aligned.

In another demonstration players individually exhibit numerous shots. Each

man will use the club he is best noted for. Chick Harbert describes their actions in detail and draws attention to specific points that should be watched more closely.


Trouble or trick shots also have their place in the program. The players show how to hit hooks, slices, low wind shots and others that only champions can control at will. A sand trap will be constructed to teach duffers how to blast their way out of it. For obvious reasons, the only demonstration omitted from the outdoor clinic will be a driving contest in which players show-off their prowess in blasting a long drive off the tee.

It was late in 1946 that the PGA of America first introduced this new feature, "Golf Clinic," on its tournament tour. It caught on almost immediately. The clinic is generally held the afternoon prior to the start of a tournament and season ticket holders are admitted free while others must pay the standard admission price. Now for the first time, all Chicagoland is invited free via television.

"It's the hope of the PGA tournament bureau that in the years to come the clinic program may be enlarged upon," explained an official, "and that its already many attractive features may be expanded."

Golf tournaments in the United States today are big business. Critical fans and contestants themselves are unanimous in the opinion that the PGA of America tournaments are without parallel anywhere in the world. This superiority is not limited to the fact that the PGA has more tournaments or because they offer more prize money. Their success can be directly attributed to their over-all system of tournament operation and the resourcefulness and enterprise of their sponsors.

But the wealth of tournament experience which the PGA has accumulated through the years would be useless if their sponsors did not apply it in their respective tournaments. To disseminate this experience the PGA published in 1947 the first edition of their "Tournament Sponsors' Guide Book." 


The man told him that Indians were raiding farms in the valley just a few miles west of his place, where his wife Molly and the two young children were waiting for him to return from town.



Orestes "Minnie" Minoso: As an untried rookie reporting to the White Sox on May 1, 1951, the Cuban Comet stepped up to the plate to debut against the New York Yankees. He looked at Yankee pitcher Vic Raschi's first pitch and blasted it 420 feet over the center field bull pen wall for the most spectacular debut in Comiskey Park history. But that was only the beginning of hundreds of thrills to come for Sox fans. His speed and daring on the basepaths netted 31 bases. He batted a tidy .326 for the season, led the league in triples with 14, and narrowly missed the "Rookie of the Year" award.

His full name is Saturnino Orestes Arrieta Armas Minoso and he was born in Cuba, Nov. 29, 1923. He's 5 feet 11 inches tall and weighs 178 pounds. And he's friendly and unassuming —except on the diamond.
